TB Association **Serves 64,000** 1963 Campaign Is

More than 64,000 persons were reached through the preventive program of the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association during the nine month period, April 1. 1963 to January 1, 1964.

At January 29's mid-winter meeting of the Association's Board of Directors, Robert W. Bernhardt. a resident of Swarthmore and executive secretary, reported that the number was about equally divided between case-finding and the educational work of the associ-

Mass Chest X-Ray Surveys in 47 communities and nine special institutions reached 23,651 persons. Increases were shown in all community surveys over last year, but the hospital

totals fell below 1962 figures. Mr. Bernhardt announced that assistance was given the State Health Department in conducting surveys in 27 nursing homes. Of 1,222 guests x-rayed, 109 showed evidence of chest

vision and further studies. Tuberculin testing was carried out in nine high schools positive and were x-rayed.

Diabetic testing was inaugurated by the Association during this period. A total of 1,923 persons in six communities were tested, and of these 138 persons showed indications of diabetes. The Delaware County Medical Society cooperates in this program and the testing is done by the Division of Chronic Diseases, Pennsylvania Department of Health.

U.S. Balance Sheets Subject of New Books

Morris Mendelson of Harvard avenue; is the co-author with Raymond W. Goldsmith and Robert E. Lipsey, of the second volume of "Studies in the National Balance Sheet of the United States," published by the Princeton University Press. The volumes summarize the balance sheets and discuss such facts as:

The total assets of all economic units in the United States -- business, household, and government -- are now close to \$4,000 billion; national wealth (tangible nonmilitary assets plus net foreign assets) has tripled since the end of World War II, reaching over \$1,700 billion or almost \$10,000 per capita; the increase intotal debt has been slower than the growth in assets during these years, with the result that the country's debt-asset ratio has fallen from 51 to 40 per cent. The development of national and sectoral balance sheets has en a major aspect of the National Bureau of Economic Research's Postwar Capital Markets Study.

Mr. Mendelson is an associate professor of finance at the University of Pennsylvania.

A.R.C. Blood Program Collects 109,255 Pints The Philadelphia Regional

Blood Program of the Red Cross collected 109,255 pints of blood last year in seven counties in Southeastern Pennsylvania and eight counties in southern New Jersey, according to Dr. Raymond F. Barnes, director of the Regional Program. "This is an increase of almost 4,000 pints over the previous year," said Barnes.

"Of this total, 93,257 pints were distributed by Red Cross for use by physicians in 124 hospitals within the Region," said Barnes. "In addition, 3,270 pints were sent to 36 hospitals outside the Region to meet the needs of donors from this area and their dependents who were away from home."

Barnes, the Red Cross and the Philadelphia County Medical Society have started a program to increase the amount of blood available to Philadelphia hospitals through volunteer donors. As a pilot project, a Red Cross sub-center has been established at Albert Einstein Medical Center, Northern Division, to collect blood from donors in that area. Donor subcenters will later be established at other hospitals in selected areas in the city, said

COURAGEOUS LEADER

In these days when most men in public life avoid taking a stand that might not be popular with some people, including the labor unions, it is refreshing to see an elected official take a stand on principal. Governor Scranton's call on a Special Session of the legis-

lature to reform the state unemployment compensation law, took the kind of courage which we hope to see our leaders take. The Governor stated that, at the current rates, benefits to the unemployed is so generous that the State would soon be bankrupt if continued. In short, he suggested closing up the loopholes in the laws, making less people elegible, changing the benefits from \$40 a week to \$45 per week, but limiting the benefits to 30 weeks instead of 60 weeks.

In his statement to the legislature, he said in part: "We must bear arms against a variety of antagonists. "First, there are the sunshine patriots, who like to sound slogans of industrial development but who have no stomach for the hard realities.

"Next, there are the falsehoods, shot in the air like a thousand poison arrows in the hope that one or two might find their mark.

"Then there are the demagogues. Using the time-tested

techniques of the big lie and the half-truth, they will, if given their way, lead Pennsylvania, not to another round of benefits but to another round of depression and unemployment." This stand of the Governor, who is considered a potential Republican Presidential candidate, should be applauded and

backed to the hilt by all citizens, including members of the legislature who believe in the progress of Pennsylvania.

Section-840 of the Vehicle Code authorizes buses li-censed by the Public Utility Commission (buses that are used for other than exclusively transporting school children) to be used on a school bus basis, provided they are properly identified



The PUC buses are required to carry a sign front and rear indicating they are being used as a school bus. They are NOT required to display a flashing red signal, nor be pained chrome yellow. Since these PUC buses cannot be identified by color or flashing signals, it is important that the motorist be extra careful to avoid not recognizing them as school buses.

Peter B. Murray of Rutgers avenue is the author of a new adaptation of Shakespeare's "Richard III" which will be presented April 2 through 11 by the Philadelphia Drama Guild, in celebration of the Bard's 400th Birth Year.

Producer Sidney S. Bloom announced that this fully staged, fully costumed production will be presented at the Playhouse, 1714 Delancey street. The adaptation by Murray will include selected scenes from the Bard's great works with original narrative material linking the scenes. Murray is professor of English at the University of Pennsylvania.

Sproul Astronomer To Speak March 12th

Burroughs Branch of RESA will present Sarah Lee Lippincott, research associate at the Sproul Observatory of Swarthmore College, as the speaker at the monthly meeting to be held in the Burroughs Research Center Auditorium, Paoli, on Thursday evening, March 12, at 8 p.m.

Miss Lippincott will speak on "Planets Beyond Our Solar System," a subject that has interested astronomers for many years. Since stars appear to be gregarious in space and there are many double and triple systems as well as stars grouped in clusters, the question arises: are there also planetary systems similar to our own solar system? The reflected light that planets shine by would be lost in the glare of its sun's light so that visual detection would be virtually impossible.

Research at the Sproul Observatory has led to evidence of three planet-like objects outside our solar system. Photographs taken by the 24-inch Sproul Refractor will be used to illustrate this subject.

Miss Lippincott has been associated with the Sproul Observatory since 1942, but she has also worked on specialized projects at such places as University of California's Lick Observatory, Harvard College Observatory, Paris Observatory at Meudon, France, and Pic du Midi Observatory in

the Pyrenees Mountains. In 1958 she attended the 10th General Assembly of the International Astronomical Union in Moscow.

Her scientific papers have been published in Holland, France, and Canada, as well as in the United States. She has also co-authored a book, "Point to the Stars," published by McGraw-Hill in 1963.

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
