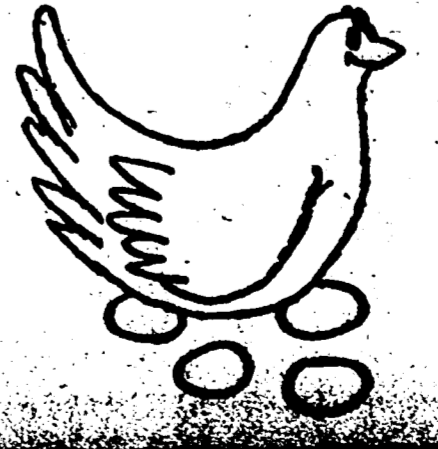

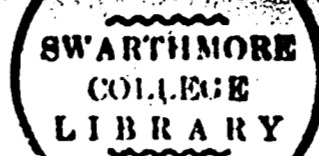

TB Cases Reported In Delaware County

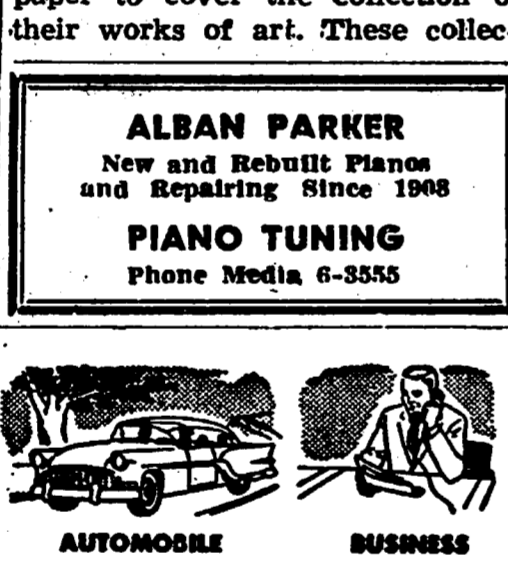
A total of 51 cases of tuberculosis were reported in Delaware County during the second quarter of the year with the greatest number falling in the 60-year-and-over white male category.

Dear Mr. Lee:

I have received a copy of your letter to Secretary Lawler of this Department at Harrisburg, and a copy of his reply, regarding the proposed Mid-County Expressway in the vicinity of Swarthmore.

As you undoubtedly know, this Department has had Consulting Engineers preparing recommendations for several lines for the proposed Mid-County Expressway, one of which is to the east of Swarthmore and the other which follows the Crum Creek valley to the west of Swarthmore. This proposed highway would extend from the area of the Chester Pike to the Schuylkill Expressway near Conshohocken with interchanges at Chester Pike, McDade Boulevard, Baltimore Pike, State Road and other important intersections in Delaware County. . . the engineer's studies would indicate that the large volume of traffic which ordinarily uses Route 225 through the Borough of Swarthmore would be diverted to the Expressway, and any one who has studied the project feels there would be no tendency for traffic to leave the Expressway and pass through the Borough of Swarthmore to points north or south, as present conditions on Chester Road certainly would not be as satisfactory as conditions on the Expressway.

During the past several weeks we have heard many rumors to the effect that Chester Road in Swarthmore is to be constructed to a width of four lanes, but those who are familiar with this section of highway know that this is impractical due to excessive property damages.

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Questions Assurance

To the Editor:

There are two points of interest in the statement by the Acting District Engineer of the Pennsylvania Department of Highways in the "Letters" column of last week's Swarthmorean. Readers will recall that the statement purports to assure residents of the Borough that Chester road will not be widened if the Mid-County Expressway is built along the presently planned Yellow Route.

First, the reason given—"excessive property damages"—is a curious one in view of the undeniably excessive property damages the Yellow Route itself will cause in this and other communities. By what reasoning does condemnation of eight or ten feet from front lawns along Chester road become more "excessive" than outright destruction of 276 homes?

Second, it should be noted that this is the first time the Department of Highways has been willing to give Swarthmore any assurance of any kind that Chester road will be left as it is if the present two lanes prove inadequate to carry traffic to and from the Baltimore Pike interchange of the Expressway.

Naturally, the Department of Highways is anxious to assuage public resentment of its selection of the Yellow Route—a selection for which no adequate explanation has been made. However, the Yellow Route cannot be justified on any basis—cost, projected traffic load, or economic impact on the area. Under the Federal Highway Act of 1956, these three factors must control selection of expressway routes.

