Once again, a child's-eye view of life will be given; the audience as Christopher Robin and his friends debate and philosophize upon the problems of their world.



'Puppets for Adults' To Open Sunday

Color Photographic Prints Also on Display at Arts Center
 An unusual exhibition of the creations, paintings and books of internationally and nationally known puppeteers, will open on Sunday at the Community Arts Center, Rogers lane, Wallingford.

T. B. Assoc. Reports More Cases, Less Deaths

Higher Rate Reflects
Improved Case
Reporting

Sixty-six more cases of tuberculosis were reported in Delaware County last year over 1957, the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association announced Thursday.

The figures for 1958 from State Health Department reports were 182 male and 121 female cases for a total of 303. This compares with 169 male and 68 female cases reported for the previous year.

The final tabulations bore out figures released last December which showed that 247 cases were reported for the first nine months of last year as compared with 237 for a similar period in 1957. The number of deaths from tuberculosis probably will be lower, the reports indicate. For the first nine months of 1958, there were 23 deaths. For all of 1957, there were 40 deaths. Fatality figures are not complete for last year.

Dr. H. Armin Stecher, chairman of the Tuberculosis Committee of the Medical Society and board member of the Tuberculosis Association, credited the lower death rate to improved treatment methods and case finding procedures. The rise in the reported tuberculosis rate, he explained, does not necessarily mean tuberculosis is getting out of hand. He noted that 67 of the reported cases last year came from state mental hospitals. Dr. Stecher also said that officials believe the rise in reported cases reflects the efforts of the Pennsylvania Division of Tuberculosis Control to improve case reporting throughout the State.





School Authority Signs Basic Contracts

Work to Begin Immediately, Completion Scheduled in Nine Months

The Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School Authority, meeting Friday night in the Junior High School Building, approved and signed the four basic contracts for the reconstruction of the main high school building. This action followed by 24 hours, the receipt of notices from Harrisburg concerning the necessary prior approval by the Department of Public Instruction, of the lease agreement.

Since the opening of construction bids several weeks ago, there has been much activity centering about the arrangements for the bond issue, using the money received from fire insurance policies to defray some of the expense of the new building. A bond issue of \$620,000 has recently been sold to Kidder, Peabody and Company, thus providing the funds. With the lease arrangements between the Authority and the School District officially approved, the Authority accepted the four low bids for basic construction and authorized the officers, Robert N. Hilkert, vice chairman and John C. MacAlpine, Jr., secretary, to sign the necessary contracts and documents. They were:

1, General Construction, Daniel B. VanCampen Corporation of Philadelphia \$374,231; 2, Heating and Ventilating, Edward S. Green of Edgmont, \$28,860; 3, Plumbing, Hirsch, Arkin, Pinehart, Inc., of Philadelphia \$28,880; and 4, Electrical, Joseph C. Madden, Jr. of Clifton Heights \$47,120.

Since the contractors submitted the bids, various bonds had been completed and signed in the interim and are now in the hands of the Authority, work can begin immediately and should be completed in approximately nine months.

School Authority Signs Basic Contracts

- 2, Heating and Ventilating, Edward S. Green of Edgmont, \$52,350;
- 3, Plumbing, Hirsch, Arkin, Pinchurst, Inc., of Philadelphia \$28,880; and
- 4, Electrical, Joseph C. Madden, Jr. of Clifton Heights \$47,120.

Since the contractors submitted the bids, various bonds had been completed and signed in the interim and are now in the hands of the Authority, work can begin immediately and should be completed in approximately nine months.

Why Be a Republican Organization Man?

March 19 is Registration Day in Swarthmore. We therefore ask those who are Democrats by conviction and vote to consider the good reasons for registering Democratic.

Each election shows a Democratic vote in Swarthmore far in excess of the Democratic registration. This has been regularly true in both national and local elections. In many cases these votes are cast by consistent Democratic voters who have not, however, registered Democratic.

