The Pre-School and Primary Groups of the Swarthmore Recreation Association Summer Program show an enrollment of 115 children ranging in age from three to seven. All groups got off to a fast start under the direction of Mary Byerly, her staff of five qualified teachers, and their six assistants and helpers.

The three-year-olds met, for the first time in many cases, the joys of play dough, painting, and coloring, plus the problems of group play. Ricky Henderson, Susan Shane and Carolyn Behr were happy to model the play dough, while Peter Elmgren, Beth Ferrigen and Jeffrey Rosen painted and colored. Mike Logue, David Reisbord, and Peter Love spent much of their time in playing with the toys in the room.

4-Year Olds

The four-year-old group spent their first week getting acquainted and had special name tags to help them. Activities included "Rocking the Boat", a sport enjoyed by David Oldach, Phillip Maass, and David Byerly; singing Nursery Rhymes, and using various art media (Ginny Van Hart painted a pretty house).

The "Fives" started the week telling each other about themselves and from this they learned that Tara Troescher was new in the area, having moved from Puerto Rico. On Tuesday there was a talent contest which was won by Suzy Southworth, who played the piano. On another day the children had a parade while all used rhythm instruments to keep time. Friday an attempt was made at printing the first three letters of the alphabet, and those showing much interest in this project were Stanley Scott, Pam Essig and Alison Smith.

Show & Tell Time

The Post Kindergarten group spent their first week getting accustomed to the routine of classes, which included finger painting and a "Show and Tell" period each day. The finger painting was a "first" for Mark Galli, and Gretchen Brandt and Donald James were eager participants in the "Show and Tell" time.

The Primary Class is learning to play badminton, croquet, dodge ball, and to jump rope, with two of their group (Tommy Waltz and Kathy Malone) teaching the others the fine points of checkers, both Chinese and regular. The children found time in their first busy week to learn simple folk dances, to sing rounds, to cut paper mobiles, to make blot pictures, and last but not least, to meet Charlie Brennan's turtle.

HONOR STREETER AT IOWA STATE Alumnus Cited for Pro- fessional Achievement

Carroll P. Streeter, Columbia avenue, editor-in-chief of Farm Journal magazine, received the Distinguished Achievement Citation of the Iowa State University Alumni Association last month.

Each year, an outstanding alumnus of the university is given the Distinguished Achievement Citation in recognition of outstanding professional achievement as evidenced by pre-eminent contribution to education, government, social welfare, science, agriculture, finance, general business or the home.

Born in South Dakota, Mr. Streeter was graduated from Iowa State University with a bachelor of science degree in animal husbandry. He joined the Cedar Rapids Gazette that same year as farm editor. In 1927 he joined the staff of Farmer's Wife in St. Paul, Minn. When Farm Journal bought the publication in 1939, he became an associate editor with Farm Journal. In 1955, he was named editor-in-chief of Farm Journal.

In 1947, he received the Reuben Brigham Award for editorial excellence from the Association of Agricultural College Editors.

Rutherford Retires From Steel Company Associated With Midvale- Heppenstall 46 Years

Thomas Rutherford of Westdale avenue retired Friday, June 29, after a 46 year association with the Midvale-Heppenstall Company, Philadelphia.

A native of New York City, Mr. Rutherford first joined the company (then known as the Midvale Steel and Ordnance Company) as an apprentice in the school for salesmen at their Nicetown plant in 1916. He became a salesman in 1923, and in 1941, after the company's merger into the Midvale Company, he was named district sales manager of Philadelphia. Successively, he became sales manager for castings, rolls for steel mills, and for railroad supplies. For the past 15 years he served as manager of the Philadelphia Sales District for the merger, Midvale-Heppenstall Company.

Educated in the Easton, Pa., Public School and Easton Academy, he was graduated from Blair Academy and attended Lafayette College. His wife, the former Theoa Hamilton, whom he married in 1925, died in 1952.

Mr. Rutherford founded the first Annual Fund Drive for Blair Academy, has served as president of the Blair Academy Alumni Association and general manager of the Alumni Fund Drive. President of the Alloy Casting Institute, he is a member of the American Society of Metals, the Midvale-Heppenstall Management Club, and the Steel Club of Philadelphia.

A Mason, he is also a member of Theta Delta Chi fraternity, the Rolling Green Golf Club, Germantown Cricket Club, Union League of Philadelphia, Drexelbrook Swimming and Tennis Club, Skytop Club, and Lehigh Valley Club.

An ardent gardener and traveler, Mr. Rutherford has been a resident of the borough for 37 years. He plans to summer in Twilight Falls, N. Y., and in Ontario, Canada.

APPALACHIAN TRAIL CALLS LOCAL HIKERS

Besides being a source of power the Watauga Dam is a great recreational area for fishing and boating.

