The Players Club's April production, Clifford Odets' comedy "A Thousand Clowns" took off last night on a six night run of hilarity and foolishness, based on sunniness, wistfulness, sensibility and dementedness (to more or less quote from a quote from the New York times).

The story revolves around an eccentric bachelor who is being investigated by a team of welfare workers on the care and upbringing of his 12-year. old nephew, but it is not strictly true that the female of the Child Welfare duet remains to redecorate the apartment. The redecorating comes later.

But, it is a very funny play, and if the Players do not recommend it as a family comedy, it is not because is so very raw and risque (it's tame for this day and age) it's because the humor, frankly, would not appeal especially to Youth.

The leading -- and only---lady of the piece is Cathe Winn who presents convincingly the public idea of the well-trained and thoroughly educated Social Worker; and when later she becomes "more human." she is warm and appealing. Dick Croft as the uncle carries the burden of the play with aplomb and zest. It is just barely possible, in his approach to life, that Uncle Murray has met Elmer Dowd's friend Harvey (although there is no drinking, nor even the fleck of an ash in the entire three acts, Mr. Croft is a delightful uncle. During his career of public service. Mr. Park served in numerous capacities here and abroad. During World War I, having resigned to enlist in the military service, Mr. Park was attached to the military personnel of the Assistant Secretary of War. He accompanied the Hon. Edward R. Stettinius, Sr., to France as Liaison officer and French interpreter, the year that Mr. Stettinius was American Representative on the Inter-Allied Purchasing Commission with headquarters in

Paris. Completing his ten years' service in London in 1929 he returned to this country and Dr. H.S. Longley sistant Chief of the Agricultural Implements Division. In 1930 he was appointed Commercial Agent to the New York Regional Office, the next year To Serve As Priest In being transferred to Philadelphia where he served as Regional Director until his retirement.

A native of Missouri, he was educated in the public schools of Springfield, Missouri. Later he specialized in foreign trade at the University of London and the University of Pennsylvania and was engaged in private business as purchasing agent and export manager of a paint and varnish manufacturing company in St. Louis, before joining the Bureau in 1917.


His two children were born in England during Mr. Park's tenure of office at the London Embassy. His daughter Mrs. Winifred Fry died on July 2, 1951.





Mr. Park retired on April 24, 1958, after more than 40 years of service devoted to the promotion of foreign trade with the United States Department of Commerce. During his career of public service, Mr. Park served in numerous capacities here and abroad.

During World War I, having resigned to enlist in the military service, Mr. Park was attached to the military personnel of the Assistant Secretary of War. He accompanied the Hon. Edward R. Stettinius, Sr., to France as Liaison officer and French interpreter, the year that Mr. Stettinius was American Representative on the Inter-Allied Purchasing Commission with headquarters in Paris.

Completing his ten years' service in London in 1929 he returned to this country and Dr. H.S. Longley sistant Chief of the Agricultural Implements Division. In Named At Trinity mercial Agent to the New York Regional Office, the next year To Serve As Priest In being transferred to Philadelphia where he served as Regional Director until his retirement.

A native of Missouri, he was educated in the public schools of Springfield, Missouri. Later he specialized in foreign trade at the University of London and the University of Pennsylvania and was engaged in private business as purchasing agent and export manager of a paint and varnish manufacturing company in St. Louis, before joining the Bureau in 1917. His two children were born in England during Mr. Park's tenure of office at the London Embassy. His daughter Mrs. Winifred Fry died on July 2, 1951.

He is survived by his wife the former Manie Hauser, whom he married on June 2, 1917. and by his son, Dr. Philip M. a professor of English at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N. Y., and by three grandchildren.



Joseph W. Conard of 217 North Swarthmore avenue, professor of economics at Swarthmore College, died Monday, April 5, in Lankenau Hospital following a long illness. He was 53. He had been a member of the Swarthmore College faculty since 1950.

He was graduated from Grinnell College and received his Masters and Doctors degrees from the University of California at Berkeley.

Mr. Conard was an active member of the Society of Friends, and from 1943-1947 was executive secretary of the Northern California Branch of the American Friends Service Committee.

In 1954-55, while on leave from Swarthmore College, he was a member of the Research Staff of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and a member of the staff of the Commission on Money and Credit which was established by the Committee for Economic Development. He was author of the book

was engaged in a research project for the National Burea of Economic Research.

He is survived by his wife, Florence Thomas Conard; and a son, John H., who is a graduate student at the University of Wisconsin; and his mother. Mrs. Rachel W. Conard; and two brothers.



Dr. Keighton To Speak At Keuka **Science Foundation** Sponsors 2-Day Visit

"Fresh Water From Salt Water" will be the subject of a public lecture to be given by Dr. Walter B. Keighton, Jr., professor of chemistry at Swarthmore College, Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Millspaugh Nursing and Science Center Auditorium at Keuka College. Keuka Park, N. Y.