Both Delaware County and the Borough of Swarthmore have endured years of one-party—Republican Party—rule. Americans have always believed in two-party politics, and the need for two-party politics is clear in the example of Delaware County. Ours is a county experiencing the suburban explosion common in the mid-twentieth century. It is run by a government trying to get by on the wisdom of the 1920's, responsive only to particular pressures, sparing no thought or energy for the pressing problems of the present and future. It is run by a party machine of the classical type now found only in large and underprivileged cities. Only a two-party system can effectively raise the issues of today and tomorrow. Only a two-party system can effectively challenge the administrative laxity of yesterday and today.

Delaware County today stands closer to a creative two-party politics than at any time in recent history. Yet, a two-party system cannot be built on votes alone; it is understandable that the party in power regards the registration figures as the real indicator of effective competition and challenge. This means that the Democrat who actually registers Democratic registers a challenge to corruption and complacency and strikes a harder blow for progressive local government.

We will not claim—as does the Republican machine—that our party in Delaware County is everything it should be. In fact, it suffers from the problems that plague every long-time minority party. But ours is a party that welcomes those who want to take part in local government. We of the Borough Democratic Committee ask such people to register, and join with us to make the Democratic Party a creative and effective challenge at the local level.

Some people rationalize their Republican registration on the ground that they are fighting the good fight for decent Republican candidates. This has always been a losing fight in Delaware County. Our undistinguished current Congressman is one of a long and undistinguished series; his easy victory in last spring's primary was only another in a monotonous series of machine walkovers. It should be clear by now that the Republican organization of Delaware County cannot be reformed from within; it must be challenged and beaten from without.

In the last analysis, people get the kind of government they want. Those in Swarthmore who consistently vote Democratic obviously don't want what they now have. Yet, by failing to register Democratic, they are helping to fasten one-party rule on the County of Delaware and the Borough of Swarthmore. Consistency for its own sake may not always be a virtue; consistency for the sake of effectiveness IS a virtue. After all, there is no particular virtue in conformity.

Students Compete in Math Camp Program



The Swarthmore offense showed good balance during this half, and the defense continued to haffle the Unionvillers.

Twenty points by 6'4" Waible of the "farmers market" was high for the game, but Ronnie Herberster was close behind with 18. Dave Grogan scored 9, Bob Dawes 2, Jay Lord 15, Joe Moran 9, and Ronnie Taylor 4. Fred Schaeffer and Butch Hofmann were the others who saw action in a game that made it plain that Swarthmore was by far a better team than any in the Southern Chester County League in which Unionville had gone undefeated.





'The Devil's Disciple' Runs Through Saturday

A large, competent cast and production staff blend happily under the direction of William W. Price to offer George Bernard Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple" before Player's Club audiences this week. Shaw, like ripe olives and avocados, for which a taste must be cultivated, does not tax the appetite of his viewers in this play with bites too large to swallow and ensuing indigestion, for this is truly a melodrama from start to finish.

The locale of the play is New England in 1777 and is historically accurate except for some license taken with a few characters, whose counterparts are legion, in order to fabricate the story. Particular note and credit must be given to the interesting and ingenious sets of which there are five in three acts — an ambitious and large order in any theatre. One scene flows into another without awkward pauses or confusion. The stark and gloomy opening scene befits the moods of the leading characters, the Dudgeon family, their minister who has come to comfort them in their sorrow, and his pretty wife.

The embittered and grieving Mrs. Dudgeon, an arduous role is played with deep feeling by a newcomer to the Player's Club stage, Ingeborg Stephens. Philip Price as Richard Dudgeon "The Devil's Disciple" takes full charge when he is on stage and turns in a consistently good performance in a part requiring varying moods. William Whitlock is so real as Christy the morose son, it is difficult to believe he possesses a grain of intelligence.

Christine Palmer plays the sympathetic role of Essie naturally and sweetly. William Connor as the Presbyterian pastor gives the gentleness and firmness needed in his portrayal of conflicting emotions, and Ruth Radbill as his vacillating, insecure wife is real and appealing. Katrina Ives, a reliable performer, has a small part this time as Aunt William. Another oldtimer Arthur Doran as Uncle Titus is appreciated for his authentic English accent.

