COLLEGE ELECTS NEW BOARD

Name Carl Dellmuth To Four-Year Term

Carl K. Dellmuth, executive vice president of the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Company, was elected to the Board of Managers of Swarthmore College for a four year term, announced Claude C. Smith, president of the board, following the meeting December 3. Mr. Dellmuth has just finished a term as Alumni Manager.

Re-elected for a four-year term were Clement M. Biddle of the Biddle Purchasing Company, New York; George B. Clothier, attorney, of Philadelphia; William Poole, attorney, of Wilmington, Del.; and Mrs. Davies Preston of Swarthmore who is associated with the Child Study Institute of Bryn Mawr College.

Elected for a fouryear term by the Alumni Association were Dr. Thomas MacPhersonBrown, chairman of the department of medicine at George Washington University, Washington, D.C., and Mrs. Charles S. Lyon of New York who is a staff writer on the New Yorker magazine.

Carroll G. Bowen of Cambridge, Mass., was elected a Manager for a three year term. Mr. Bowen is director of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Press.

H & S To Equip Faculty Lounges

Refurbishing the faculty lounges in the Swarthmore High School is a project recently undertaken by the Board of the Swarthmore-Rutledge Home and School Association.

Action was passed at the November Board meeting held at the home of President Robert Hayden, following announcement of a request from eight teachers that chairs, tables and other items were seriously needed in the high school lounges.

The board voted to allot \$100 toward purchasing needed furniture, and in addition, decided to ask the townspeople to donate furniture in good condition, about to be discarded or not in use. Such articles suggested by Mrs. Ronald Estabrook, general chairman, include chairs, a small and large couch, lamps and tables. Anyone having such furniture is asked to call Mrs. Estabrook (KI 4-4138). The school truck will be sent to pick it up.

In other action the Board alotted \$100 to an American Field Service student; \$400 for two, 16-mm. projectors, the cost of which will be matched by the State; \$100 for an art print; \$110 for a telescope; and \$50 for a large wooden shield to be erected in the gym, showing names of captains and officers of athletic teams.

There was discussion about devoting the Spring meeting to fine arts and music.

Harry Liebeck, 50-Year Resident Former Scott V-P Was Active Methodist

Harry Liebeck, a resident of the borough for more than half a century, passed quietly away at Riddle Memorial Hospital, on Saturday, November 30, after a short illness.

Born in New York State in 1873, he moved with his family to Philadelphia at the age of seven and completed his education in the Philadelphia schools.

He was first associated with Scott Paper Company in 1892, at the age of 19, and later became their oldest living employee. Known here and in Europe for his inventions for paper making machines as well as for his contributions to the paper making industry, he was the first man to produce tissue paper at 500 feet per minute.

Mr. Liebeck was a former vice president and director of Scott Paper Company and president of its Nova Scotian subsiduary.

On his Fiftieth Anniversary with Scott Paper Company in 1942, all work was suspended for the day at the Chester Mill and offices. The afternoon program was dedicated to Mr. Liebeck for his achievements.

Mr. Liebeck had lived in Swarthmore for over 50 years, first at 223 Park avenue with his wife, the former Josephine Heilman Liebeck and later with his daughter Mrs. William F. Uthe at 210 Park avenue.

He had been an active member of the Swarthmore Methodist Church, a former Trustee of the Church, member of the Official Board and the building committee.

He had been Commodore of the Philadelphia Yacht Club and since 1930 had been an ardent yachtsman, spending his winters in Palm Beach and summers in Ocean City, N. J.

In addition to Mrs. Uthe, Mr. Liebeck is survived by two granddaughters Mrs. Linda Uthe Hamilton and Rhoda Heilman Uthe, and one great granddaughter.

Funeral Services were held privately at West Laurel Hill. They were conducted by the Rev. John C. Kulp of the Swarthmore Methodist Church.

POLIO 'FEEDING' 11 TO 4 SUNDAY

Type II Vaccine Is 3rd Offering

Dr. Harry V. Armitage, president of the Delaware County Medical Society has announced that Sunday, December 8, will be the date when Type II oral poliomyelitis vaccine will be offered to the citizens of Delaware County.

In September, 87% of the county's 553,000 population received Type I oral vaccine on sugar cubes. In late October, 82% of our residents received Type III vaccine.

Success Depends

Dr. J. Albright Jones and Dr. Robert F. Plotkin, co-chairmen of the Victory Over Polio Program Steering Committee, stated that while the first two phases of the program were considered most satisfactory, the final success of the entire program will depend on Delaware Countians taking advantage of the opportunity to immunize themselves against Type II polio this Sunday.

Dr. Plotkin said, "No one should consider themselves immunized until they have received all three types of the vaccine.

The U.S. Public Health Service in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report for the week ending November 16 shows that in one city, six cases of polio have occurred since mid-October and three of these have ended fatally. This same report shows that through the 46th week of 1963 there has been a total of 380 reported cases of polio in the United States, of which 323 were paralytic.

Glee A. Duff, program director, announced that the same 75 locations will be open as were used to feed Types I and III vaccines and the hours will be from 11 to 4. Swarthmore's station is the multipurpose room in the Elementary School, Rutgers avenue.

John F. Spencer was reelected to his seeind term as president of the Swarthmore-Rutledge Union School Board at the annual reorganization meeting Monday evening. Raymond Winch was likewise named to a second year as vice-president.

John B. Aaron, newly elected director, took the oath of office and was appointed chairman of the property committee and vice-chairman of the finance committee. Mrs. Katherine D. Heisler, also elected last month, was sworn in for a new term after having served since spring as an appointee following the resignation of Mrs. Marion Campbell. Mrs. Heisler was renamed chairman of the instruction committee.

SANTA, TAKE CARE! **RED CROSS WARNS**

"Glittering holiday decorations and children's gifts aren't necessarily accident-proof, so don't let mishaps with them spoil your Christmas Fun," said Virginia Rath, First Aid chairman for the local Red Cross. "Right now, safety traditions are just as important as Christmas traditions." Miss Rath warned against the fire hazard of a dry, brittle Christmas tree. "The tree should be kept moist in a bucket

from fireplaces, radiators, the tops of TV sets and other places of intense heat. "Lights on trees can dangerous, too," she continued. "They should be placed upright. not touching the tree branches. And of course lights should be in good condition, especially the wiring, and should be disconnected when you will be out of the room for long periods of time. Do not overload electric outlets."

Since the family and guests often smoke near decorations, it is suggested that all combustible material such as greenery be sprayed with fireproofing liquid. There is an added warning against the use of lighted candles on trees, or in windows where curtains can blow into the flames. "You should buy lights bearing the 'Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.' label -- they're the -safest," Miss Rath said.

"Here's a word to 'Santa Clauses' - use good judgment in giving children such gifts as chemistry sets, electrical toys, guns, knives and toys operated by alcohol and gasoline. Toys for toddlers should not have rough, sharp edges. Be sure that paint on toys and children's furniture is nontoxic, and don't give toys with small parts that can be taken apart and swallowed."
