No Referendum On School Bus

Paul R. Mccough of Rutledge has been notified by Alan Hunt, acting solicitor for the Swarthmore-Rutledge School Board, that there is no provision of law for enabling a referendum on the matter of a school bus. Mccough is spokesman for a group of Rutledge residents desiring a free school bus to transport that borough's children to the Swarthmore Elementary School, now that the Rutledge school has been disbanded.

A member of the group, attending last month's school board meeting, expressed desire for a public vote on the question and asked that the possibility be investigated. Mccough said Hunt reported that all school district expenditures over \$100 must be approved by a majority vote of the board, so that only in this way could public funds be allocated to pay for bus service.

Mccough said the Rutledge group plans to attend coming Board sessions and insist determined to continue until it is relieved of having to pay daily bus fares privately.

OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM

It has been said that the business of our community is education. Swarthmoreans all take pride in the fine reputation of the College as one of the very best institutions of higher learning. In the accomplishments of our public school system we also take great pride, but in addition we participate actively as mothers and fathers — and as citizens.

We have seen our high school devastated by fire — and out of the ruins has risen a splendid structure boasting the best in modern educational facilities. Through accident and subsequent retirement, our school lost its Supervising Principal — an able and devoted public servant as well as a warm friend and constant source of strength. After searching through nearly a hundred possible replacements from all parts of the country, the man with the best qualifications was found in Iowa and brought to Swarthmore as our educational and administrative leader. Under this able Super-

intendent our school continues to surge forward in its efforts toward the best in education at minimum cost.

In Swarthmore no tax dollars have been available for frills or for things which parents and friends can accomplish as individuals. Here, indeed, we have been blessed with townfolk who show an active interest in their school, who willingly participate in its work and in its play, and who also give their sympathetic understanding when problems arise which cannot always be ironed out overnight. These same townfolk have even shown remarkable forbearance in accepting the large tax increases which have been required in the recent past to rehabilitate and enlarge our plant and to further advance the educational program in our never-ending pursuit of excellence.

Let us carry on into the future these active and warm cooperative efforts which make possible the achievement of our common goals.

OUR BOROUGH GOVERNMENT

The policy of the present Republican Council has been to maintain Swarthmore as an outstanding residential community, providing good and efficient local government and sound business management at reasonable cost. Council is responsible for the Borough real estate tax, which is 18 mills or \$18 a year for each \$1000 of assessment. It is also responsible for a sewer rent of \$10 a year for each household. These rates have been unchanged since 1957.

By careful budgeting the present Council has been able to meet a number of extraordinary expenses during the past four years without any increase in tax rates. Among these:

- Benefits of the police pension fund have been broadened.
- A new pension fund for other Borough employees has been installed and most of the costs of benefits for past years' service have already been met.
- A firm of professional actuaries has been employed to maintain the pension funds on a sound basis.
- A new \$38,000 ladder truck has been purchased for the volunteer fire company.
- The quarters of the Swarthmore Public Library in Borough Hall have been air conditioned.
- The paving of Borough streets has been completed.
- A program for the continued care of street trees at public expense has been undertaken.

In addition to providing sound financial management, Council has co-operated with citizens in seeking solutions to a wide variety of community problems. These include:

ZONING — Council has carefully administered the Borough Zoning code to preserve the residential character of the community.

YOUTH — At the request of interested citizens, Council appointed a Youth Guidance Committee whose report was made freely available to all. (Council declined to appropriate tax money to publish the report as paid advertising.)

SAFETY — Council has provided new sidewalks, foot-bridges, and new traffic regulations to promote public safety, particularly of school children.

PRIVATE STREETS — Council proposed a plan for the Borough's taking over privately-owned streets in the Swarthmore Hills section on a basis which was fair to all residents of the Borough. This plan has not yet been accepted, but is still under consideration.

MANAGEMENT — Council has reorganized the executive staff of the Borough and brought about an efficient transition of management in connection with the retirement of Mr. Elliott Richardson, who had served 25 years as Borough Secretary.

AUDIT AND REPORT — The present Council has engaged a firm of outside public accountants to audit the books and finances of the Borough each year, and has published a complete annual report.