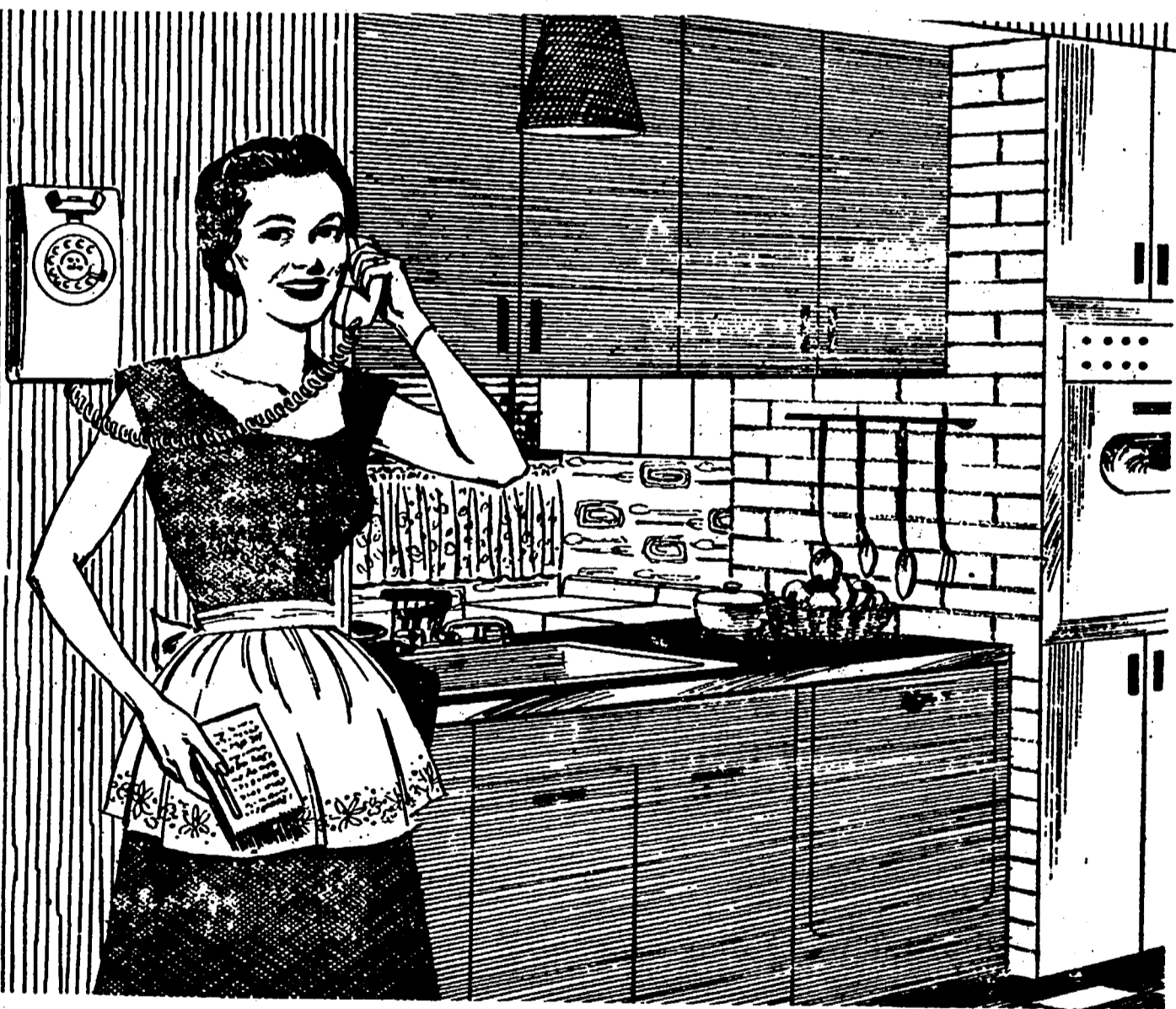

Water Company Asks Voluntary Reduction

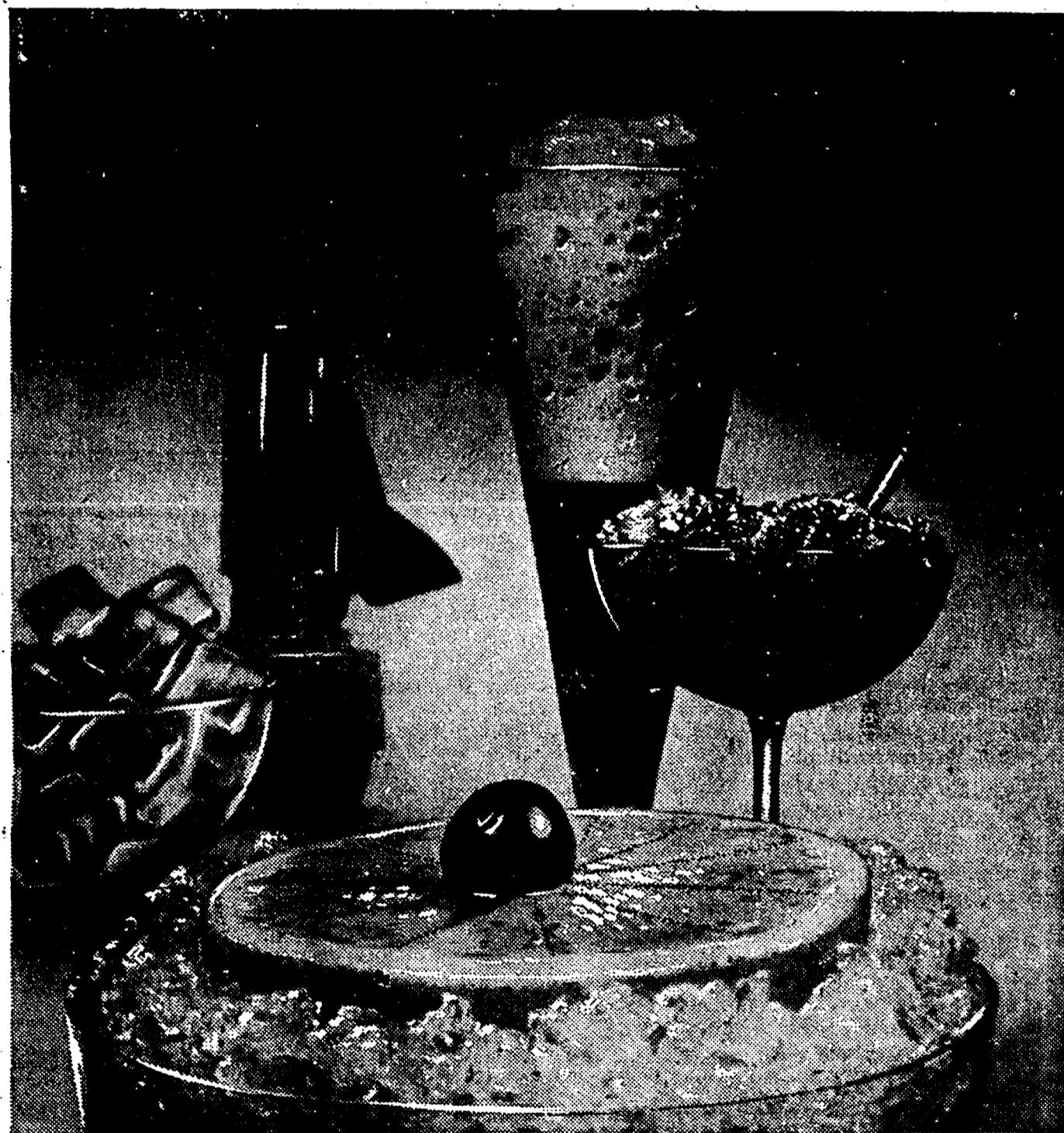
The Philadelphia Suburban Water Company has asked its customers in recent weeks for voluntary reductions in the use of Springfield water by its customers.

Thus far, however, the reduction which the company expected from these announcements has not been apparent. Harold S. Schutt, president, stated this week. He said that a steady high demand for water is continuing, indicating that most householders are still sprinkling their lawns and gardens and filling their swimming pools.

Due to this high demand and the continued lack of rainfall—an 11 inch deficiency since January 1st—the company's reservoirs are being more rapidly depleted every day. For example, Geist Reservoir now has ten feet less water than it had at the beginning of the year.