The club's imaginative set designer Hank Gayley comes from backstage to play Uncle William as does Nancy Carango who takes the part of Aunt Titus. George Carango as Lawyer Hawkins gives proper legal status to the reading of the will.

The colorful uniforms of the English soldiery brighten the stage in the last act and bring forth Bill Price as General Burgoyne who wears his part with an easy fit, poking fun and gibes at the military in true Shavian fashion.

Ben Hanson is officious and commanding as the British officer Major Swindon, as also is Mike Arcus as the sergeant.

Kenneth Miller as the First Soldier and Joseph Carango as the Second Officer make their initial appearance on stage. Nonspeaking but important parts to the overall effect are taken by Edward Conway, Second Soldier; Frank Starrett, First Officer; Maria Scatolina, Terry Beinkowski and Christa Price. The director's small grandson Christopher Price adds reality to the scene in which he appears in his first on the club's stage.

The simple and beautiful New England scene at the close, in which George Kearns appears as the Chaplain, and the 11th hour reprieve for the "Devil's Disciple" brings a fine finish to the evening's performance.


The celebration ended with the cutting of an inscribed gift birthday cake and tea, served under the chairmanship of Mrs. Charles W. Lukens.

LWV, Water Company Visit Crum Creek
League's Water Resources Study Results in 'Go-See' Trip

An outgrowth of the League of Women Voters national study of water resources was a meeting held on Tuesday with Kenneth Shull, vice-president of the public relations and water quality control departments of the Suburban Water Company. Present were LWV members from the Swarthmore and Nether Providence Leagues, representatives of the Citizens Council of Delaware County, the Nether Providence Planning Commission, and Swarthmore College.

At the suggestion of Dr. Maurice K. Goddard, secretary of Forests and Waters for Pennsylvania, who addressed the LWV on February 23 at Whittier House, the problem of pollution of Crum Creek by water treatment solids was referred to Mr. Moses, president of the Suburban Water Company. A subsequent meeting was arranged with Mr. Shull for a go-see-trip to Crum Creek.

It was agreed by the delegation and by Mr. Shull that Crum Creek in its present state, is neither a clean nor attractive stream, and that the odorous mud flats which appear at low water are undesirable. Some of the difficulty, it was thought, could be resolved if the Water Company changed or modified its method of water treatment. (Continued on Page 4)

Blood Donor Recruiters In Kick-off Rally Wed.

Committee, Callers Seek 125 Donors for April 30

Twenty-five of the 45 local blood recruitment callers working toward the Borough Red Cross Blood Donor Day on April 30, attended the kick-off rally Wednesday morning in the Woman's Club Lounge, called by Recruitment Chairman Mrs. Parker Stamford and her co-chairman Mrs. Johan Natvig. Mrs. H. Leroy McCune and Mrs. Corben Shute are chairmen of Blood Service for the Swarthmore Branch, American Red Cross.

Mrs. George Florman, chairman of the local branch, opened the meeting with a strong statement of the urgency of the callers' job. "It sounds easy to get 125 pints from almost 6000 residents, but it isn't. It is amazing how many people in this town filled with generous, civic minded persons do not realize Swarthmore's fortunate set-up with the Southeastern Chapter of the Red Cross by which emergency blood is assured without cost to every resident of the Borough if the Borough quota of 125 pints is met on April 30. From now until April 30, it's up to you recruiters."

Catherine McCarthy, field coordinator with the Southeastern Chapter, discussed the Red Cross blood recruitment program with the recruiters, clarifying many points dispassionately and answering the many questions asked. She reminded all that the Red Cross only meets needs, as shown by its initiation and early support of the tuberculosis seal campaign, the visiting nurse program, Braille transcriptions, from all of which the Red Cross withdrew when these programs were strong enough to carry on. Each withdrawal earns resentment, she said, but there are always other pressing needs not being met.

The Red Cross Blood Program was started to meet such a need during World War 2, discontinued at its close and resumed at the request of medical societies as the war lesson of blood's life saving power was put to use for civilians. When the tremendous need is satisfied in another way it is feasible that the Red Cross will withdraw, she added, but at the present time Red Cross collects blood less expensively. Henry Peirsol, Sr., Has Fatal Heart Attack

Advertising Man Resided Here 48 Years

Henry A. N. Peirsol, advertising manager of the Catholic Standard and Times, died suddenly of a heart attack in Philadelphia Monday morning. He had lived at 219 Lafayette avenue since 1911. He had not enjoyed perfect health for the past year.

