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Magician To Give Shows Feb. 15th Performances To Aid Riddle Memorial Aux.

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Paul Fleming (in private life Dr. Paul F. Gemmill of Thayer road) is a magician who takes his art seriously. Trained in legerdemain from early boyhood, he decided, after several years of practical stage experience, a college education would make him a better magician. After earning a Bachelor of Arts degree and membership in Phi Beta Kappa at Swarthmore College and a Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania, where he is now Professor Emeritus of Economics, he set out on a three-sided career of college teaching, writing and public entertaining.

He has written a half-dozen books on economics, several of which have been best sellers. He made a study in England, Scotland and Wales of the British National Health Service which was published recently under the title of "Britain's Search for Health" and which was cited in the House of Lords by Lord Taylor as "The best account of the Health Service that has ever been written."

Auxiliary To Meet

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Bishop Campbell will bring a message concerned with the crucial area of the preparing men for the ordained ministry of the Church. Y., awarded him the S.T.M. degree Magna Cum Laude, and in 1951 the Th.D. degree.

Public Library Annual Meeting

The following article is a continuation from last week of the report of the annual meeting of the Swarthmore Public Library Association held January 27. The first few paragraphs are from the report of Mrs. Paul Gay, librarian.

"Exhibits and displays during the year have included the following:

Reading list of short books; January calendar listing birthdays of famous people, with book exhibit; exhibit on the 1962 annual report. Probably the most serious of our difficulties... are the numerous limitations of the physical plant... Could an existing or a special committee of the Board consider long-range plans to solve the space problem of the Library?"

"The community expects a well-stocked collection and uses it heavily. The increased tax support is of great help in several respects, especially in keeping our collection of books and magazines useful and up-to-date. We fear that the staff has somewhat over-extended itself by lengthening the regular service from 25 and 1/2 hours in 1963 to 47 hours in 1962 and 50 hours in 1963, and the summer opening hours correspondingly from 19 1/2 to 30 hours. If minor adjustments become necessary, they will probably be accepted with good grace by our readers."

The Board thanked Mrs. Gay for her report and Miss Perkins for presenting it and moved to accept it.

The mid-year fiscal report

Committee; materials about Philadelphia and new books by local authors; exhibit for Human Rights Day; and the magnificent decoration of the Library for the Christmas season by the Swarthmore Garden Club.

"At the reorganization meeting which followed the Annual Meeting, all officers were re-named. Harry G. Mr. Paul and Mrs. Told were appointed a special committee authorized by Board action to look into the space requirements of the Library - as requested in the Librarian's report.

Hirsch spoke to Mr. Smith, newly elected President of Borough Council, of the Library Board's appreciation of his continuing membership on the Board.

The next meeting of the board was set on April 6.

The new building of the Child Guidance Clinic of Delaware County will be formally dedicated this afternoon at 4 p.m. at Sixth and Olive streets, Media.

The occasion will be of sharp interest to all those who have contributed their time and money to making this building a reality. Arlin M. Adams, secretary of the Department of Public Welfare, who is the guest speaker, and all other guests will attend the ceremony for a mutually-shared reason - the dedication of a building (which was designed by a Swarthmore resident J. Roy Carroll, Jr., FAIA, President of the American Institute of Architects, and a partner of the Philadelphia architectural firm of Carroll, Griddale & Van Allen) and by a group of people themselves dedicated to helping more of the emotionally-disturbed children of Delaware County.

The Hon. Henry G. Sweeney, President Judge of the Common Pleas Courts of Delaware County, will introduce Mr. Adams following the invocation by the Rev. Joseph P. Bishop.

After a greeting by Mrs. Frederick M. Thayer, president of the board of directors, Dr. Frederick D. Dudley of Swarthmore, director of the Clinic, will continue as Master of Ceremonies.

Mr. Bishop, formerly pastor of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church and first President of the board of directors of the Clinic, is now Pastor of the Rye, N. Y., Presbyterian Church.

Father Francis P. O'Reilly, a member of the Clinic's Board and of the Padua Retreat in West Chester, will deliver the benediction.