Professor Keighton will be on the Keuka campus April 14 | in Brookhaven Cemetery. and 15, during which time he will meet with several classes. deliver the lecture Wednesday evening, and meet with various groups of students and faculty. Dr. Keighton's appearance at **Visit Borough** Keuka College is being sponsored by the National Science Foundation's Visiting Scientist Program administered by the Division of Chemical Education From Nearby Schools of the American Chemical Society.

In his lecture Wednesday. Dr. Keighton will discuss the underlying principles of the most promising methods of removing salt from ocean water. He will also refer to process plants already constructed for this purpose, compare costs and consider the outlook for the future.

Following the lecture there will be a reception for Dr. the high school graduating expectedly Monday night, March Keighton under the auspices of Chi Beta Phi, national honorary scientific fraternity.

Dr. Keighton received his bachelor of arts degree from Swarthmore College and his doctor of philosophy degree in physical chemistry from Princeton University. Since 1931 he has been on the faculty at Swarthmore College where he is the Edmund Allen professor of chemistry and chairman of the department of chemistry.

Since 1951 he has been a consultant for the United States Geological Survey Water Resources Division. He is the author of "The Investigation of Chemical Quality of Water in Tidal Rivers" and co-author of "Chemical Characteristics of Delaware River Water" and "Water Resources of the Delaware River Basin," as well as publications in technical iournals in the fields of physical chemistry, water resources and chemical education.

For several years Prof. Keighton has served as visitor for the American Chemical scientists in chemistry and as society's committee on professional training.





COUNCIL ADOPTS STRATH HAVEN INN REPORT

Votes To Limit Future **Considerations For** Site To One Bldg.

Swarthmore Borough Council Monday night rejected three plans submitted last month by Cornelius H. A. Wildman, Lansdowne, for erection of apartments on the former Strath Haven Inn site at Harvard and Yale avenues. Councilman D. Mace Gowing said that one plan called for three buildings, another for two, and the third for a single Y-shaped structure. They ranged from 176 to 215 apartment units.

Council unanimously voted to accept Mr. Gowing's recommendations as they were presented in his committee report. The report is recorded, in full, on page 7.

The Swarthmore League women Voters applauded Council's February revocation of a permit for 215 apartments and 50 motel rooms granted four years ago but not used by Wildman in that period. In a letter read by Council President Harry Smith the League urged preservation of this open land which "provides the community with a valuable and traffic free access to Crum Creek as a recreation area."

Karl Fox was granted a variance to increase the size of a proposed addition to his home at 300 Yale avenue, after the surrounding neighbors had signed that they were agreeable to the arrangement. Otis Reed was granted permission to erect a transparent fence inside the hedge bordering his property at the southeast corner of Chester road and Yale avenue provided it not reduce visibility of traffic and the permit would extend only for four years or until the property was sold, if earlier. Reed sought the fence as a protection for a young child.

Highway committee chairman William Gill received authorization to advertise for bids on resurfacing 10,000 square yards of borough streets.

Public safety chairman Herman Bloom was authorized to accept the lower of two bids on a new police car provided formal warranty was supplied.

Council approved erection of a stop sign on University place at Cornell avenue. Council announced that there would be an examination for







Kids take growing up for granted

And they should. To guard this right, scientists are constantly searching for the cause and cure of leukemia-the cancer that strikes down more than 2,000 children annually. There is steady progress. 





REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDING AND PLANNING Re: Application of C. H. A. Wildman Strath Haven In Tract

This is a renewal of an application made in April, 1961.

"for the continued use, replacement and extension of apartmenthotel facilities" at the northwest corner of Yale and Harvard Avenues, where the old Strath Haven Inn formerly stood. After a public hearing on May 8, 1961, Council issued a Special Permit, effective July 29, 1961, for the building Mr. Wildman then planned to erect on his five and one half acre tract. In October, 1961, Mr. Wildman demolished the old Inn, but did not proceed with erection of the new building, advising that it was not economically feasible to build same. In March, 1964, he submitted a plan showing three apartment house buildings on the tract; and later a plan showing two such buildings, neither of which plans was satisfactory to Council. On February 8, 1965. following a general study of the Borough by the Planning Commission, Council revoked the said Special Permit of July 29. 1961, "subject, however, to Mr. Wildman's right to make application, in accordance with the terms of the Swarthmore Zoning Ordinance, as amended, for replacement of the uses formerly conducted upon his property."

Through his counsel Mr. Wildman requested an informal meeting with Borough Council to submit new plans. Such a meeting was held March 13, 1965, attended by Mr. Wildman, his attorney Mr. Cramp, and his architect Mr. Polillo. Mr. Wildman resubmitted two of the old plans (showing three buildings and two buildings respectively) and a new plan for a Yshaped building. The members of Council, at subsequent meetings, have given careful consideration to all of these plans. and have had the benefit of advice from the Swarthmore Planning Commission thereon. At the last such informal meeting on April 10th, your Committee was asked to submit a written recommendation for consideration at tonight's regular meeting of Borough Council.