Spending the chilly nights in sleeping bags under the open skies, with the fresh smell of the earth and the fragrance of flowers, and with the first day light filtering through the lacy foliage of the trees and the song of birds to awaken them in the morning, the hikers report, was an enviable experience.

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Service Held For Charles Chandler Unitarian Was Retired Banker, Trade Expert

A memorial service was held Saturday morning in the Unitarian Church of Delaware County for Charles Lyon Chandler, Sr., retired banker and foreign trade expert, who died Thursday, June 28, in Taylor Hospital. He was 78.

Mr. Chandler was a former manager of the foreign trade department of the former Corn Exchange National Bank and Trust Company with which he had been associated for 24 years. He was a founder of India House, New York, and a former member of the National Foreign Trade Council.

A graduate of Harvard University, 1905, he served in a number of countries in the U. S. Foreign Service. He was the first American to receive the Order of the Southern Cross; was awarded the Order of Merit from Chile, and had received medals from the Republic of Colombia for his interest in history and inter-American affairs.

He was for 10 years curator of South American history and literature in the Harvard College Library, and had taught at Georgetown University and the Haverford and Ursinus Colleges before he retired 10 years ago.

Mr. Chandler was a member of the board of managers of the University Museum at Penn for 20 years and a director in the Seaman's Church Institute of Philadelphia for 30 years. In addition, he was a life member of the American Unitarian Association for 57 years and was a trustee of the First Unitarian Church of Philadelphia.

He is survived by his wife, the former Margaret L. Brown, whom he married in 1920; a son Charles, Jr., of Media and a daughter Mrs. Theodore M. Antony of New York; four grandchildren; and four brothers and a sister.

- 1 Good living habits — plenty of sleep and rest, and a good frame of mind with no worries while driving.

- 6 Follow road conditions: If the sign says 40 m.p.h., believe it. If it says, "Slow, dangerous curve," take the highway department's word for it. 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BACCALAUREATE ADDRESS TO SHS '62

Below is the conclusion of the Baccalaureate Sermon delivered by the Rev. John C. Kulp, pastor of the Methodist Church, to the Class of 1962 Swarthmore High School. The sermon, reconstructed from brief outline notes at The Swarthmorean's request, is entitled "From the Top of My Head and the Bottom of my Heart" and deals with Mr. Kulp's recent experiences in Russia.

Publication of the sermon began in The Swarthmorean with the June 15th issue.

"Now let me relate for you the most moving experience I can recall. It's the account of Professor J. W. Winterhager of an incident that occurred on Reformation Day, 1961, just a few months after the separating wall between East Berlin and West Berlin. In the French sector along the street known as Bernauerstrasse, the wall goes through the buildings that are erected up to the sidewalk on this street. The wall can be seen behind the windows on the fifth, sixth, seventh, floors of some of these buildings. This same wall passes across the site of the Church of the Reconciliation, completely sealing it off from the western zone. No one can enter that church from the west. Its entrance is completely blocked. Professor Winterhager passionately related:

"On Reformation Day, October 31, 1961, for a Christian in West Berlin gathered at 'The Wall' for a service. Just over 'The Wall' was the Church of the Reconciliation. As the service was about to begin voices were unexpectedly heard coming from the Eastern Zone singing the 17th Century Hymn of Joseph Schetberger:

"I can't go on!
No comfort here abideth,
Life's burden weighs me down
It is too much!
I cannot find relief
All comfort takes its leave
Have mercy on me, Lord,
I can't go on!"

"The Christians in West Berlin wept in tears as they heard the voices of their brethren beyond the Iron Curtain. They joined to sing the second verse from memory.

"You can go on!
God's help will soon be there.
He'll turn you from your grief
And give you peace.
You just must keep on fighting
Our Lord too suffered in His stride.
Go on with Him - He's on your side.
You can go on!"

"The people in the Eastern Zone sang in sorrow:
"I can't go on!
God lets my feeble self go down.
His judgment comes. He makes me drown
Deep in the sea.
In anguish and distress I cry:
It is my agony, my final cry:
My body and my soul they die,
O Jesus, see, I can't go on!"

"The Christians on the west side of 'The Wall' now could not recall the fourth stanza, they did not have the words. So realizing this almost as if prepared in advance, the Christians on the East side of 'The Wall' tied the words to balloons and tossed the balloons over the wall. Those on the west side opened the balloons and the words and there found the invitation, "let us sing together." After a pause the Christians on both sides, east and west, sang the concluding stanza!

"You can go on!
There soon will be an end,
God reaches out His hand,
Look here - His hand, to you!
Ah, let us pray and pray.
And He will send the day,
His help will make us say,
To Him be praise,
His is our strength and stay."

