BOARD APPROVES NEW DISTRICT AGAINST LAW BUT LIKES NEIGHBORS The board of directors of

the Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School District Tuesday night reiterated its dissatisfaction in general with the 1961 State law requiring reorganization of school districts into a few larger consolidated units, but expressed approval of the Delaware County School Directors' plan for this school district. The County Board's tentative redistricting set-up for the entire County, as announced last week, combines Swarthmore-Rutledge with Nether Providence, Media and Rose Valley. Swarthmore High School will become a junior high school. The local board revealed that it had communicated with the County Board over a month ago indicating its opposition to the new law but stating that if reorganization was to be carried out it felt the joining of this district to Nether Providence and Media was the most feasible on the basis of its studies of the problem. The County Boards' recommendation now goes to the State Council of Education. The new districts become effective in 1965 unless the law is changed during the 1963 session of the legislature.

Employee Flu Shots By a four to three vote the local board decided to provide two flu immunization shots to each employee of the School District. Cost to the District for the vaccine was estimated at \$120. School nurses will administer the innoculations. Action came when Superintendent Harry Kingham passed along the suggestion of School

Doctor J. Albright Jones. Those who voted for the unsolicited fringe benefit for the employees stated they felt it would result in less expenditure for substitute teachers and less interruption of the regular school program for students. Remarks about "creeping Socialism'' were made by those voting against the measure. In other action before ad-





BOARD APPROVES **NEW DISTRICT** AGAINST LAW BUT LIKES NEIGHBORS The board of directors of

the Swarthmore-Rutledge Unior School District Tuesday night reiterated its dissatisfaction in general with the 1961 State law requiring reorganization of school districts into a few larger consolidated units, but expressed approval of the Delaware County School Directors' plan for this school district. The County Board's tentative redistricting set_up for the entire County, as announced last week, combines Swarthmore-Rutledge with Nether Providence. Media and Rose Valley. Swarthmore High School will become a junior high school. The local board revealed that it had communicated with the County Board over a month ago indicating its opposition to the new law but stating that if reorganization was to be carried out it felt the joining of this district to Nether Provi dence and Media was the most feasible on the basis of its studies of the problem. The County Boards' recommendation now goes to the State Council of Education. The new districts become effective in 1965 unless the law is changed during the 1963 session of the legislature.

Employee Flu Shots By a four to three vote the local board decided to provide two flu immunization shots to each employee of the School District. Cost to the District for the vaccine was estimated at \$120. School nurses will administer the innoculations. Action came when Superintendent Harry Kingham passed along the suggestion of School

Doctor J. Albright Jones. Those who voted for the unsolicited fringe benefit for the employees stated they felt it would result in less expenditure for substitute teachers and less interruption of the regular school program for students. Remarks about "creeping Socialism'' were made by those voting against the measure. In other action before adourning into its regular executive session, the board elected Florence M. Oves of Ridley Park as a part-time school nurse and Mrs. Helen M. Walls of Springfield as sec retary to the superintendent. Miss Oves will assist the regular school nurse from 8 a.m. until noon. QUAKERS TAKE O C.W. POST COLL. UNDEFEATED TEAMS TO MEET SATURDAY

Two of the undefeated small college elevens in the East will face each other Saturday when the Swarthmore College Little Quakers (2-0) play host to the Pioneers of C.W. Post College (3-0).

Swarthmore's victories have come at the expense of Dickinson (7-6) and Franklin & Marshall (19-7), while Post has topped St. Lawrence (7-6), Cortland State (20-14), and Trenton State (14-12). In last year's meeting, the first between the two schools, Swarthmore upset the Pioneers 14-13, in probably the finest game of the season for the Garnet. The Pioneers play from a

single wing formation with either a wingback or flanker, quarterbacked by either Tom Hespos or Ray Mc Greevy, both sophomores. The outstanding back, Tony Rubilotta, 225'-pound 6'2" -fullback, is especially effective on inside tackle plays, utilizing holes

opened by the Post line which averages over 200 pounds per man. The offense is not based on speed but the team's size enables it to play possesion football with enough success to remain undefeated after three outings. Swarthmore's wing Toffense,

on the other hand, is based on speed and break away play. Both Harvey Buek and Bernie Beitman are 10-second sprinters who use their speed to full advantage. In two games, Buek has rolled up 171 yards rushing, while Beitman has 101 yards rushing and 66 yards on a pass interception runback for a touchdown. The other halfbacks, co-captain Ben Cooper and Ted Houle, complement Beitman and Buek's speed with effective running that has yielded well over 100 yards in two games, while the fullbacks, cocaptain Bill Lipshutz and Ollie Burt, have averaged over 4 yards per carry through the middle.

The likely starter at quarter back is Mike Lillie, an All-Conference honorable mention last year or soph Hap Peelle, another 10-second sprinter and an effective passer.

Since these PUC buses cannot-be identified by color or flashing signals, it is important that the motorist be extra careful to avoid not recognizing them as school buses.

PENALTIES

Under the Pennsylvania Schedule of Suspensions and Revocations, the penalties that apply for illegally passing a school bus while loading or unloading (Sect. 1018) are: First Offense—One (1) month Fourth Offense—Four (4) months Second Offense—Iwo (2) months Fifth Offense—Six (6) months Third Offense—Three (3) months Sixth Offense—Eight (8) months (Violations remain as part of an operator's record for three years).

warthmore would gain financially from the County plan to join it with Nether Providence and Media. She said it took her five years to get authority to buy a transparent globe for use in her classes, and two years to secure a new filing cabinet.

She continued, "Many of our best teachers are thinking of leaving because they are offered better salaries elsewhere. In a small school system seniority is bound to gain respect, I'm all for it but it also makes for a hardened hierachy when it comes to change." She cited how she had tried to have an American Government course expanded but had been voted down by the majority of her colleagues. She said the 16 per cent of Swarthmore students who are not bound for college, could benefit by shop, architectural drafting, wider choice in arts, and additional courses offered by the other two districts, and not have to carry five or six major courses as now.

"I only have 116 pupils in Swarthmore this year and I'd welcome the opportunity to teach Media and Nether Providence youngsters to become intelligent voters so they won't cancel out my vote at the polls. The consolidations we have already undergone in our own school district has created better grouping by breaking up earlier tendencies to consider 'where a child comes from". she claimed.

Dr. Christie, who is now assistant to the president of Holstra College, Hempstead, N. Y., traced the findings of the Committee that only through compulsory consolidation into larger districts could the children throughout Pennsylvania be offered an education which will assure them college acceptance in competition with those being produced by the programs in other states.

He said if the state is to avoid an income tax or other increased source of revenue. it must overcome the unbalanced drain of small districts on its budget. At present richer and urban districts are footing not only an unequal share of their own bills but are providing the funds to support these smaller districts which require almost full financing by the state and still are unable to offer proper courses to their students.
