**College To Host** Dickinson Sat. To Open 85th Season At 1:30 P.M. Game

Swarthmore College will open its 85th football season this Saturday by hosting Dickinson College on Clothier Fields. The Little Quakers squeaked out a 2-0 victory against the Carlisle Red Devils last year, and are hoping for a more impressive win this time.

In his offense Coach Lew Elverson will use Co-captain Hap Peelie as a flanker, at the wide left-end position. Senior George Spann will call signals, though Peelle is also likely to see action at quarterback. Last year's freshmen stars Toby Frazer (from Springfield) and Rich Yeager are scheduled to start as halfbacks. Completing the backfield is fullback Wilbur Streams, another sophomore who saw extensive action last year.

The Garnet's light but powerful line has been changed slightly since last year. Veteran junior Steve Gessner will start at center, sophomore Steve Hamilton at right guard, and junior Jim Flack at left guard. Frank Apfel has switched from center to right tackle, while junior Bob Nussbaum will hold the left tackle spot on the flanker side. Rounding out the line at right end is Co-captain Steve Jacobson, who will double on defense as linebacker. Coach Elverson describes his squad as "not too horrible," and predicts that "with a little luck, we should do all right." He admits that Dickinson will be tough, but feels that a wellearned victory Saturday would be a good way to start the season. The Swarthmore-Dickinson rivalry has continued intermittently since 1889, with the record now standing at 14-13-4. This week's contest is the 32nd game of the series. Kickoff is scheduled for 1:30 p.m.

MacMorland, president emeritus of the college. The center will be formally dedicated in November at a date

Gen. MacMorland, a resident of Wallingford, was PMC's seventh president, serving from 1953 to 1959. A native of Kansas City, Mo., he holds the degrees of bachelor of arts and master of arts from the University of Missouri. He entered military service in 1916 Coast Artillery Corps. A veteran of World Wars I and II. he saw service in the European

and Asiatic theatres of operations. Gen. MacMorland was commander of the Frankford Arsenal in Philadelphia from 1946 to 1948, and Chief of the Ordnance Division of the European Command from 1948 to 1950. He commanded the Aberdeen Proving Grounds from 1950 to 1952, and from 1952 to 1953 he was chief of the U.S. Army in Europe's General Purchasing Division. He retired from the Army in July. 1953.

Gen. MacMorland is a recipient of the Legion of Merit with an Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Keart, and the Army Commendation Ribbon. The British government awarded him the Distinguished Service Order and the Order of the British Empire (Commander).

# Tour Scott Foundation





The Garnet got its first touchdown in the first quarter when George Rivello fell on one of Bob William's 60 yard punts that was fumbled at the 50 yard line. A pass by quarterback McCaffery to end Jon Speers gained six and Russ Jones hit inside tackle through a Coslett - Wagstaff hole for first down. Quarterback McCaffery gained two at center and then Bob Williams went two more for the touchdown behind Speers and Derickson. Adams' try for extra point failed at the tacklespot but Swarthmore led 6-0.

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### **COLLEGE ROUTS** URSINUS 48-0 **Play Johns Hopkins** Next Saturday, Nov. 7

Following a 48-0 rout of Ursinus, Swarthmore is taking a one-week breather before returning to the field against Johns Hopkins on Saturday, November 7.

The Ursinus victory was the Little Quakers' first, after losses to Dickinson, F & M, and Hamilton. At midseason, Coach Lew Elverson is still looking for a winning season, especially after the performance of the squad last week. .

Unquestioned star of the game was left-halfback Dick Newman, gained 89 yards in 11 who rushes, and scored 3 of the Garnet's 7 touchdowns. Newman, a 170-lb. junior from Little Neck, New York, had been injured and seen only brief. action previously. He started Saturday as a replacement for Jim McElroy, who was injured in the Hamilton game. Newman's talents should prove very valuable in Coach Elverson's backfield, which has suffered from the loss of McElroy and

Sophomore Rich Yeager, a consistent standout at right halfback, rushed 16 times for 64 yards against Ursinus, bringing his team-leading total to 184. Wilbur Streams and Ray Sass, alternates at fullback, have 92 and 83 rushing yards, respectively.

Freshman Jon Summerton has given spirit to the entire. squad with his fine passing, signal calling, and punting. Summerton has a net gain of 378 yards in 57 passing attempts, and has punted 14 times for 486 yards.

Co-captains Hap Peelle and Steve Jacobson have had strong seasons so far, especially on defense. Peelle is the team's leading scorer and pass receiver, with 32 points and 142 yards gain.

In spite of its 1-3 record, Swarthmore has outplayed its opponents in almost every respect. The Little Quakers have 563 rushing yards to their opponents 350, 476 yards of passing gain as opposed to 429, and a total offense of 1039 as compared to 779 for the opposition.







The 22-year-old soldier entered the Army last May and completed basic combat training at Fort Knox, Ky.


