There were two specific recommendations on page three of this report; (1) the three and a half acres of land on Yale Avenue between the Strath-Haven Inn and the dam, and (2) the property owned by the Vertol Division of Boeing Aircraft Corporation, which we hope Council has taken into consideration. During the two years since this report was compiled, the amount of open space in and around Swarthmore has steadily decreased, and will shrink still further if action by the Borough is not taken in the immediate future to

problems of population growth

preserve the little there is left. We understand that Springfield Township has already acquired three acres of the Vertol property, mentioned above, for recreational use. There are still at least two acres available. It is our understanding that this property was obtained by lease under terms favorable to the Township. Since the original Survey suggested, (page 2, paragraph 6), that the Vertol property might be obtained by lease or even gift, we are anxious to learn whether the Borough Council has made any effort to secure part of the land by means other than outright purchase.

The League has felt strongly in recent years that a town of this size needs to support an active Planning Commission. In taking prompt action to implement the Apartment Conversion Report. Borough Council would also be recognizing this need. In addition, we would like to suggest that our Council take any steps necessary to preserve possible recreation and open land sites, in and adjacent to Swarthmore, and that cooperation with Springfield Township Commissioners could serve to protect such land on our common borders, (i.e. the Vertol strip and the Morrow Quarry).

"Jolly Old Saint Nicholas Lean your ear this way: Don't you tell a single soul

What I'm going to say.

Jimmy wants a choo choo train-Billy ---- wants a sled;

Susan---- wants a Chatty Kathy-Michael wants a bag of pegs-

Yellow, green, blue, red -- " and then comes to an abrupt end. Reading these incomplete lines on a train rushing through wreath hung cities and towns throws an unreal haze over the pre-holiday hurry and scurry left behind for a brief time. A wonderful thing, the gift of a few hours! Nov there is time to think about Christmas, to remember, to assess, to anticipate. For since Sunday, when the soaring notes of a trumpet playing Purnell's "Trumpet Tune and Bell Symphony" opened the Christmas gates, anticipation has been trembling to break through.

Among greeting cards is one with these verses by Paul Engle titled "The Wreath."

> "Now Christmas comes Leafy and floral. Poinsettia, pine The mountain laurel.

Now wreaths of fir. Of spruce or pine. Hang on the door With a green shine

Even the sun, On earth beneath. Turns in space Like a gold wreath.

And men who give Love and goodwill, Are a live wreath On town and hill."

Time now to remember men of love and goodwill- "live wreaths". First, a clergyman for 43 years, serving large pastorates without assistant or secretary, endlessly calling in welcome, in comfort, yet finding the time and energy to make a ceremony of centering home Christmases around the verses from Luke and to read Mr. Pickwick, Ebenezer Scrooge and The First Snowfall into familiar holiday essentials.

In the community in which some 40 years of living have flown by there have been and are many persons of love and goodwill whose services, unpaid, unsung have become a "living wreath." At Christmas, it is possible to see that issues rise, are met, subside with differences courteously borne; that recognition of service speaks just as powerfully, perhaps even more persuasively, than attack. It is integrity that matters and men of conscience must do what they must do even at the cost of criticism. It is always easier to stand with the majority than to stand against it. as any minority opinion or party knows well. One can count in this community men of wisdom, men prominent in industry, men of culture; many of these are also men of love and goodwill. These are qualities vitally in demand at Christmas

The condition of the world, broadcast by newsprint or by airwaves, relaxes no taut nerves. Goa seized by India. whose Nehru has preached neutrality and peace; Sukarno greedy for Dutch New Guinea; racial unrest and a campaign for fall-out shelters in our own country! Alarm and confusion cloud the backdrop of Christmas, 1961. Even though history shows the Roman world in a like state at the time of the coming of the Christ Child, the evidence is that in the years since then man has not achieved the fine skill of practicing brotherhood.

Still, Christmas with its emphasis on faith and miracle, its age-old story of the radiant hope surrounding a small baby, manger born, and shepherds and wisemen, star-led, brings a lift to all. Once more, there is hope and love and goodwill abroad in the world of the heart, where else is Christmas? There is comfort in friendship and in family

Although the residents of Morganwood are retired, they are far from being inactive. Already they have proved to be valuable citizens and leaders in Swarthmore and other communities. Several have already served as substitute or interim pastors of vacant churches. Some

have proved their wisdom as personal counsellors and as group advisers. Several have delivered addresses on international relations to clubs. Some are Bible Scholars and have shared their knowledge.

If the Blue Route is directed along Crum Creek, it will demolish four of these Morganwood homes, brush the side walls of a fifth, and prevent the building of two others under contract for construction this winter. The roar of racing motors and the rumble of heavy trucks would render all the homes of these retired persons unlivable. Now it is obvious that an individual family could resettle itself somewhere else without being completely disrupted. But Morganwood-on-Crum-Creek as

an institution of the United Presbyterian Churchwas located here because of its many fine assets for retired group living. Such a site, especially qualified o meet the needs of elderly minsters and missionaries, cannot e easily duplicated in eastern ennsylvania.

The problem is not merely reettlement of five single famlies. But it means the ruin of this entire church settlement, in which the church has already invested a half-million dollars. it fair to wreck this first venture f the church in group living? Is it reasonable? Most of the discussion of the Blue Route centers around its economic values. Roads have brought prosperity to the American farmer and to others. But is material prosperity the only goal? The U.S.A. was founded on the democratic principle of the value of the individual. Human personality is the most important asset

of America.

One of the greatest fruits of he labors of these missionaries is international good will. These ministers have also put a plus element into many communities. Shall we now reward their lifetime service by destroying their church homes? The church has built Morganwood - on - Crum-Creek not only for the present retirees but also for oncoming generations of retired ministers and missionaries.