Officers of the United Funds of Philadelphia and of Chester, Delaware County Commissioners and Judges, as well as officers of the various Welfare Agencies and of the Child Guidance Clinic of Philadelphia, will be among the nearly 500 invited guests.

Mrs. John B. Felton of Wallingford, over-all Chairman of Plans and Arrangements for the event, has been assisted by the Community Projects Committee which includes Mrs. Thomas B. McCabe, Jr., and Agnes Sweeney, also of Wallingford; Mrs. John R. Chester road collided, police said, with James Wright, Jr., Woodlyn who was attempting a left turn into Riverview road. The Miller vehicle required towing.

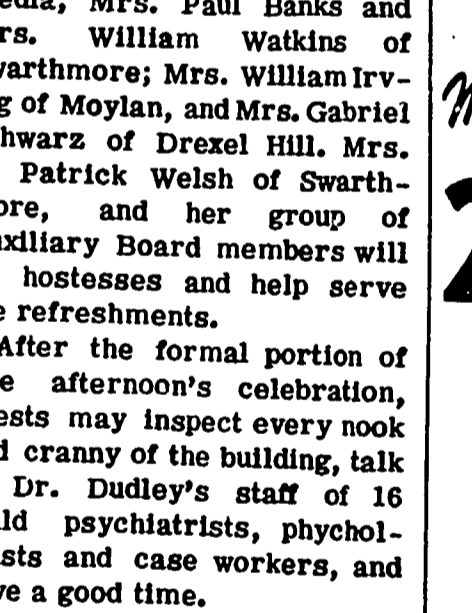

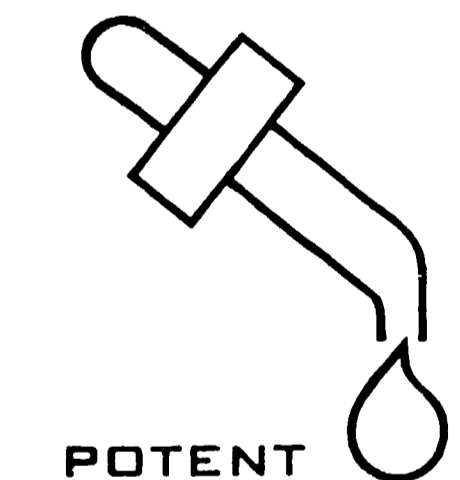

'A LOOK BEHIND THE SCENES. . . New Biology Stresses Scientific Inquiry

The article below has been written by a member of the High School faculty in connection with the series prepared by the Board of School Directors in order to share with the community the constant re-evaluation and re-shaping being carried on in the Swarthmore-Rutledge school system.
The BSCS felt that there was no best method of approach to the study of biology. Hence they decided to design materials for three different approaches. These approaches were written into textbooks which are called the Yellow, Green and Blue Version of Biology.
Each of the three BSCS versions has its peculiar orientation. The Blue Version places its emphasis on the molecular; the Green Version, on the community; the Yellow Version, on the cellular. Unlike physics, biology is not yet a body of tightly connected, almost axiomatic knowledge. Hence, there is still room for differences as to what should be emphasized in the field.
Adopt 'Yellow Version' Swarthmore High School has adopted the Yellow Version which covers the subfields of biology emphasizing the cell as the basic unit of life. Students are encouraged to make extensive use of the laboratory to explore their ideas. Recently purchased were seven compound oil immersion microscopes and seven stereoscopic microscopes. These excellent instruments, coupled with other newly acquired apparatus, such as an incubator and a refrigerator, have helped

A.R.C. Blood Program Collects 109,255 Pints
The Philadelphia Regional Blood Program of the Red Cross collected 109,255 pints of blood last year in seven counties in Southeastern Pennsylvania and eight counties in southern New Jersey, according to Dr. Raymond F. Barnes, director of the Regional Program.
"This is an increase of about 4,000 pints over the previous year," said Barnes.
"Of this total, 93,257 pints were distributed by Red Cross for use by physicians in 124 hospitals within the Region," said Barnes. "In addition, 3,270 pints were sent to 36 hospitals outside the Region to meet the needs of donors from this area and their dependents who were away from home."
During the past year, said Barnes, the Red Cross and the Philadelphia County Medical Society have started a program to increase the amount of blood available to Philadelphia hospitals through volunteer donors. As a pilot project, a Red Cross sub-center has been established at Albert Einstein Medical Center, Northern Division, to collect blood from donors in that area. Donor sub-centers will later be established at other hospitals in selected areas in the city, said Barnes.
The Red Cross collects blood, also, at the Regional Center, 1710 Spruce street, Philadelphia, and through four bloodmobiles, which visit businesses, industries and community centers throughout the area of the Regional Program.

