Women's Association Service Will Include Thank Offering Tea. The Sanctuary of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church will be the worshipful setting for a high point of both the church year and the Christmas season for the Presbyterian Woman's Association at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, December 10. The Worshipful Service will be followed by the Christmas Tea in McCahan Hall.

Dr. Frances Reinhold Fussell will moderate the meeting, one of the most timely in the current series. It is hoped that Christmas discussions will inspire members to hear of the effort for peace, in the lands which gave birth to Christian beliefs.

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Chairman of the Township's Park Committee, Davis distributed an eight-page booklet of explanation and pictures of the nine parks, comprising a total of over 93 acres, and the wide range of winter and summer recreation offered to the 27,500 residents of the township through the cooperation of the Board of Commissioners, the School District, Springfield Athletic Association, Lions Club and other organizations and individuals with interest and pride in the community.

Park Borders Borough. Springfield has just added a four-acre park which borders Swarthmore, along the Little Crum Creek and the unopened lower end of Harvard avenue and Drexel road (beyond Yale avenue), and is bounded along the far side by Ridley Township. Entrance will probably be from the Muhlenberg-Arner street section of the township.

Even though some residents never use the parks and sometimes people from other communities use them, the parks do require some policing and maintenance, they work to the benefit of the taxpayer, said Davis, so few complaints are heard. Springfield is currently assessing one and one-eighth mills (\$35,000 a year) for purchasing, outfitting and operating its recreational features. Davis said only 60 percent of this amount has actually been spent this year since a 20 percent saving has been realized through use of the township's own highway labor crews instead of outside agencies to do necessary work.

Cost Break-Down. Forty per cent of the expenditure goes for labor. Davis estimated, while 15 percent is spent on supplies. A young high school teacher, for \$100 a month, has been planning the year-round activities and getting the summer arts and crafts program started. Residents are charged only for materials and, in the case of the Springfield Council,

calls Borough Fortune. Swarthmore is fortunate in having the College campus and beautiful woodland along Crum Creek, Davis said. Such is of great value, even if not used by the individual, for such areas are priceless as buffers against commercial encroachment. Once they are gone they cannot be regained, he said, and he recommended a referendum be placed on the ballot to enable acquisition of all four creek beds in Delaware County to preserve them for future generations.

Swarthmore Thumps Lansdowne 19-0
Annual Football Banquet Set for Saturday 6:30 P.M.

A Lansdowne turkey, stuffed and served with all the trimmings, was enjoyed by the Swarthmore high school footballers Thanksgiving Day as 15 seniors bowed out in impressive fashion completely routing a scrappy Lords eleven with a devastating second-half attack. Those who watched in invigorating and chilling temperatures, saw an even-stevens game throughout the first half, with Swarthmore defending its own goal posts in the first quarter, and suffering heartbreak as the half ended with the ball on the Lansdowne one-yard line.

The Garnet dominated the action throughout the second half. After Charlie Dietz scored the third touchdown on the second play of the fourth period, the Varsity was withdrawn and rested on their laurels for the day.

In the first quarter, the Swarthmore attack could not generate enough steam to get out from under its own goal posts until a great play by guard Chris Martin recovered the ball at the 36-yard line. The Garnet was forced to kick to Lansdowne, which got an attack under way that moved the ball to their deepest penetration of the day at the Garnet 28-yard line. At this point a bruising tackle by Jay Lord and Bob Wagstaff shook the ball out of the hands of the Lansdowne back and again it was the ever-alert Chris Martin who pounced on it for Swarthmore possession. The hard running of Dave Houtz and Charlie Dietz and a sharp, short pass from Bill Medford to Dave Grogan suddenly found the Garnet down on the Lansdowne five-yard line, and later, the one-yard, as the half-ended.

When the third quarter began the Garnet defense, led by Ken Hewes, Bill Rowland, Chris Martin and Jay Lord, halted the Lansdowne attack and forced them to kick on fourth down. Jeb Turner downed the punt and Swarthmore took possession on their own 34-yard line.

Little time was wasted in moving the ball down field. Dave Houtz would smash off-tackle and Charlie Dietz would swing the end with Brodie Crawford contributing yards with his determined ball-carrying in between. Charlie Dietz, who without a doubt put on one of the finest exhibitions of ball-carrying ever seen in a Turkey Day game sparked the drive with his speed and nifty dashes through the Lansdowne secondary.

The first touchdown was scored on an inside tackle slant by Dietz as both Houtz and Crawford flared wide as decoys, pulling the secondary defenders out of position and opening up the touchdown highway for slashing Charlie. The extra point failed and Swarthmore led 6 to 0.

The Garnet defense again proved to be a Rock of Gibraltar and when Dave Houtz recovered a Lansdowne fumble on their second play at the 25-yard line Swarthmore was in business again. On the first play Bill Medford sent Charlie Dietz off guard for a two-yard gain but on the second play it was all the way by Dietz, with fine blocking by Houtz, Grogan and Wagstaff. The attempted run for extra point was fumbled and Swarthmore led 12-0.

Again the Garnet defense refused to budge and Swarthmore took possession at mid-field following a Lansdowne kick. Five plays later quarterback Medford pitched out to Dietz on a right end run that brought all spectators to their feet as the powerful halfback swivel-hipped his way in and around defenders for 15 yards and the final touchdown of the day. The extra point was scored on a perfect play performance by quarterback Medford who hid the ball on a line buck to Dave Houtz and then pitched out to Brodie Crawford on a left end sweep who crossed the line centered

by Chris Martin and Ken Hewes for the extra point and a final score of 19-0 and a 5-4 season record well earned.

Game Summary

Not enough can be said for the great play of Jay Lord and Chris Martin on defense. It is estimated that between them they gained at least 150 yards for the Swarthmore team. Bill Rowland and Kenie Hewes both were thorns in the sides of the Lansdowne attack throughout. Although Jack Lewicki was missed at his regular defensive spot, Dave Grogan took over and did a good steady job. Bob Wagstaff's steady and improved play at tackle, coupled with the consistent and rugged performance of Fred Schaeffer, kept a well balanced Swarthmore offense intact.

The left half back defensive spot was filled by Jeb Turner and regardless of his bruised leg did a creditable job throughout. Brodie Crawford and Dave Houtz again gave a good, sound, all-around performance as ball carriers and backers-up. Skip Bernard, back in action for the first time in two weeks, performed well at the safety position.