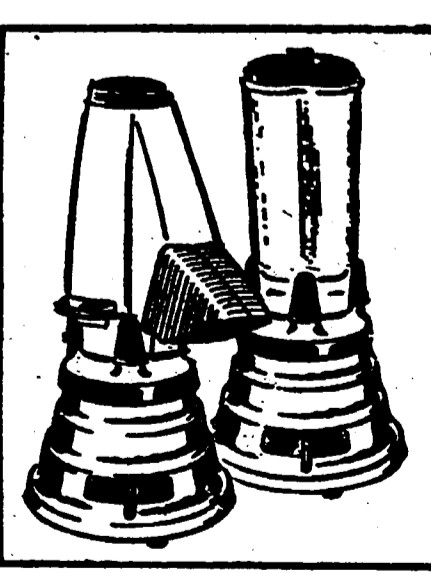
Mr. Schutt reiterated that the interests and convenience of its customers is the company's primary concern, and that the company does not want to impose restrictions on the use of water. However, he said, such action will be necessary unless customers immediately stop lawn sprinkling, car washing and filling swimming pools.

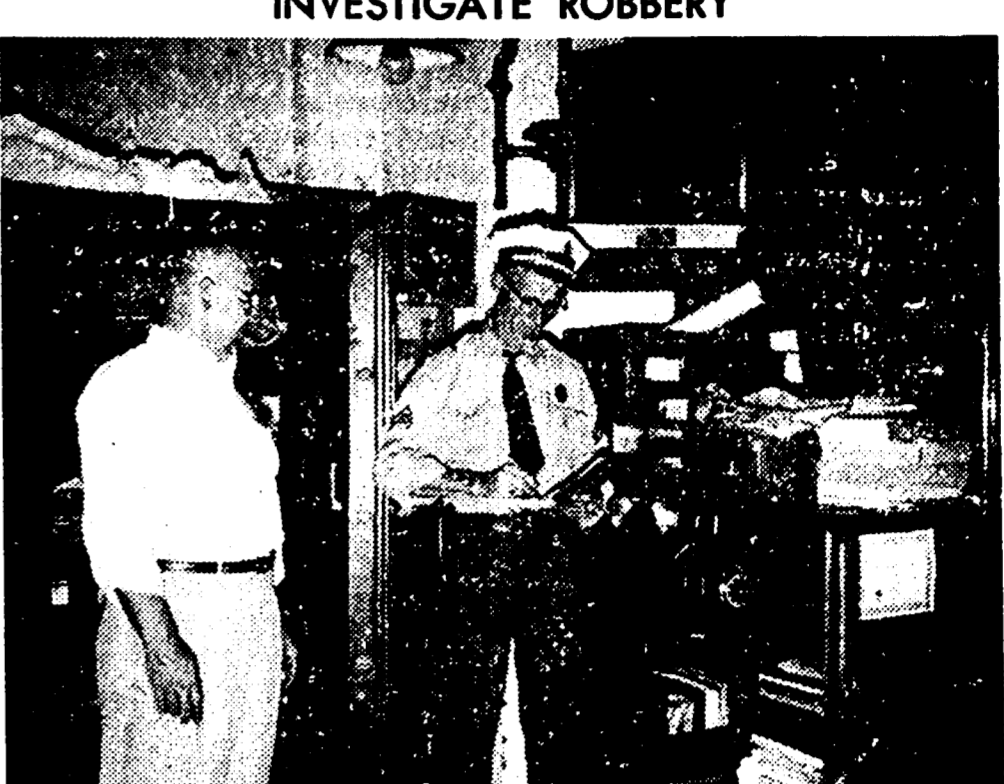

Water Company Asks Voluntary Reduction

The Philadelphia Suburban Water Company has asked its customers in recent weeks for voluntary reductions in the use of Springfield water by its customers. Thus far, however, the reduction which the company expected from these announcements has not been apparent. Harold S. Schutt, president, stated this week. He said that a steady high demand for water is continuing, indicating that most households are still sprinkling their lawns and gardens and filling their swimming pools.

Due to this high demand and the continued lack of rainfall—an 11 inch deficiency since January 1st—the company's reservoirs are being more rapidly depleted every day. For example, Geist Reservoir now has ten feet less water than it had at the beginning of the year.

Mr. Schutt reiterated that the interests and convenience of its customers is the company's primary concern, and that the company does not want to impose restrictions on the use of water. However, he said, such action will be necessary unless customers immediately stop lawn sprinkling, car washing and filling swimming pools.