In approaching this problem the Committee points out that Mr. Wildman's five and one half acre tract is zoned Residential and always has been so zoned, since the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance in 1928. Apartment houses are not permitted in the Residential District. However, the old Strath Haven Inn was there in 1928, and so Mr. Wildman has the right to replace such Inn as a nonconforming use. We are advised by the Solicitor that Mr. Wildman did not lose this right when he demolished the old building in 1961, because he then held a Special Permit authorizing its replacement by the building referred to in said permit. When this Special Permit was revoked, February 8, 1965, after an interval of over three and a half years, Mr. Wildman then had, by operation of Section 703 of the Zoning Ordinance as amended, a year in which to submit plans to replace the Inn. This period will not expire until February 8, 1966.

According to testimony furnished to the Swarthmore Board of Adjustment in 1951, by John A. Dodds, President of Mc-Gregor-Dodds Hotel, Inc., then the owner of this property, and by William S. Shelly, who had then been employed at the Inn for 28 years, the old Strath Haven Inn than had 70 rentable bedrooms (eliminating rooms used for storage purposes.) There were no apartments with cooking facilities in the old Inn, although the small building known as the Stone House then had three apartments in it, and still does. The guests took their meals in the common dining room on the first floor of the Inn. Your Committee believes these facts are relevant in considering the size and type of building which Mr. Wildman is lawfully entitled to erect, at this time, by way of replacement and reasonable extension of the former nonconforming use.

Your Committee also believes that it should be remembered that Mr. Wildman purchased this property in 1959, knowing it to be zoned Residential and to be located in a section of the Borough fully built up with attractive single-family homes and other buildings of Swarthmore College used for educational purposes. Although there are differences in the three plans submitted, Mr. Wildman now seeks to replace the old Inn with one or more multiple-dwellings to house as many as 215 apartment units, in addition to a modest number of hotel or motel rooms and dining room facilities. His plans show parking spaces for 370 automobiles. Your Committee feels that in the aggregate this represents not a replacement of the old Inn, with its 70 bedrooms, but a disproportionate extension and

change of the former use made of this property. To provide the applicant with a broad outline of what this Council feels should mark the limits of the replacement, change and extension of the former nonconforming use at this property. and with no intention to usurp the functions of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Committee recommends that Mr. Wildman be advised that. Council is obliged to reject each of the three plans submitted to it at the March 15, 1965 informal meeting, but will give consideration to a new application limited as follows:

1. Only one structure shall replace the old Inn, and it should set back from Harvard Avenue approximately as far as did the old Inn, and not come closer to Yale Avenue than OF RUTLEDGE it does to Harvard.

2. The new structure should be designed to continue the essential functions of the old Inn. with bedrooms for guests who take their meals in a common dining room. The Committee suggests the new structure should have not less than 50 hotel bedrooms. and should seat not less than 100 persons in the dining room.

3. In addition, in the view of the Committee, the new structure may house a reasonable number of modern apartment units, but not to such extent as to completely change the new building from a hotel to an apartment house.

4. The 15% building area limitation applicable to all properties in the Residential District shall be conformed to, business meeting of the Club and if the requested change of use to include apartment units is approved, the provisions of the amended Zoning Ordinance applicable to multiple dwellings should apply as respects height, side and rear yards, parking facilities and landscaping. It should also be brought to Mr. Wildman's attention that "no building hereafter erected in any district in the Borough of Swarthmore shall exceed 55 feet in height" (Section 700 of the Zoning Ordinance), and that height is measured from the meanlevel of the ground surrounding the building (Section 100 (13)). 



Last year the Philadelphia Suburban Water Company shipped nearly 23 billion gallons of water to its growing number of customers. It was a silent, sure operation, accomplished without inconvenience to the public, because delivery was through an intricate underground network of nearly 2,200 miles of pipeline. That gallonage weighed about 95,379,291 tons—enough to fill 1,907,585 fifty-ton railroad tank cars. This vast amount of quality water would fill six and six-tenths 150-tank car railroad trains stretching across the U.S.—from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans. All this was done during a severe drought year-without restriction on consumption.








College Sets Up **Professorships**

Swarthmore College has announced the establishment of five new named professorships made possible by bequests and by the Centennial Fund.

The Albert L. and Edna Pownall Buffington Professorship of Mathematics was established from unrestricted funds left to the College by two former graduates. Mrs. Buffington was graduated in the class of 1898 and returned to take her M.A. in mathematics. Mr. Buffington was in the class of 1896. All their lives they were devoted to the college. After their retirement they lived in Swarthmore and continued their interest in the college and its students. Knowing of their great interest in mathematics, the college decided to use part of the bequestthough unrestricted - to endow a chair in mathematics in their name. Heinrich Brinkmann, chairman of the department, has been named Albert L. and Edna Pownall Buffington Professor of Mathematics.