Cub Cratsley, who plays four different positions on the line, demonstrated on several occasions what a fine player he is. Other boys who played in the game were Pete East, Thad Adams, Doug Roberts, Bill Fuoss, Bob Jarratt, Mahlon Boyer, George Gilmour, Hal Lawrence, Ed Harris, Chuck Fellows, Dick Jack-

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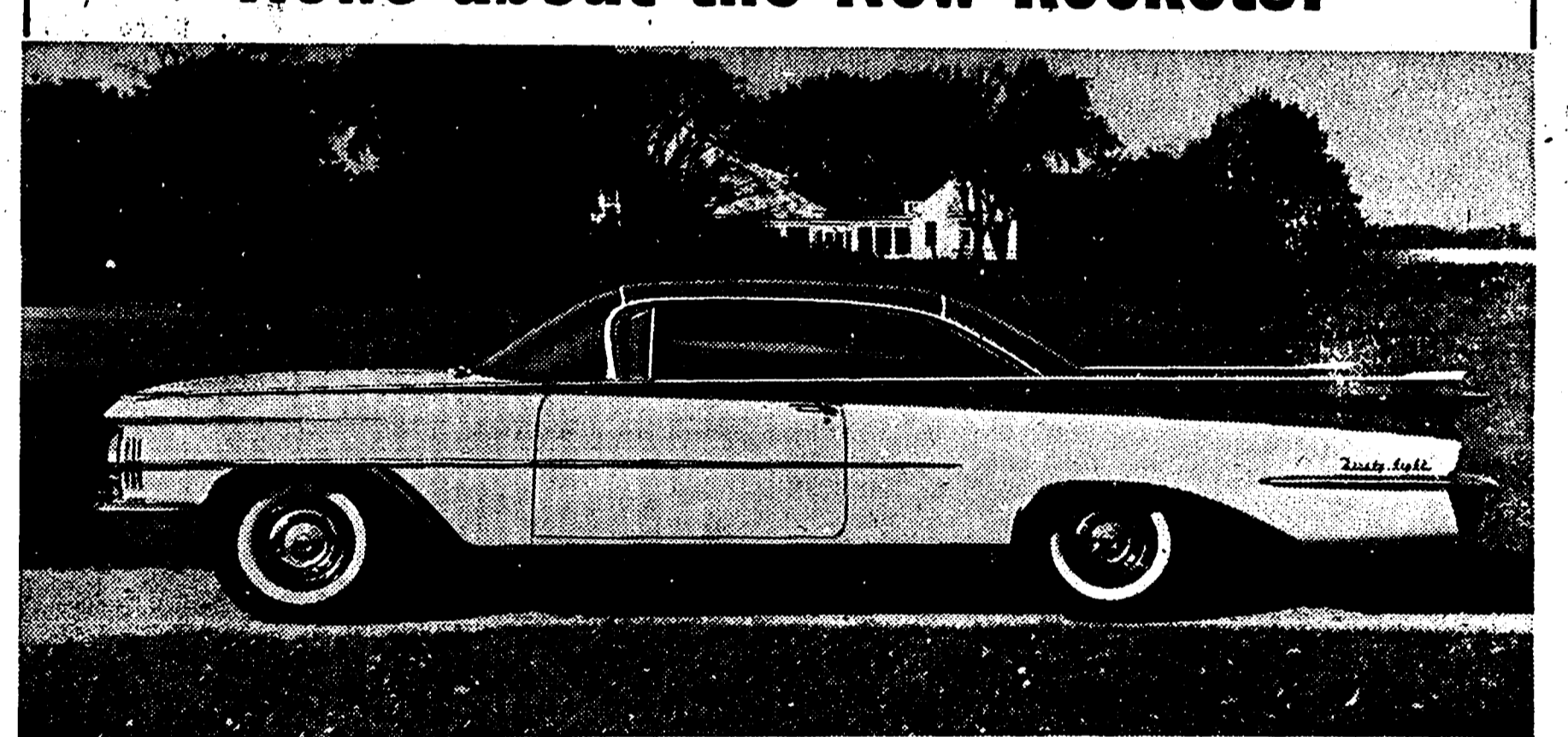

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Health Bulletin

Much confusion has resulted from recent statements by Pennsylvania State Health Officials that children with chickenpox, mumps and German measles should be allowed to attend school.

- Chickenpox — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises seven days from onset of illness or until patient has no fever and has recovered.
German Measles — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises for seven days from onset of illness.
Measles — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises 10 days from onset of illness.
Mumps — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises for 10 days from onset of illness, or until fever and swelling are subsiding.
Whooping Cough — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises four weeks from onset of illness.
Scarlet Fever — Patients with this disease are to be confined to their premises for a minimum of seven days or until complete recovery from all catarrhal or purulent discharges incident or secondary to the disease, or until three days after the beginning of adequate and effective therapy.

It has been proved beyond question that the common contagious disease cannot be prevented by quarantining precautions, simply because they are spread before a patient becomes ill. Also, since children are less prone to have a severe type of these illnesses and have fewer complications than adults it is obvious that individuals should have these diseases before they are grown.

But it should be emphasized that it may jeopardize health and increase the chance of complications to continue a normal daily routine during any illness, be it mumps or an ordinary case of tonsillitis, etc. Therefore a child should be kept at home, under a physician's care when sick.

Swarthmore residents are an enlightened and health conscious group who have been most cooperative with their physicians and health officials and I believe can be depended on to cooperate in this matter to the fullest.

It Takes Courage and Conviction

To the Editor: I was most gratified to read in the November 21st edition of the Swarthmorean the letter from A CONCERNED PARENT about "hawking" in Swarthmore.

I particularly welcomed the sentence: "Our over-privileged children are really under-privileged when they are permitted to do things that we think are typical only of less desirable communities."

I would like to add another example of one of these things. Last summer about 8 p.m. I had occasion to stop in at The Cracker Barrel.

As I approached I noticed "a gang of teenagers hanging around the front." I put these words in quotes because this was the way it flashed through my mind.

The shock deepened! This kind of thing is not rare—it happens frequently in Swarthmore!

The impressive thing is that there is no success in stopping it. The parents of these boys, some of them from "good families," refuse to believe such conduct of their darlings.

I had the feeling that these boys are getting away with it, just as they are with the "hawking." Apparently no one is willing to say the one thing that is needed: "This is wrong, and I'm going to see that you stop."

What magic strength there is in these few words, if sincerely meant, for 15-year-olds as well as five-year-olds. And how lacking in our culture!

LWV Takes Stand

To the Editor: The sincerity of the letter of a "Concerned Parent" published in the November 21st issue of The Swarthmorean, together with the front page picture of "dangerous implements" taken by the Borough police from local teenagers is an indication that some citizens are willing to face up to an increasingly grave situation.

The thoughtful suggestions to Borough mothers contained in the letter are to be commended, and we hope, acted upon. The recognition of this serious Borough problem by The Swarthmorean and its weekly column of Police Notes is also to be commended.

We must as a community get over the idea that "Swarthmore children can do no wrong" and think together of how to help our boys and girls channel their energies in constructive ways.

Suggestions were made by the "Concerned Parent" as to what mothers can do as individuals in the way of preventive measures. However, there is another phase of this whole problem which is a community responsibility.

The desire of teenagers to be together is a normal one, so that doing something "with the gang" is a need to be considered. Many communities have found that one way to meet this need is to have a good Recreation Department responsible for a program geared to the needs of the individual community.