An Ordinance fixing the rate of compensation to be paid officers and employees of the Borough of Swarthmore during the year 1964, and until changed by Borough Council.

THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Commencing with their respective periods of service during the current calendar year, and until changed by Borough Council the compensation of the following officers and employees shall be as follows: MANAGER - \$7,500. per year, payable semi-monthly. SECRETARY - \$6,400. per year, payable semi-monthly. TREASURER - \$2,500. per year, payable quarterly. ENGINEER - Such compensation as Council may from time to time authorize for work assigned. SOLICITOR - \$2,000. per year, payable quarterly, and such fees for court and other services as Council may from time to time approve. HEALTH OFFICER - \$500. per year, payable quarterly. MILK INSPECTOR - \$180. per year, payable quarterly. TAX COLLECTOR - A commission of 2% of the net Borough taxes collected by him, and a commission of 2% of the net Borough delinquent taxes when same have been paid over to the Borough by the County, and a proportionate allowance for expenses as provided by law. SEWER RENT COLLECTOR - A commission of 2% of the net sewer rents collected per year, payable semi-monthly. SERGEANT - \$5,460. per year, payable semi-monthly. PATROLMAN - \$5,160. per year, payable semi-monthly. AUXILIARY POLICE - Such compensation as shall be authorized by Council in each case by Council. JANITOR - \$2,600. per year, payable semi-monthly. LABORER - UNSKILLED, \$1.95 per hour, payable weekly, on basis of 44 hour week, with 50% additional for overtime.

