Dr. Leonard Smidth of 305 Henry lane, Wallingford, died suddenly uly 20 at the home of friends in Purdys, N.Y. He was 60 on July 4.

Born in Schulenburg, Dr. Smidth ttended high school in Houston. ex., and was graduated from Rice istitute in 1921. He received his I.A. degree from Columbia in 1923 nd his Ph.D. from Columbia in 1925. Upon his graduation from olumbia he formed the Aldur Cororation, and in 1929 developed a ellulose compound known as aldur ylplast, a colorful and widey used lastic.

From 1931 until his retirement 1 1957, Dr. Smidth was with the Sylvania Electric Products Comrany, where he gained a repútaion as one of the nation's outstanding research chemists.

He was a member of Sigma Xi, the Society of the Plastics Industry, the American Chemical Society, Technical Association of the Pulp and Paper Industry, and a Fellow in the American Institute of Chemists and in the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Smidth is survived by his wife, Elizabeth May Smidth, his mother Mrs. Gertrude Smidth of Houston, and a brother Percy, also of Houston.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 22, at Katonah, N.Y. Burial took place the following day in Houston.