While a recreation program is certainly not a panacea for all community ills, studies and statistics show a low rate of delinquency in communities with good recreation practices, and in the long run the positive program is less expensive.

The idea that Swarthmore children as a whole are overly organized is a fallacy that we as a community have been accepting as a fact for too many years.

Even the child who participates in many activities needs some form of weekend social recreation. A recent study of Public Recreation in Swarthmore made by a committee of the League of Women Voters of Swarthmore has shown that there are many gaps which could be filled.

The need for more Saturday day time recreation and for Friday and Saturday evening social recreation for both boys and girls, particularly of junior high age is very important.

evident. Many parents of children in this age group deplore the fact that these youngsters go to see the same movie two or three times for lack of something better to do on weekends, or go out of town to attend the social recreation program at the Rutledge Fire House on Friday nights. The older boys and girls attend the Saturday night Canteen in large numbers. This is carried on through the tireless efforts of two dedicated Borough couples. Should these people find it necessary for any reason to give up their work with the Canteen, it could easily mean that the Canteen would

"fold up" and leave 800 teen-agers "on the loose" each Saturday night. The School Board and churches are willing to provide facilities for recreation programs, and the School Board does sponsor some recreation programs in the area of sports. Their work load, however, is too heavy and demanding to allow them much time to study the recreational needs of children. A separate Board of Recreation created by the Borough Council to be responsible for this phase of our community life is urgently needed. Such a Board or Commission could employ a trained Director, possibly in conjunction with another community, to guide us and to help us integrate our

existing programs and expand them where necessary. We hope the Borough Council will take the necessary steps to meet this need and that they will have the understanding and backing of the community.

Membership, Board Vote to Work for Borough PR Board

At a recent meeting of the League of Women Voters of Swarthmore at the home of Mrs. Robert Hilkert, Strath Haven avenue, the subject for discussion was the desirability of a Public Recreation program for Swarthmore.

For some time the League of Women Voters has been studying the possibilities and advantages of a year round Public Recreation program and last year appointed a committee to study the present recreational practices in Swarthmore and make recommendations for changes and expansion if found desirable. The committee chairman, Mrs. H. Woodward McDowell was assisted by Mrs. F. T. Anthony, Mrs. Herman Bloom, Mrs. David Bowler, Mrs. Richard Enion, Amy Howland, and Mrs. David Ullman.

The report of the committee was presented to the membership for discussion and possible action. The League of Women Voters feels that the consideration of a year round program of recreation for all ages, under trained leadership, is a timely one for Swarthmore. Mr. Hayden, who lives at 47 Woodbrook road and is a certified public accountant, was appointed last summer to fulfill the unexpired term of Henry I. Harris, who resigned before completing the term of Dan Harris, Jr., which he had been appointed. This term runs until January 1962.

The third auditor who had served since 1948, is Richard M. Snyder of 269 Dartmouth avenue, associated with the Catalytic Construction Company.

Council passed a resolution asking the auditors to make any recommendations which they felt might be desirable to strengthen or modernize borough methods, and another resolution authorizing the finance committee to employ an outside firm of public accountants.

College Science Day For Co. H.S. Teachers

Sigma Xi Sponsors Event; Wm. Elmore Talks Tonight

Seventy Delaware County high school science and mathematics teachers are expected to attend a Science Day program at Swarthmore College today.

Participants in the conference will meet in one of three simultaneous discussion groups during the afternoon to consider the relation between the high school and college course programs in the physical sciences, biological sciences, and mathematics.

Each section will be led by a Swarthmore College professor and a Delaware County high school teacher: in mathematics Professor Heinrich Brinkman and Robert Hartman of Upper Darby High School; in the physical sciences Professor Dennison Bancroft and Frederick Houck of Nether Providence High School; in the biological sciences Professor Luzum Livingston and John Bay of Springfield High School.

A combined meeting, a dinner, and at 8:15 a talk by William Elmore, chairman of the College's Department of Physics, will follow the panel discussions. Professor Elmore, who spent last year working at the atomic laboratory at Los Alamos and accompanied the American exhibit to the Geneva exhibition of the peaceful uses of atomic energy, will speak on "Progress in Thermionic Fusion."

The event is being sponsored and organized by the Swarthmore Chapter of Sigma Xi, a national honorary scientific society.

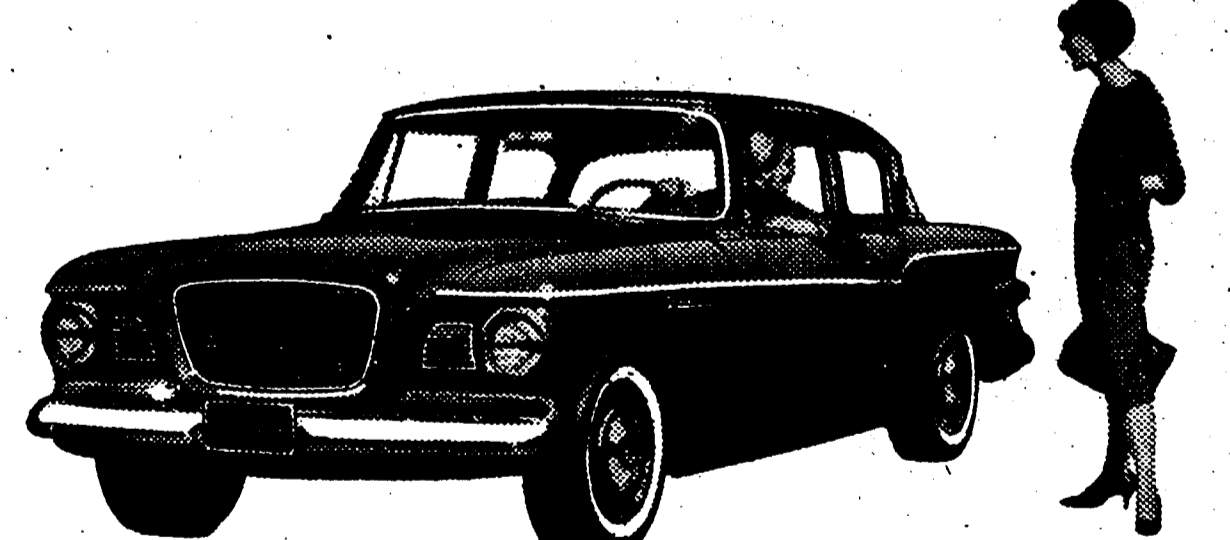

Postmaster Grier Lists Christmas Mail Helps Urges "Mail Now," Wrap Well in Help-the-Mail Men Plea

Now that Swarthmore heads directly into the Christmas mail rush Postmaster Charles H. Grier put his "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign into high gear today.

Postmaster Grier says, "We're ready for an all time record Christmas mail this year. Every facility of the Post Office is being expanded to render maximum service. Extra trucks and personnel have been added, and special mailing schedules will be set up to insure prompt handling of the tremendous flood of both incoming and outgoing mail."