POLICE and FIRE NEWS

Swarthmore had a demonstration Friday, October 13, of what would happen if both of its schools caught fire at once. The local Fire Company celebrated Fire Prevention Week by calling a surprise drill shortly before 2 p.m. Assisted by Springfield, Morton and Rutledge it divided men and equipment between the elementary school and the junior-senior high school. When the excited students and faculty streamed from the buildings they were is-

sued an invitation to bring their families to an open house, with cider and donuts, that night at the Fire House.

On October 5 at 5:22 p.m. a chain collision occurred on Swarthmore avenue between the railroad and College avenue. Police said Carol J. Donohue of Norwood was driving east on Swarthmore avenue when his car struck the rear of one in front of him driven by Ronald Bowden of Morton, pushing it into the rear of another driven by Richard J. Restrepo of Dartmouth circle which had halted

ed behind a bus at the railroad. Donohue's car sustained damages of the whole front and had to be towed away. Bowden's car was damaged back and front and Restrepo's in the rear.

SCHOOL BOARD IN REGULAR SESSION

The Swarthmore-Rutledge School Board in regular meeting Wednesday of last week, accepted the resignation of Mrs. Frances Stokes Hoekstra, hired last spring to inaugurate a French and German language program in the fourth and fifth grades. German was dropped from the proposed program when it was discovered in the summer that Mrs. Hoekstra was expecting the birth of a child next March. Mrs. Audrey Mae Reece Morrow of Springfield, 1959 graduate of Saint Rose College who taught in New Hartford, N. Y., from September 1959 to January 1960, was elected to carry on with the French classes when Mrs. Hoekstra leaves January 1.

Mrs. Jane Kepner Jackson, substitute teacher of girls' physical education, was placed on a regular basis and Mrs. Virginia Bosler Middleton of Media, was named as her part-time assistant. Paul McCouch, spokesman for Rutledge parents desiring a free school bus, told the board it was unfair in taking advantage of every other kind of Federal subsidy there is (building aid, medical, dental, food programs, funds for education of children of Federal employees, and even compensation for having become a union district with Rutledge) and then refusing to make use of available reimbursement for providing a school bus for Rutledge's elementary children who must attend school in Swarthmore. He said he was willing to pay his half of the bus fare personally, in addition to his taxes, if the board would collect the other half from the State. The board agreed to have its solicitor corroborate its contention that the State would not reimburse unless the unreimbursed portion came from tax funds, as Mr. McCouch contended.

The board received a letter from Edward Coslett, Jr., Swarthmore Hills, approving its decision against free school bus.

The directors approved the resolution of the Jenkintown School District in contesting the new State redistricting law and also adopted a statement of its own which was published in this newspaper last week.

Other actions included: Authorization of payment of \$2000 balance due Van-Cor Inc., for a classroom floor laid two years ago but not considered acceptable by George Ewing, school architect until now, with the provision that Van-Cor drop a pending law suit and assume its costs. The acceptance of \$200 gift from last year's Garnet Canteen with appreciation of it and of the long service of Mrs. Mary Bloom in heading the Canteen. In forwarding the money, Mrs. Bloom suggested it might be used for improved lighting along the walk and parking lot at the Rutgers School where Canteen meets. The property committee will study this possibility. The board authorized the continued use of

the school's all-purpose room for the Canteen which has now been turned over to the local Recreation Association.

Authorizing the Swarthmore Tennis Club to proceed with resurfacing the two street-side courts behind the high school if it can be done within the Club budget. This would provide a facility for use of tennis playing children of the school district and also adult members of the club who are now limited to summer use of the college courts.

Approving expenditure of \$103 for three-year burglary insurance premiums covering elementary and high schools.

Authorizing attendance at various Philadelphia and out-of-state conferences by staff and faculty members including Mrs. Hanna Mathews, high school English teacher, who will represent the Pennsylvania State Education Association at the National Education Association Curriculum Conference in Washington, D. C., December 3 to 6.

