## Two Wrongs Do Make a Right

### Therefore Teacher Can Be Paid

At a special meeting of the Swarthmore-Rutledge School Board at 6 p.m. Wednesday evening Dr. Harry Kingham, superintendent of schools, pointed out that in the transferral of Mrs. Mildred Brain from first grade teacher to elementary reading specialist a provision of salary for her had inadvertently been overlooked in the budget for next year. However, the fact that over all salary increases among the faculty for the next school year do not become effective until September and they had been calculated at the new rate from the beginning of the new budgetary year, July 5, will just about make up the deficit, Kingham explained to the relief of Board members (and doubtless Mrs. Brain).

Tuition rates for non-resident students set for next year reflected slightly higher costs in local education: kindergarten which had been \$175 will be \$190; elementary grades which were \$350 will be \$380; and high school students (or rather their parents) will pay \$570 instead of the previous year's \$560. ## Seahorses Outswim Hurricane Brenda

### Saturday Events Boost Club Rating

Swarthy continued to smile broadly late last week as his Swarthmore Swim Club team added another eight points in diving and 44 points in swimming events to ensure a final sixth place in the 1960 Suburban Swimming League Championships (last year it stood eighth, and in 1958, seventh).

Last Thursday night Beth Purcell placed fourth and Richard McCurdy sixth in intermediate girls and boys diving classifications. Friday Judy Courtney took third in junior girls diving. Then all age groups proved they were as indomitable as the elements Saturday morning, midjets and intermediates swimming to gain 24 points at East Whiteland pool and seniors and juniors for an additional point at Marple-Newtown, right in the middle of Hurricane Brenda.

Taking fourth in midjet boys breaststroke (46.7) and second in backstroke (41.5) Jack Cushing not only erased Richard McCurdy's old Swarthmore breaststroke record of 46.8 but moved his own Swarthmore backstroke record up from 41.8. Jack thus moves into a new kind of distinction, being the only person to ever simultaneously hold the team records in all four strokes, (Continued on Page 5)

## Geo. Ewing Celebrates 72nd Birthday

### Local Resident Is Oldest Practicing Phila. Architect

George M. Ewing of Columbia avenue, one of Philadelphia's oldest practicing architects, had an anniversary yesterday and as part of the observance was presented with a 72-candle birthday cake by his office staff.

Now completing his 48th year as an architect, Mr. Ewing was graduated from Drexel Institute of Technology in 1912. In 1948, two sons, George, Jr., of Wayne and Alexander of Wallingford, became partners of the architectural and engineering firm which bears his name.

Born in Philadelphia on August 4, 1888, Mr. Ewing and his family moved to Chester when he was very young. He attended the Chester public schools, going from grammar school directly to Drexel Institute. In 1928 Mr. Ewing and his wife, the former Mary Christine Dodds, of Narberth, moved to Swarthmore.

Mr. Ewing is a member of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church and has been active in the Presbytery of the Philadelphia Synod for many years. He served on the Swarthmore Borough Council for eight years, and belongs to numerous professional organizations, including the American Institute of Architects.

Since the day when Mr. Ewing started out with Karcher and Smith, Architects, of Philadelphia, until he founded his own firm in 1938, the problems of his clients have become his own problems, and whether the company's account is a small parish in a remote suburban area, or a costly government construction, the knowing hand of George M. Ewing, Sr., is never far from the working blueprint.

## Arts Center Instructor Attends Puppet Festival

Emma Louise Warfield of Springfield, a charter member of Puppeteers of America, is serving as chairman of Puppets in the World of Therapy at the Puppet Festival to be held at the Detroit Institute of Arts, August 1 through August 6. ### Whittier Place Mother's Heroic Rescue In Vain

The Swarthmore Fire Company enjoyed a fatality-free record, from its inception in 1907 until Thursday of last week when double tragedy struck quickly and inexorably despite the bravest and best efforts of a mother to save the lives of her two youngest children.

The home of Dr. Neal A. Weber at 1 Whittier place was a quiet one at 3:30 on the afternoon of July 28. All but the father of the Striemer family, which is occupying the dwelling for the summer (the Webers having gone to Argentina for two years), had gathered for refreshments. There was Mrs. Wilda Striemer, 37, and the four Striemer children, Katherine (Kathy) 11, Charles 10, Keith 7, and Jeffrey 5. Soon the younger boys asked for some potato chips to take out and eat in the backyard. Given the chips they departed from the group. Shortly afterward screams emanated. (Continued on Page 7)

### 200 From United States To Attend National Conference

Three Swarthmoreans, Linda De-Prophetis, Charlotte Brodhead and Sue Middleton will leave tomorrow morning from Beverly Hills Junior High School, in Upper Darby, along with many other boys and girls from surrounding areas, for a bus trip to Colorado sponsored by the Young Life Program. Their destination will be the Frontier Ranch on the slopes of Mount Princeton, in the Colorado Rockies.

The group will be accompanied by staff personnel and additional counselors. En route they will stop in Kansas, Colorado Springs, Colo.; at night they will stay in motels.

The trip will include a week of traveling and a week at the ranch. Approximately 200 young people from all over the United States will attend the conference. During their stay horseback riding, swimming, hikes, and special entertainment will be provided; round-ups, or group discussions will be held frequently.

Sue was the only recipient of a free trip from this area. She was elected as Swarthmore's "Mag Hag" to sell subscriptions and sold more than 100 per cent. She was presented with this award in May at a ceremony held at the Conestoga High School.

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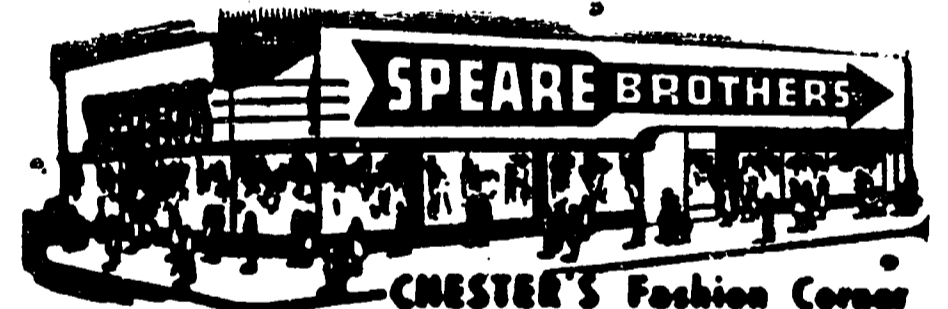
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