"However," Postmaster Grier continued, "the vast volume of Christmas mail is only part of our problem. Names and addresses are often carelessly written, many packages are poorly wrapped or have insufficient postage on them. These oversights result in delays and disappointments, most of which can be avoided if everyone will follow these simple requirements —

Be sure your Christmas card and

gift mailing lists are up-to-date.

Wrap your Christmas gifts securely.

Use complete addresses — including street number, rural route or post office box number. Be sure that the name of the street is complete with avenue, parkway, or drive. Avoid abbreviation of street and state names. Use zone numbers wherever possible.

Most important of all — mail your cards and gifts within the next few days!

Delivery of Christmas cards will be greatly expedited if they are bundled with "Local" or "Out of Town" bands which are available free at the Post Office.

Postmaster Grier reports that the present flow of Christmas cards is running about the same as last year, but the mailing of gifts by Parcel Post is somewhat behind schedule. He mentioned that a Christmas card or letter can be enclosed in a gift package merely by adding the appropriate letter postage to the postage for the package itself and indicating the presence of a letter or Christmas card inside the package. Always include an extra label inside gift packages. (Parcels brought to the post windows before 10 a.m. or between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. will avoid the noon hour rush.

Postmaster Grier also suggests that all Christmas cards be sent by First Class mail, thus insuring forwarding service if the addressee has moved, or the card's return if the recipient cannot be located. Then, too, Christmas cards sent by First Class mail may include handwritten messages to make greetings more personal.

"Do it now!" is the slogan for the "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign from now on. Mailing out of town Christmas cards and packages immediately will enable Post Office employees to look forward to spending Christmas Eve and Christmas Day with their families.

Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas, Postmaster Grier adds.

LOOKS BACK

ON YEAR HERE

Mrs. Hallock Campbell, secretary of the Swarthmore-Rutledge School Board, would like to share the following letter with fellow-townsmen who knew the writer, Miss Barbara Forrest of Liverpool, England, last year when she was an exchange teacher at Swarthmore High School:

"For the last few months my life has been very busy, uncomfortably busy, getting settled in my new school, getting used to living in a big city, and—less successfully—trying to get used to the rigours of the English climate. Certainly Swarthmore with its green lawns and its beautiful trees seems to be very far away from the sprawling city of Liverpool with its closely packed houses and its grimy dampness.

"But, however far I am away from it—in all senses—Swarthmore is often in my mind. The year I spent at Swarthmore High School was not only a valuable experience for me, but also a very pleasurable one. I found the girls and boys of the tenth grade most stimulating to teach, and although they all seemed to me to be very bright, they were not so eager to learn. Naturally this is a quality which possesses a teacher most — which unfortunately she does not always find. Equally I was impressed with their friendliness and courtesy. They all made me feel quite at home, and although I know I made many mistakes — it doesn't do to treat an American tenth grader like an English Fifth Former — they were very patient with me. Whatever of value I may have been able to teach them, they certainly taught me a great deal of value in return.

"I am very grateful indeed to the School Board for making it possible for me to have had this experience. It is always something of a risk to appoint a new member of the faculty, but to appoint one unseen, and a foreigner at that, is a very great risk. I am so glad that the School Board took that risk.

"I do hope that this, and all the years to come, will be successful for the school."

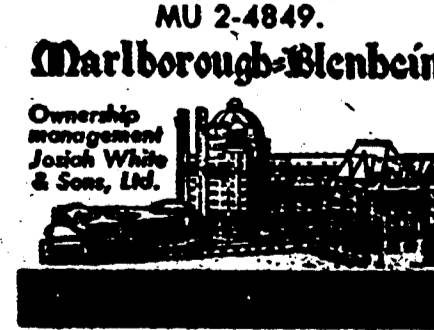



Contemporary Oils on View at Art Center
 A group of 30 oil paintings by three youthful artists, Manuel Barbadillo, Steintor Sigurdsson, and George Van Heste, from the picturesque Mediterranean town of Torremolinos, Spain, are being shown for the first time in the United States in an exhibit at the Community Art Center, Rogers Lane, Wallingford.
 The paintings are being exhibited at the Center through the courtesy of Mrs. Donald A. 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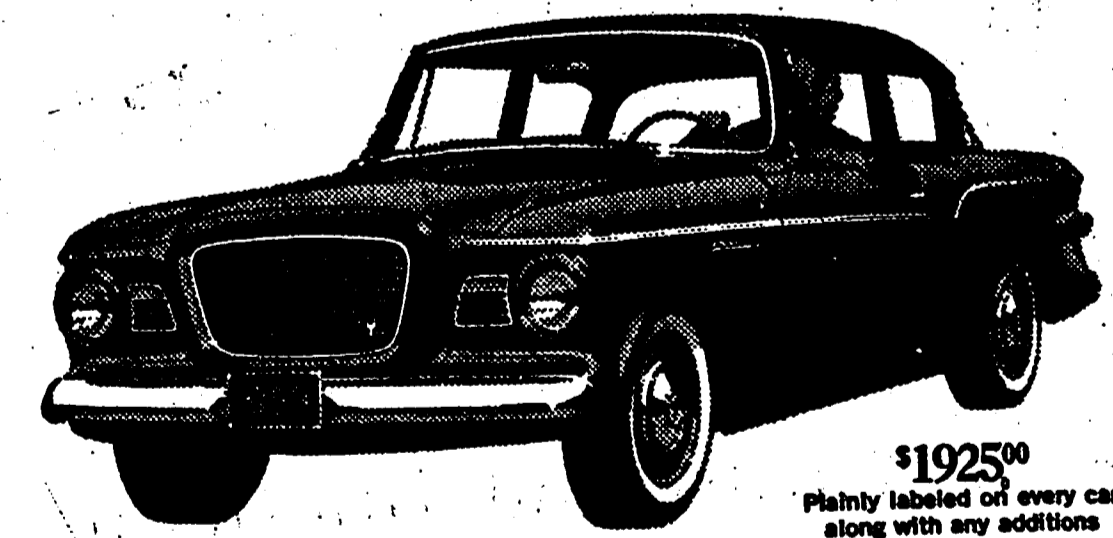
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Swarthmore-Rutledge School News

Plans have been announced by Frank R. Morey, supervising principal of the Swarthmore-Rutledge Schools, for notification of parents, teachers and pupils of school closing if such a step is deemed necessary because of deep snows or other hazardous road conditions.

If weather conditions are such as to make it necessary to close the schools, radio stations will be notified as soon as calls can be put through in the early morning. The stations to be called directly are WJAU and WDRF.

Through the courtesy of the City of Philadelphia, the Associated Press and the United Press International, it will be possible also to have announcements on stations WJAU, WFIL, WFIL, WHEAT, WJMG, WIP, WJMJ, WJEN, WRCV, WFIL-TV Channel 6 and WRCV-TV Channel 3.