The only child of William and Margaret Peirsol, he was born September 28, 1882 in Philadelphia and educated in the public schools there. Prior to going with the Catholic Standard and Times 29 years ago, he was with the advertising department of the old Philadelphia daily newspaper, The Record.

He was active for many years in the Pennsylvania National Guard, retiring with the rank of major. He had served as minority inspector of elections in the eastern precinct for the Democratic party.

A lineal descendant of John Rutledge, Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court in 1795 and a signer of the Constitution, Mr. Peirsol married Lillian Whiting Peterson of Lancaster in 1910. His wife died in January, 1939.

Surviving are two sons, Henry, Jr., of the Lafayette avenue address and John W. of Excelsior, Minn., and six grandchildren, Gloria and Sandra of Swarthmore and John, Jr., G. Winant, Constance and Jean of Excelsior.

sively than any other agency (in this area the cost is now \$6 per pint as compared with AAYB's \$10).

This is due to the enormous number of volunteers who aid in the work. The Red Cross blood program which supplies 40 percent of blood used for the aged, ill and operative, etc., needs of the country costs \$30,000,000 out of the annual budget of \$85,000,000. This cost is solely for the professional staff involved in the bloodmobile and processing operation and the equipment used there; the clerical, recruiting, can-teening, nursing aid is contributed by volunteers.

"Our records show that it takes 1000 telephone calls to get 250 donors on list to give 125 pints of blood. You will get every possible excuse. Two of the funniest we have recorded are 'O, I can't possibly give blood, my husband just bought a Cadillac' and 'O, I can't give, I just had a baby and anyway, I'm too old', but you must know your facts and quietly repeat the fact that Red Cross donors give hoping not to use it themselves but for others."

In answer to questions Miss McCarthy said that Swarthmore's program of assurance of emergency blood to every resident is one of four or five in the country, always dependent on the Borough's maintaining its donor quota and originally offered only because the Borough is small and many of its residents are covered by industry blood programs.

"Please remember that when you need blood, you must let Mrs. McCune know. The Red Cross cannot know you are in the hospital unless you do that. If you run up against things you do not understand about hospital administration charges, please call Mrs. McCune, too; they can often be clarified, often straightened out. This is still a young program. We are going to meet flaws, but the Red Cross is trying to do a good, equitable job."

At present, solids such as charcoal and alum, added to the water for purification, are allowed to settle out and are then discharged into Crum Creek, at hourly intervals.

Because the volume and rate of flow of the Creek is insufficient to carry off these suspended materials, much of it is deposited in the stream bed and along the banks, to be carried into bathtubs and drinking water after a heavy rainfall.

Dredging the stream bed would improve its appearance and perhaps the rate of flow, and this would concern landowners along the stream, who are Smedley Park, under the supervision of the Delaware County Park Commission, the Swarthmore Paper Products, Swarthmore College, and various private owners.

Trevor Shaw Talks to Presbyterian Women

Pioneering African Publisher Visits Henry McCorkle While Touring U.S.

Trevor Shaw, former sports editor with the largest daily in New Zealand who laid aside a career to travel with his family to Africa to undertake the publications of magazines written by and for Africans, spoke to two circles of the Presbyterian Church here Wednesday afternoon in McCook Hall. Shaw was introduced by Park avenue resident Henry McCorkle, managing editor of Presbyterian Life, who is Shaw's host while he is on a three month lecture tour of the United States.

Mr. and Mrs. Shaw, both journalists, had followed the work of Frank Laubach with deep interest when they learned of an opportunity for journalistic work in African missions and went to Nigeria in 1950 to found the African Challenge, second largest English magazine in Africa and Asia and largest Christian magazine in those areas.

They were then invited to the missions of French speaking Africa and began Envol, a magazine in French. They work at present with missions in the Belgian Congo, the heart of Africa, where they have four monthly magazines successfully meeting the problems of turbulent times and of native staffing and circulation in an area 6,000,000 square miles.