"Young people of the class of 1962, you too can go on in service dedicated to our Lord and to His Christ, for the battle we are fighting is on the spiritual level! Perhaps you feel the battle is too great for you. You are idealistic and for that we are thankful, yet it is not possible for any one of us singly to set the world on fire so I think the words of an old popular song are appropriate for you. "I don't want to set the world on fire I just want to start a flame in your heart." If you start a flame in just one heart, perhaps in your own heart today, that will be the beginning of what you can do in this life and for this world in "the battle we are fighting on the spiritual level."

"This is my father's world, O let me ne'er forget that though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the Ruler yet."

Daniel Appointed Project Engineer



The number of diggers required are few, the committee says but women and older children can be valuable in working the earth through screens, or carrying the pulverized and discarded earth outside. Most of the workers bring a sandwich and stay for the day.

New "TELSTAR" relays phone calls and TV pictures for the first time!



"We left England at Dover July 2 and crossed on the night ferry to Dunkerque. We boarded a train at 3 a.m. for Paris. Arriving in Paris at 9 a.m. we were happy to be greeted by a representative from La Nef, the Girl Guide Hostel, where we were to stay for seven days in Paris. La Nef is located only about one block from the Louvre, so we were within walking distance of many of the major sights of Paris. At various times during our stay there, we saw Saint Chapelle, Notre Dame, the Louvre, Arc de Triomphe, Eiffel Tower. Hours were spent walking both sides of the Seine.
"One day we took the train to Chartres to see the Cathedral there. This trip not only permitted us to see one of the most famous Gothic cathedrals ever built, but also gave us a chance to see some of France outside of Paris.
"Our evenings were spent in a variety of ways. One night we attended a performance of the Passion Play given in front of Notre Dame. It was a magnificent performance and it presented aspects of the cathedral not obvious in the day time. Another evening we took a boat ride on the Seine, to see all the famous buildings and monuments lit up. As we neared Notre Dame we could hear the Passion Play, and then, as we passed we waved to off-stage actors who were strolling along the riverbank in their Medieval garb. It was like a picture from a story book.
"On another evening all but five of our troop went to a modern ballet by the Royal Netherlands Ballet Corp. The others went to Montmartre to a little cabaret called L'apin a Gill where there were good folk singers and lots of atmosphere.
"On Saturday evening we enjoyed an excellent dinner at a French restaurant suggested by Miss Strouse, our French teacher. On Sunday, our last day in Paris, most of the troop attended the American Church in Paris and the rest went to a Russian Orthodox church. At the Russian church, the girls met Helen Bogojavlenskaya, a former classmate and resident of Swarthmore.
"In the afternoon the troop went to Versailles, where, in spite of the crowds, we enjoyed seeing the Hall of Mirrors, the State Apartments, and the lovely gardens.
"We are now on our way to Switzerland. All are in good health and high spirits."

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

C. Campbell Retires From Westinghouse Chief Engineer Ends 43 Year Career Aug. 1

Clarence B. Campbell of College Avenue chief engineer at the Westinghouse steam divisions, retired August 1 after 43 years service with the company.

Mr. Campbell started his Westinghouse career as a mechanical apprentice at the steam divisions in 1919. Later he served as a draftsman, assistant manager of industrial turbines, and division engineer of central station turbines. He was manager of land turbine engineering, before becoming manager of the engineering department in 1944. He was named staff consulting engineer in 1952, and two years later he was appointed chief engineer.

He holds five patents in steam turbine design, and is the author of a number of technical papers.

Mr. Campbell received the highest honor the company bestows on employees, in 1942. He was named to fellow grade membership in the American Society of Mechanical Engineers in 1953, the same year he received the distinguished alumnus citation from the College of Engineering at the University of Michigan. In 1960 he received the Newcomen Medal awarded by the Franklin Institute for achievement in steam.

He was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1919 with a BS degree in mechanical engineering. While at college he was elected to the Tau Beta Pi and Sigma Xi engineering honor societies.

Mr. Campbell is a member of the Franklin Institute, Engineers Club of Philadelphia, the Newcomen Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the University of Michigan Club of Philadelphia, and the Board of Directors, Delaware County Branch, Pennsylvania Association for the Blind.

WITH TROOP 331 IN EUROPE

"Our five-day stay in the tiny Swiss village of Adelboden was very relaxing after Paris. New Services Offered

The Red Cross stressed that all claims must be filed on or before September 14, 1962 at the Bureau of Employees' Compensation, U.S. Department of Labor. The authority for consideration of claims is Public Law 87-234, which was approved September 14, 1961.

The Red Cross has also received a request from the Veterans Administration to remind all veterans and beneficiaries of the importance of promptly reporting all changes in address and status. Failure to report such changes can easily result in overpayment or delay in payment.