As early as word can be sent to news announcers they will put the news on the air. Because the telephone lines are very busy on such occasions parents of children are urged to call rather than to tune in on one of them and listen for the school closing announcements.

If weather conditions become bad during the school day it is the intent of the school authorities to keep the school in session until the regular closing hours unless this step is deemed to be especially hazardous.

The use of the radio stations will be made only to notify parents, teachers and pupils, early in the morning that there will be no school sessions that day. In addition the faculty has arranged a telephone calling system by which certain members of the faculty will call others to tell them of the plans. The custodial staff will report to the school with the intention of using the means at their disposal to clear the accumulated snow.

Swarthmoreans "Adopt" 8-Year-Old Polish Girl

In place of the Korean girl "adopted" over a year ago and who no longer needs plan help, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Van Urk, Thayer road, have financially "adopted" Krystyna Aleksandrowicz, an 8-year-old Polish girl in West Germantown, through Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., 852 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

Krystyna lives with her sick parents and her two brothers, Alfred, 5, and Richard, 3, in a refugee settlement. During the German occupation of Posen the watch factory where Krystyna's father worked was closed down by the Nazis and he was put to work as a heavy laborer in one of their coal mines and later in one of their food distribution warehouses. With the advance of the Soviet armies the warehouse was transferred to another town and the father along with it. At the end of the war he was admitted to the UNRRA DP camp where he met and later married his wife. She too had been deported in 1940 from her home in Kopolowina to work as a forced laborer on a farm near Hannover.

Shuttled from camp to camp, the father tried to provide for his family by doing any odd jobs he could find. One day while he was collecting old metal he inadvertently picked up a hand grenade which exploded, seriously injuring his face, hands and body. He was hospitalized in Bognhorn where his left leg had to be amputated at the knee and also the right hand. He was hospitalized for seven months and upon his discharge was provided with an artificial leg. It was only recently that the health authorities provided him with an artificial hand. Before the accident the father had worked as an auto mechanic but this work is closed to him now in view of his condition. Since almost all work available to those in the camps is heavy labor, with a prosthesis on leg and arm the father is considered incapacitated for any work. Krystyna's mother suffers from anemia and is so thin and weak that she can barely take care of her home and children.

The family of five are now wholly dependent upon a total monthly income of \$60 derived from public assistance and the father's invalidity pension. After meeting overhead expenses for light, gas, water and fuel totalling \$7, they have less

than 35 cents a day per person to provide food and all other needs. They live in one large room with a few possessions that are old and battered and before PLAN came to the rescue they were in desperate need of bedding and clothing. They could not even buy shoes... the children were barefoot.

Krystyna is a little girl with blond hair and blue eyes. She is a shy, quiet child helpful with the household duties. Now in the third grade of elementary school, Krystyna is a very diligent and attentive student. She speaks both Polish and German.

Foster Parents' Plan is a non-profit, non-propaganda, non-sectarian, independent, government-approved relief organization which provides children who are orphaned, distressed, or otherwise made destitute with the care, education, and moral support they need. "Adoption" through PLAN is financial, not legal.

College Awarded Grant For Gifted Students

Open to All Divisions; Humanities May Be Emphasized

In order to provide the opportunity for highly gifted students to pursue independent research during the summer between their junior and senior years, the Dolfiger-McMahon Foundation of Philadelphia has awarded a \$5,000 grant to Swarthmore College.

Projects under the Dolfiger-McMahon grant may be further investigations in the fields to which the student has been introduced in courses or Honors seminars; cross-departmental research often not possible in a regular course or Honors seminar; preparatory research for a senior thesis; research in a field not necessarily related to requirements for a particular major or pre-professional training.

The Dolfiger-McMahon Foundation was established in 1957 to supply income for charitable and educational purposes, and grants have generally been made in the greater Philadelphia area.

phasis in this program. The program will allow the interested student to go as deeply into a subject as his abilities allow, without the pressure of time felt during the College year; it will encourage habits of independent research, it will help to establish the idea that independent research in the mature approach to intellectual and scholarly problems; it may well encourage some students to consider teaching or research who might not otherwise consider these fields.

The program will be open to students in all divisions of the college, though some emphasis may be put on research programs in the humanities in view of the greater availability of research funds in the natural sciences and engineering, and to some extent the social sciences.

Students' projects will be approved in advance by a special faculty committee, and modest grants will be made both to the student and to the faculty adviser. This program is an outgrowth of the College's efforts to make undergraduate study more independent and more rewarding for the individual student.

Something More Basic To the Editor: I have appreciated the letters concerned with the problems of our Swarthmore youth. I am in complete sympathy with the concerned parent who wonders where the mothers are when the children are engaged in questionable activities. I am wondering what has become of our home life!

Surely everyone will agree that the influence of parents is far greater upon children than any other influence. It is possible that in some cases, parents have tried to substitute material advantages for a genuine interest in their children and in all that they do? Parents who make every effort to understand their children know that this means taking plenty of time to work and play with them. There is absolutely no substitute for the time that is necessary for a family to be together to develop an atmosphere of genuine affection and sympathetic understanding that contributes to the development of personality. Without this sense of security a child can easily become maladjusted despite the technical correctness of his parents' behavior.

It is the fine spirit of comradeship between parents and children that sustains and encourages youth in its struggles of growth. Children cannot develop inner discipline and self-control without intelligent love. In order to provide the atmosphere in the home that is so essential, perhaps some parents will need to rearrange their schedules (even give up some of their own social life) so that it will be possible to experience real family life.

I am grateful for the homes that do value a happy family life—who do say "No" to a number of activities so they can assume their first responsibility which is that of being a parent.

If every home were a happy one in which the members of the family enjoyed being together, many of the problems concerning us would be eliminated.

Before you become too critical of this article and place all the blame on some one else, ask yourself several questions.

In how many activities have you participated with your family during the past week? This means just spending time with them at home listening to their cares and their concerns, too. Parents can never underestimate the influence of their attitudes, their words, and their actions, upon the lives of their children. "As the twig is bent so is the tree inclined."