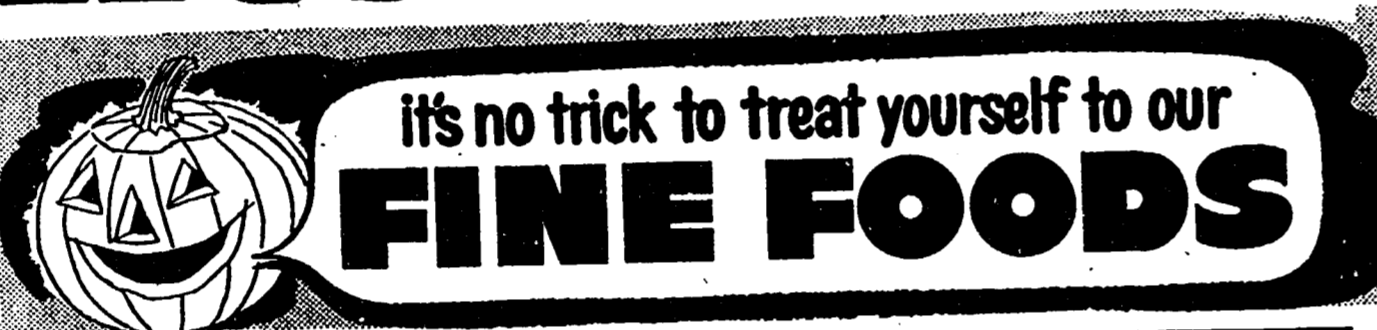

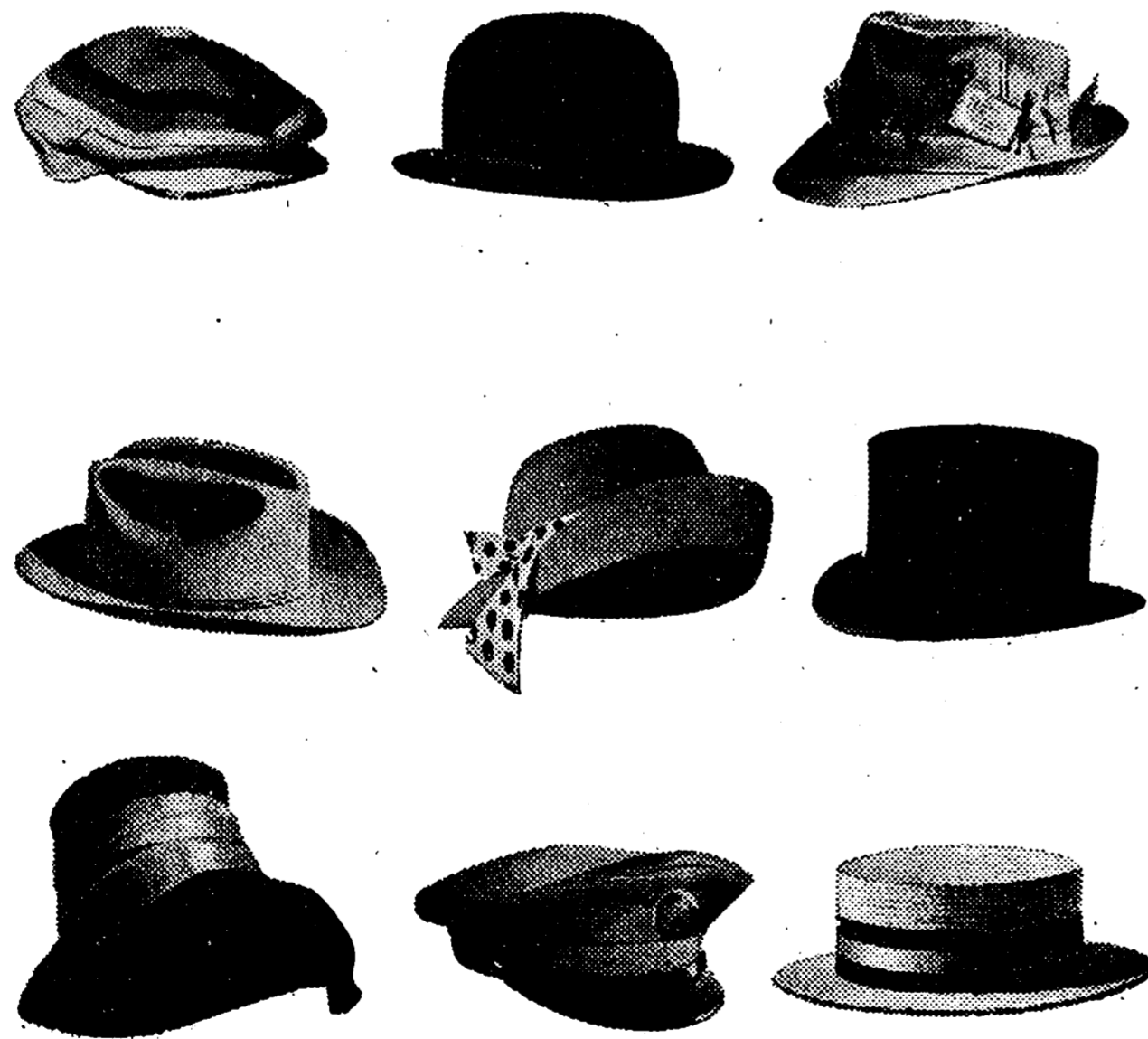

To the Editor:
The November 7 election may seem to be largely a local affair, without any important issue and with the voting preferences confined to personalities. But there is an issue of overshadowing importance. It will not be on the ballot but it is present in any contest that involves a choice between the two political parties in this area. It is the question of whether we are for or against the encroachment of the Philadelphia Democratic organization into Delaware and other suburban counties.

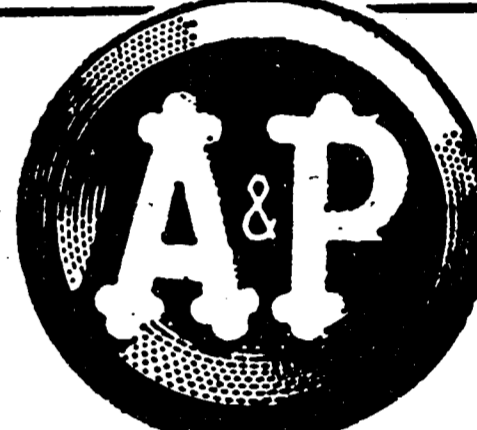

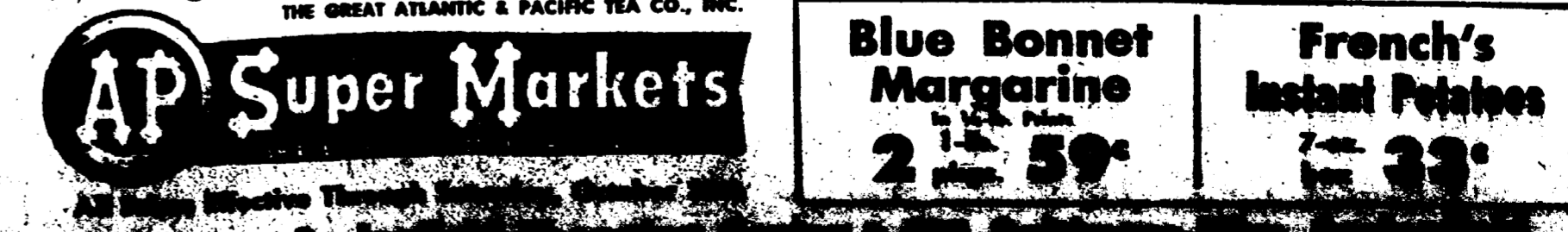

FOR JUSTICE of the PEACE

Since the adult residents of the Borough of Swarthmore are above the average in their respect for and obedience of the laws of the Commonwealth and the ordinances of the Borough, they have little reason, from a purely personal viewpoint, to concern themselves about the qualifications of the person whom they elect to the judicial office of Justice of the Peace in the coming election.

As parents, however, and as deeply concerned citizens who caused to have made and published the thorough study of the problems of lack of respect and obedience of law demonstrated by the behavior of too large a percentage of our juvenile residents, these same adult residents have the opportunity to make a significant contribution toward establishing a higher respect for the law and the judicial process in our community.

While Justices of the Peace are considered members of the Minor Judiciary to distinguish them from judges and justices of the higher courts, the Justices of the Peace of Swarthmore are the members of the judiciary before whom every person who is accused of violating any ordinance or law within the limits of the Borough must appear for a hearing.

It is hardly necessary to emphasize the great importance of this first impression of the judicial process, especially to those of tender years. Election of the better qualified and more competent of the candidates offered on the ballot is a duty which calls for something more deliberative than the pulling of a party lever.