Three Centennial Professorships have been established in honor of all who contributed to the Centennial Campaign which, last June, passed the original goal of \$10,000,000 by more then two million dollars. Professor Hans Wallach, chairman of the departnent, and Professor Solomon E. Asch have been named Centennial Professors of Psychology. Frank C. Pierson has been named Centennial Professor of Economics.

The Richter Professorship of Political Science was announced earlier this month. It is held by J. Roland Pennock, Chairman of the department.

At the same time the College announced that Peter van de Kamp, chairman of the department of Astronomy and Director of the Sproul Observatory, had been named Edward Hicks Magill Professor of Astronomy.







Will Review Work For Public Health

Progress in the development of New Programs to improve the public health in all communities will be reviewed today at the annual meeting of Board of Delaware County TB and Health Association, convening' at the Aronimink Golf Club, Newtown Square, at 11:45 a.m. The following steps will be outlined by Robert W. Bernhardt in his executive secretarial report to the group:

The development of a combined 70mm chest filming unit and survey respiratory measurement at Fitzgerald-Mercy Hospital under the direction of Dr. J. Francis Mahoney which, when completed, will be the first of its kind to be developed and will broaden the effectiveness of admission x-ray programs in hospitals to Emphysema and other respiratory disease patients.

A concentrated x-ray breakthru in the city of Chester in May, in cooperation with the Health Committee in the Greater Chester Movement, to cover all high incidence areas and x-ray people not reached in the monthly survey programs.

Selection of the Tuberculosis Association as "host agency" of the Council on Alcoholism as an information center for County residents seeking assistance. Also the inauguration of group therapy sessions for TB patients with a drinking problem.


Consideration given to meeting the need in local hospitals for intermittent positive pressure equipment for the increasing number of patients with Emphysema in advanced stages.

Also reported at the meeting will be the 4 1/2 month work of the Patient Services Consultant, a program inaugurated by the Association on October 15th. Also during the meeting Dr. Samuel Enion, of Wallingford was elected a member of the board of directors, filling the vacancy by the death of Dr. A. M. Sharpe.

Unanimously re-elected for three year terms were Dr. Nancarrow, President; Dr. A. Armin Stecher, first vice-president: Mrs. Griffin.second vicepresident; J. Newton Pew,vicepresident and treasurer;LeRoy F. F. Wright, assistant treasurer.

It was announced during the meeting that the 1964 Christmas Seal campaign reached an all time high with total receipts coming to \$121,178.,an increase of approximately 2% over the previous year.Seven hundred and forty-two volunteers contributed 4,620 hours in preparing Seals for mailing. In other business, 73 sur-

veys conducted during the past year, reached 35,972 persons, an increase of 8,085 over those x-rayed during 1963.In addition, 7.634 students in 22 high schools were tuberculin tested with 267 or 3.5% reacting to the test. Diabetic testing conducted in five communities and one industry netted a total of 1,934 persons. Sixty of these were referred to physicians for further study.

Through the association's film library, 321 films were viewed 1,245 times reaching a total of 54,744 persons.



KIRKBRIDE Name \$2,800,000 Hall For Wallingford Man

Pennsylvania Military College's \$2.8 million science engineering building will be named Kirkbride Hall of Science and Engineering in honor of Chalmer G. Kirkbride, according to an announcement made by Dr. Clarence R. Moll, president of PMC. Kirkbride is a director of Sun Oil Company and vice president in charge of research and engineering. The four-story,87,000 square

foot structure is scheduled to be ready for use in September. will house classrooms, laboratories, research facilities and offices for the College's science and engineering divisions.

In making the announcement, Dr. Moll cited Kirkbride's varied contributions. "PMC is proud to perpetually identify Mr. Kirkbride with the College," he said. "His accomplishments as a scientist. engineer, educator, administrator and inventor have been of the highest distinction."

Kirkbride joined Sun Oil in 1956 after serving as president and board chairman of Houdry Process Corporation (now Houdry Process and Chemical Company, a division of Air Products and Chemicals, Inc.).

A native of Tyrone, Okla., Kirkbride received both bachelor and master of science in engineering degrees from the University of Michigan. In 1930, he began his career in engineering with the research department of Standard Oil Company of Indiana. In 1934 he transferred to the Indiana subsidiary Pan American Refining Corporation (now American Oil Company) as assistant director of research, and in 1942 he became chief of chemical engineering development at Magnolia Petroleum Company (now part of Mobil Oil Company).

From 1944 to 1947, Kirkbride served as Distinguished Professor of Chemical Engineering at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas.