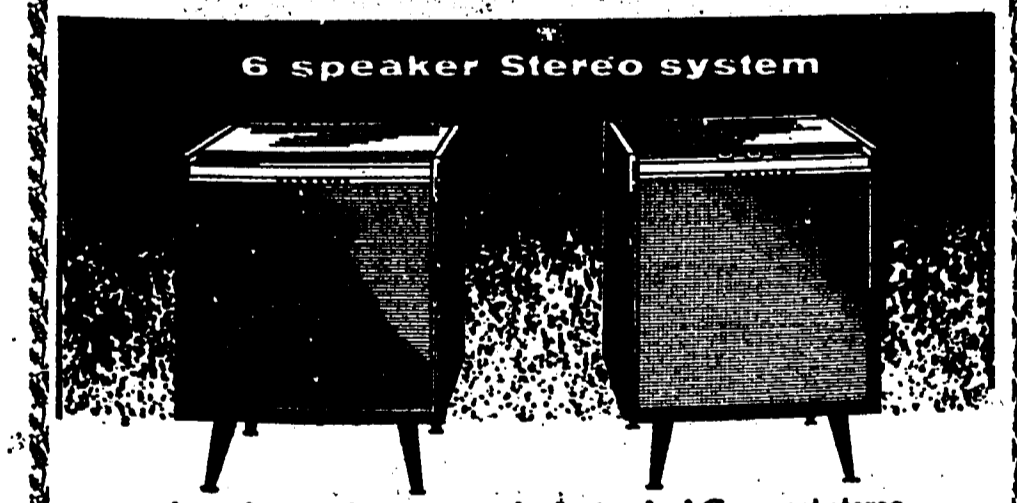

On Christmas Tree Care

"Live trees are outdoor trees, and they prefer outdoor conditions", reminds Ben Palmer, of Rose Valley Nurseries. "Keep the tree in the house for as short a period as your Christmas schedule permits, then take it outdoors in a protected spot and place a mulch around the ball until you plant the tree."

"Most trees, used in the house as a Christmas tree, are hardy and tough, and will grow if given common sense care."

"If you follow these suggestions you will help your tree grow:

1. During a thaw cover the spot where you intend to plant this tree later, with a mulch to keep the ground from freezing. By this foresight, planting will be much easier in case of cold weather after Christmas. Have at least a bushel of good soil available (where it won't freeze) to improve the soil when planting.

2. While the tree is in the warm house, see that it does not dry out. Add enough water to the ball every day or two to keep it moist. Do not allow the tree to stand in water more than an hour or two, or the roots will smother.

"We dig these trees with a solid ball, tied with burlap and string, so that each tree has an adequate root system. We feel that jamming them into a small tub reduces their chances of survival."

"To protect your floors and rugs heavy, waterproof, 4 mil. Polyethylene bags and squares, as well as standard galvanized tubs, are available at reasonable prices. When tied around the stem above the ball, the Polyethylene will reduce the water loss of the tree."

"A living Christmas tree is also more fireproof than a cut tree. If a cut tree is chosen — keep its butt in water for your better safety."

He is also a member of the council of research of the Institute of World Affairs and a director of the Nation-Wide Securities Co. A son, Joseph M. Burns, is a senior at Swarthmore.

The Players' Club has welcomed the holiday season with the production as gay and jolly as old St. Nick himself. Although "The Matchmaker" is not directly concerned with Christmas, it implies an spirit of fun and festivity that is particularly appropriate to the time.

Old, New Fires Given School Board Attention

Precautionary Measures Outlined by Firemen

The School Board devoted a five-hour session Wednesday night chiefly to approving plans and financing measures for rebuilding the burned high school, and considering means of preventing future fires.

In the first instance Architect Alex Erving received approval of final drawings for the rebuilding and pleased the Board with his latest estimate of gross cost, \$623,000, which is \$40,000 lower than one tendered them on November 19. He said he hoped the current inclination of bids to run below budgets would continue until after the local school district's contracts were secured.

Members of the Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School Authority were present and expressed willingness to finance the rebuilding since it appeared impossible for the Board's own borrowing capacity to cover the project. A representative of Kiddy, Peabody and Company gave preliminary bond counsel to Board and Authority members, pointing out methods of long run savings to taxpayers if insurance monies could be applied to payment of Authority rental for the new building instead of being used to decrease the actual amount of the bond issue. The firm was asked to present more detailed analysis of shorter term, lower average interest, and more advantageous state reimbursement factors involved in several possible arrangements, at (Continued on Page 7)

Use Ancient Leathers in Sea Scrolls Research

The story of the way in which pieces of a sandal worn by an Egyptian nearly 4000 years ago are being used by the Department of Leather Industries at Leeds University in an attempt to put a date on the Dead Sea Scrolls has been received by The Swarthmorean.
 John B. Poole, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Woelfel of College Avenue is a research assistant in the department and brought back scraps of the scrolls from the Holy Land earlier this year. The scrolls, discovered in caves in 1947, have been dated on palaeographic grounds at between 300 B.C. and 100 A.D.
 The dating technique being used at Leeds is by comparison of temperatures at which fibres of leather and parchment shrink. Poole attributes to Professor Donald Burton, department head, and Dr. Reed, the observation that shrinkage of fibres begins at a lower temperature with older materials.
 "They found a difference of about 40 degrees between the Dead Sea Scrolls and modern parchment," said Dr. Poole. "We are trying to assemble a collection of leathers and parchment of known age and plot their shrinkage temperatures against their ages, so that from this we can establish the age of undated materials." The Public Records Office has lent parchments and vellums dating from the early 18th to the mid 16th century. The British Museum has lent the scrap of