"We hunt Africans to write the voice of Christian Africa to their own people. We believe that God gave to Christians the gifts of leadership. We believe that God called us to this work; that it is a matter for prayer.

"We are set to leap in advance of editing and publishing problems; we will not do a second rate job. We believe that our message is the most important message, therefore our job must be first rate. We believe, also, that nothing but the best is good enough for Africa."

Shaw related the story of Suzanne Freitas, young and able first African woman journalist. Her family had been Christian for several generations. The Shaws and a missionary art teacher encouraged her education. She wrote her first article "Who's Fault is It?", a discussion of tribal marriage customs, for Envol and was later hired by a local newspaper to write a column about the life of women and now does a weekly Congo radio broadcast. This, with her regular contribution to the native magazines on women's interests gives her a tremendous Christian impact. Shaw asked the Swarthmore women to remember Suzanne Freitas in their prayers. She is about to marry a Christian doctor and poet.

The non-profit corporation formed by the Shaws, the Societe Littéraire d'Afrique in Leopoldville, Belgian Congo, is registered with both the Belgian and French governments. It will, Shaw said, be turned over legally to the Africans for full control upon his return from this tour. Africans now decide upon the contents of the magazines, write, edit, and distribute them. Circulation in the tens of thousands secures excellent advertising contracts. Readership reaches into the tens of thousands as copies are passed around to acquaintances.

The meeting was a joint one arranged by the chairmen, Mrs. Frank G. Keenen and Mrs. Ted Anthony. Mrs. J. V. S. Bishop presented McCorkle to introduce Shaw whose dedication and quiet simplicity moved all as he related his answer to the question "What can the West do to contribute to this need?"

Booklet on United Nations

John Logue of Yale avenue has recently written a booklet entitled, "The Great Debates on Charter Reform: A Proposal to Strengthen the United Nations." Thomas K. Finletter, former Secretary of the Air Force, wrote the preface to the booklet.

The booklet calls for a re-examination of the arguments for and against revising the United Nations Charter. Mr. Logue agrees with those who hold that basic changes are especially necessary in the UN's peace-keeping machinery. But he contends that it is equally important to give the UN some power to aid the economic development of the less-developed nations.

In the preface Mr. Finletter says "Some readers may object that Mr. Logue's proposals are idealistic. They seem to me grimly realistic. . . I hope that this article will be widely and closely read." Mr. Logue is a lecturer in political science at the University of Pennsylvania.



College Mermaids Win 13th Swim Competition

It was a lucky 13 for the women's swimming team of Swarthmore College as the Garnet Mermaids finished off their 13th undefeated year in dual meet competition last Friday by downing the Temple University team in the Temple pool. The Swarthmore swimmers now have a winning streak 93 dual meets long.

The members of this year's squad come from all over the United States — Florida, Maine, California, Louisiana, Virginia and Ohio, and-Freshman Queen Penny Jones has lived several years in Lagos, Nigeria, where her father is assigned to a post with the State Department.

Co-captain Penny Payson Simkin holds the pool record at Swarthmore and Bryn Mawr for the 50-yard freestyle and the butterfly, and the 50-yard freestyle record at Ursinus and Chestnut Hill and the 100-yard freestyle record at Swarthmore. In her freshman year Penny set the Eastern Intercollegiate record in the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events. She lost the 50-yard record the next year but broke her own record in the 100-yard freestyle event. Penny still holds this 100-yard freestyle record, and on March 14 she set a new record for the butterfly in the Intercollegiate Women's Swimming Championship. A senior and an English major from Maine, Penny is married to Swarthmore alumnus Peter Simkin, formerly of Wallingford. The couple lives in the borough.

The other co-captain, Sally Freedman hails from California, a continent apart from Penny Simkin. An economics major in the Swarthmore honors program, Sally won first place in intercollegiate competition in her freshman year.

The swimmers also won the intercollegiate women's swimming championship for the 11th straight time March 14 in the Abington pool. They have amassed 12 victories in the 14 years the competition has been held.