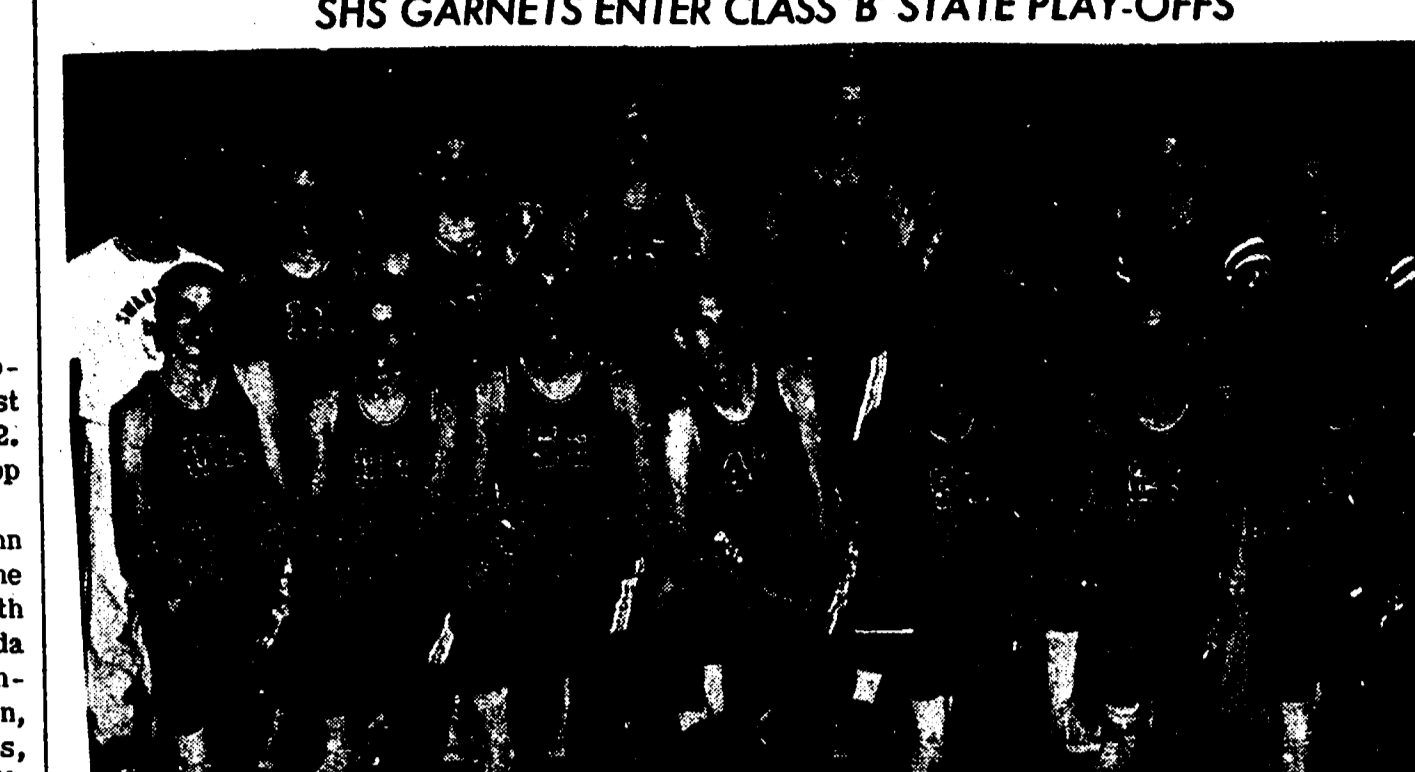

Phila. Guild To Give Murray Adaptation

Peter B. Murray of Rutgers avenue is the author of a new adaptation of Shakespeare's "Richard III" which will be presented April 2 through 11 by the Philadelphia Drama Guild, in celebration of the Bard's 400th Birth Year.

Producer Sidney S. Bloom announced that this fully staged, fully costumed production will be presented at the Playhouse, 1714 Delancey street. The adaptation by Murray will include selected scenes from the Bard's great works with original narrative material linking the scenes. Murray is professor of English at the University of Pennsylvania.

The material, which includes a prologue from Richard II will provide some of the best scenes of the two plays which together relate the story of the War of the Roses. A talented and experienced cast of professional actors and actresses, many from radio and TV as well as the local and national stage will recreate this work in observance of the 400th Birth Year of the great British classicist.

Prof. Murray is a graduate of Swarthmore College. During his undergraduate days, Murray wrote two plays which were produced by the college drama group.

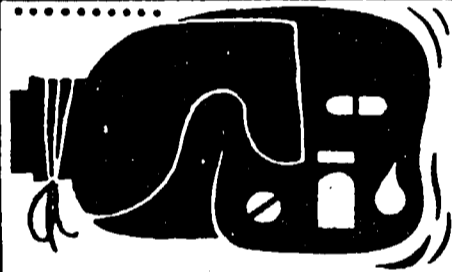

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Sproul Astronomer To Speak March 12th

Burroughs Branch of RESA will present Sarah Lee Lippincott, research associate at the Sproul Observatory of Swarthmore College, as the speaker at the monthly meeting to be held in the Burroughs Research Center Auditorium, Paoli, on Thursday evening, March 12, at 8 p.m.

Miss Lippincott will speak on "Planets Beyond Our Solar System," a subject that has interested astronomers for many years. Since stars appear to be gregarious in space and there are many double and triple systems as well as stars grouped in clusters, the question arises: are there also planetary systems similar to our own solar system? The reflected light that planets shine by would be lost in the glare of its sun's light so that visual detection would be virtually impossible.

Research at the Sproul Observatory has led to evidence of three planet-like objects outside our solar system. Photographs taken by the 24-inch Sproul Refractor will be used to illustrate this subject.

Miss Lippincott has been associated with the Sproul Observatory since 1942, but she has also worked on specialized projects at such places as University of California's Lick Observatory, Harvard College Observatory, Paris Observatory at Meudon, France, and Pic du Midi Observatory in

the Pyrenees Mountains. In 1958 she attended the 10th General Assembly of the International Astronomical Union in Moscow. Her scientific papers have been published in Holland, France, and Canada, as well as in the United States. She has also co-authored a book, "Point to the Stars," published by McGraw-Hill in 1963.