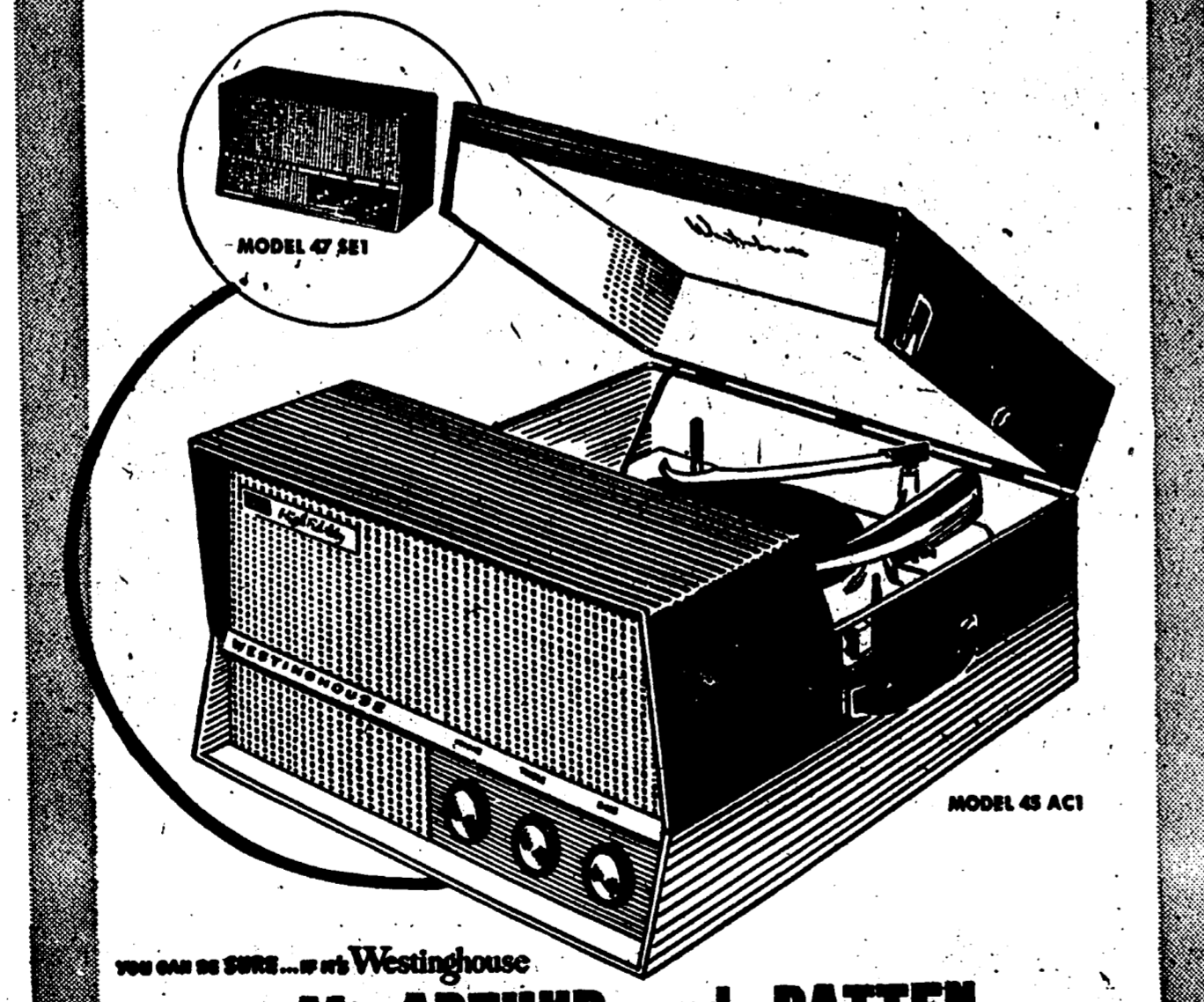
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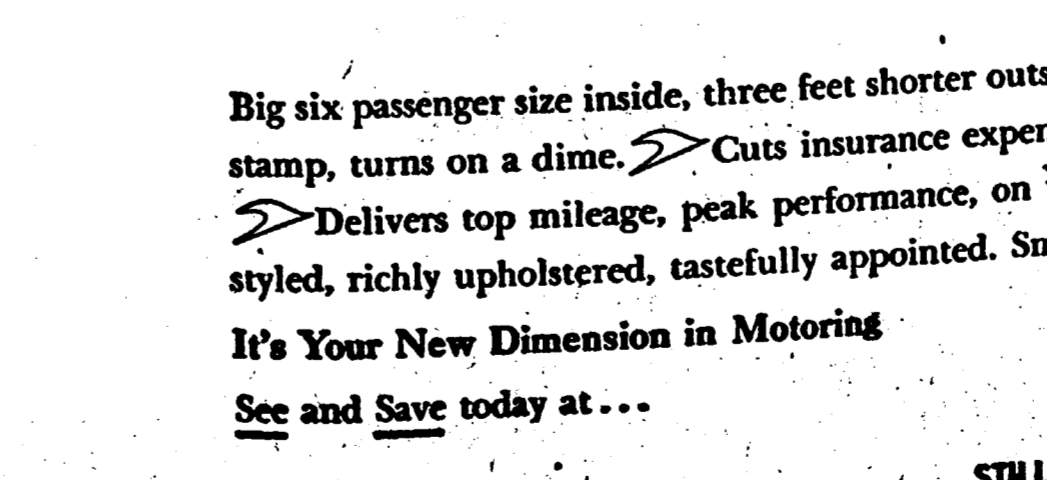

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Old, New Fires Given

School Board Attention
(Continued from Page 1)

an adjourned meeting of the Board which will be held at 7:30 Monday evening, January 5.

In between deliberations on various phases of repairing damage done by the high school conflagration on Easter night, the Board listened to Swarthmore Fire Chief George A. Humphries and Assistant Chief James Dunn report an inspection of the elementary and secondary school buildings and recommend additional precautionary measures they deemed advisable. Through a question asked by Humphries the Board became acquainted with the fact that several small fires had been discovered and extinguished by members of the faculty within the high school in recent weeks.

Humphries inquired why the schools had not been evacuated at the time of the fires which he had heard a boy had been caught setting. Principal William Bush said the fires had been so quickly extinguished by those who discovered them that there was no need for an alarm. He said investigations have been conducted by school authorities and State Police Arson Specialists but no definite origin of the fires determined. Numbering three in all, and occurring near Thanksgiving, the fires were discovered around the noon hour break in sessions. Two happened on the same day and the other a week away. One smoldered in a bag of damp towels outside a locker room on the bottom floor of the junior high school building, another in a waste basket in a ground level hall of the old building, and the other in a small pile of rubbish in a vacant room in the burned building.

Dunn urged that teachers be told they must not take any chances, but must turn in an alarm and evacuate children even if they only "think they smell smoke". He said any time lost in playing extra safe is well spent, for in case of a real fire "two minutes indecision can mean everything".

Besides specifying a considerable number of locations at Rutgers avenue and College avenue plants where fire extinguishers should be placed, the Fire Company heads recommended that the Board consider: leasing a special alarm line so that an alarm at either school would sound simultaneously in the Swarthmore police station; erecting an outside fire escape at the rear of the original section of the Rutgers Avenue school and replacing a smoke stack which runs clear through that building with a more direct, straight one; keeping children out of boiler rooms and placing drip pans under boilers to catch leaking oil; replacing key locks on classroom doors of the newest elementary buildings with free riding handles enabling the doors to be readily opened from the inside; transferring janitors supplies from a small closet with no ceiling, in the center of this building, to a larger closet across the hall and narrowing venetian blinds so they will open with exit doors; at high school — unlocking panic doors in gym whenever it is occupied by however small a group, securing a new latch to keep incinerator door closed, placing a ladder in one room in the auditorium wing which has only one exit.