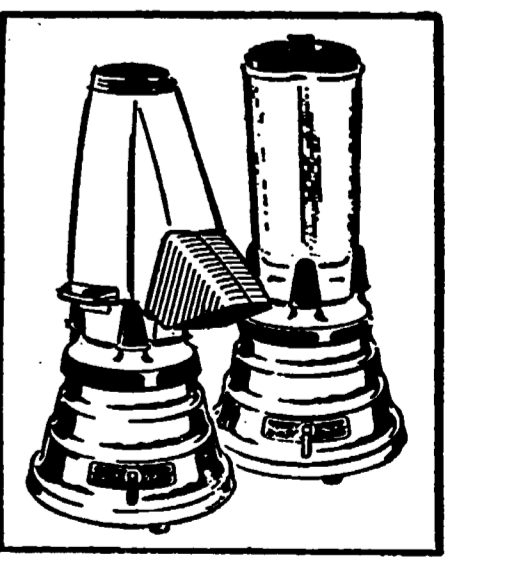

(Continued from Page 1) running a big road through the middle of Springfield, giving no regard to houses, schools? No, we aren't going to do that. Get over on the side, take advantage of terrain, which would mean we would hug sides of hills, maybe try to save tremendous fills and things of that sort, at the same time not go through any developments where we can move. If we went right through the middle of townships, we would be going through an awful lot of them. That would certainly not happen if I am in the position in which I am now. But if I am, I will certainly fight that and I will guarantee you that there will be hell raised, if I may use the expression, because I will come down here in Springfield, I will sit in that seat with you people. That would be foolhardy on our part. Well, it would be disaster to Springfield Township. We don't do that."

Ten months later, Mr. Hendrixson pointed out, "The Department of Highways decided on a route which does the very things its spokesman promised Springfield it would not do, requiring condemnation of properties worth \$2,500,000 in that Township alone."

Turning to possible reasons for widening Chester Road if the Yellow Route goes through, Mr. Hendrixson added: "It seems to us that geography makes it inevitable. A glance at any map of the area will show that Chester Road is the shortest and most logical route for traffic originating in Chester, Marcus Hook, Claymont and Wilmington to join the Expressway at Baltimore Pike because the Yellow Route swings three miles east of Chester to join the Industrial Highway."

"If we are correct in our analysis," Mr. Hendrixson said, "and a need does develop for four lanes on Chester road, you may be certain the State will see that they are built."

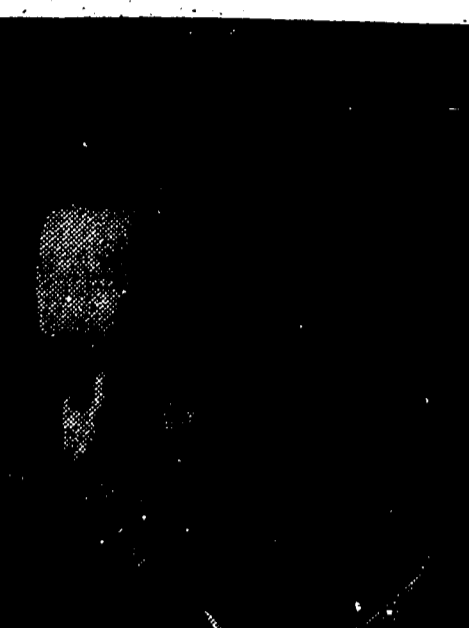

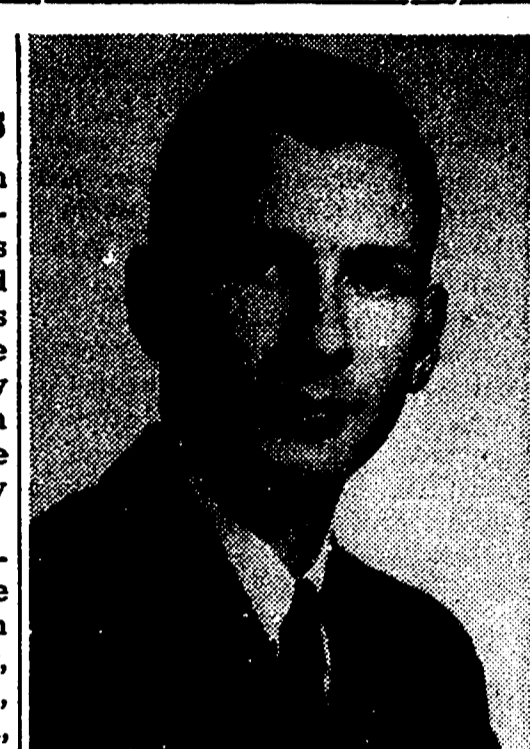