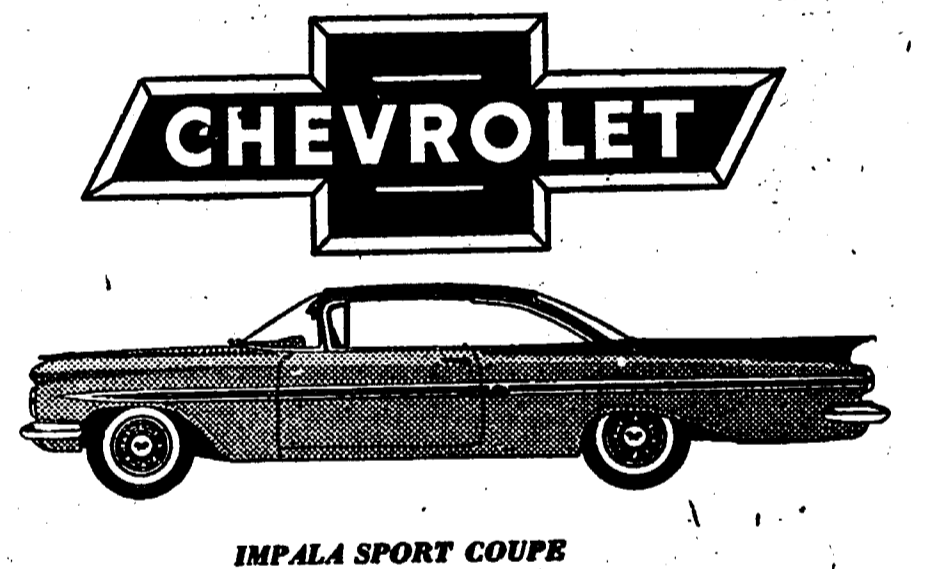

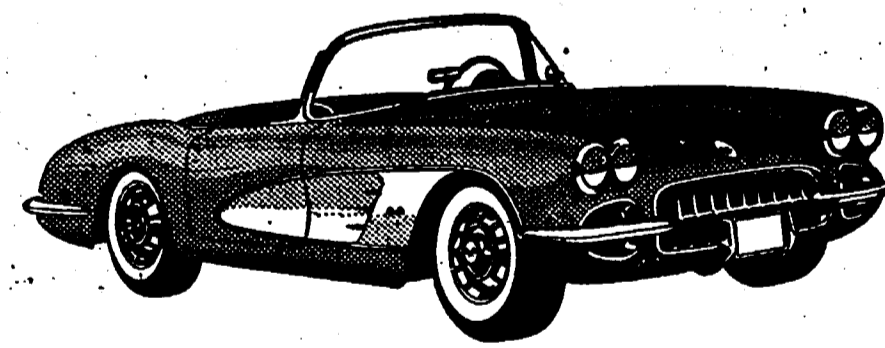

Stetson Named Head Basketball Coach Sipler Will Be Assistant Coach for College Quintet

The combination of Willis J. Stetson and Howard Sipler has been a winning one for Swarthmore College in the past. With the recent appointment of Stetson as head basketball coach and Sipler as assistant basketball coach for the 1958-1959 season Swarthmore hopes this combination will pay off again.

The two began their winning ways together as classmates at Swarthmore, Class of 1933, when they led the varsity capture to three victorious seasons. In the spring seasons Stetson and Sipler would put on their varsity baseball uniforms. Although Stetson stayed on

at Swarthmore after graduation as a member of the physical education department and in 1939 took over as varsity basketball coach, it was not until after World War II that the Stetson-Sipler combination became active again. With Sipler in the assistant coach slot and Stetson as head coach, the two led their post-war teams in the forties to some of the best seasons' records Swarthmore has earned in recent years.

In 1948 Stetson was appointed director of athletics. At the end of the next year's basketball season, the combination shifted as Sipler took over the responsibilities of head coach which he held until 1955, and Stetson as athletic director, dropped his basketball coaching duties and only remained coach of the golf team. At present Stetson is executive director of the Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Conference and chairman of the NCAA College Division Basketball Tournament, a position he has held since its inception in 1956.

Now, in 1958, with the illness of Richard Madison, who was head basketball coach for three seasons, Stetson and Sipler are back together again at Swarthmore. They start their season Wednesday against Dickinson at Carlisle. When asked about the team's prospects for the year, Stetson said, "We lack height to get the ball off the boards. We're trying to offset our height problem with speed and ball control."

Four lettermen will return to strengthen the Garnet team—Captain Bill Stauffer '59 from Coatesville, Allan Brown '59 from Woodbury, N.J., Herman Feldhusen '61 from Delmar, N.Y., and Pete Kroon '62 from Swarthmore.

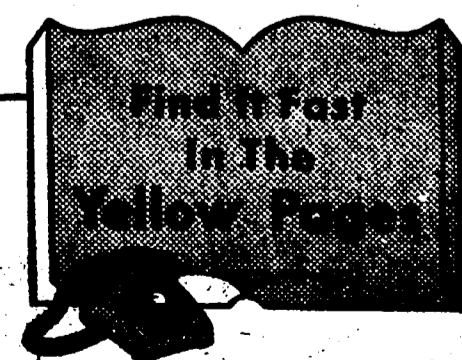

TURNER REPORTS GROWTH IN TAYLOR HOSPITAL FUND

A total of \$1,940 in pledges toward Taylor Hospital's building fund has been received during the past month, according to Assistant Administrator Robert J. Turner's report to the Hospital's Board of Managers at the November meeting.

Turner also announced that total pledges in the Completion Campaign Fund now total \$196,357. Of this amount \$115,798 has been paid since the campaign was launched last spring, with a total of \$79,558 yet to be received.

A high of 103 beds in service during the month set a new record, Taylor's Administrator R. H. Diamond reported. He also said that bed occupancy remained at 90 per cent for the period, and noted increases in the hospital's admissions, patient days, operations, and laboratory examinations.

His statistics included: 480 admissions, 3,014 patient days, 65 births, 385 dispensary cases, 3,287 laboratory tests, 181 cardiograms, 617 x-rays, and 223 operations.

Services Monday for Alfred P. Smalley

Postmaster for 15 Years Died Friday in Wayne

Alfred P. Smalley, postmaster of Swarthmore from August 23, 1933 to his retirement on August 31, 1948, died Friday morning at his home 131 Walnut avenue, Wayne.

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Along with the genial relationships he established with the entire adult population of the Borough as Postmaster, Mr. Smalley was in special rapport with the children who knew the secret sign which admitted them through the lobby door marked "Postmaster" from which they emerged with their own choice of wrapped hard candies.

He had an area wide reputation as a gardener. During the war his victory garden was extensive and supplied friends and neighbors with superior quality produce, as well as ground used by four families for victory gardens. His special pride was in long podded and succulent pole beans. Flowers from the Smalley garden brightened many business houses in season. Another hobby was wood carving; his carved and painted birds were cherished.

He was the oldest member of the Forest Green Masonic Lodge No. 91, Clayton, N. J., and a member of the Postmasters' Association of Delaware County. He was a direct descendant from passengers of the Mayflower on both sides of his family and, although he belonged to no society, he maintained a close and lively interest in the history of the United States. He was an articulate and devout Democrat by political conviction.

Born in Clayton, N.J. in 1876, he was the son of Levi and Mary Ann Fisher Smalley. (Clayton was originally known as Fislerville and noted for the Fislerville Glass Works.) In 1895 he married Clara A. Stewart. They had two sons, the elder Alfred P. Smalley, Jr., a young artist of great promise who was killed in World War I. His widow, Janet Smalley, author and illustrator, lived at 309 Yale avenue for many years. A grandson Everett Smalley, 2nd, died in the Korean conflict.

For many years, Mr. Smalley manufactured builders' supplies, with headquarters in Montgomery County. When a branch office was set up in Wilmington, Del., Mr. Smalley moved his family to a central point between the two and came to Swarthmore in 1922. Mr. Smalley is survived by his wife, a son Everett, and by two grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Wayne Presbyterian Church at 2 o'clock, Monday. Interment was in Clayton.
