The 60 doll collection of Mrs. James L. Rosier, Cedar Lane, forms a charming and instructive early December exhibit at the Swarthmore Public Library.

The Library's young readers enjoy the dolls which have obviously been friends and playmates of their owner. Mrs. Rosier's late father, a doctor on the staff of the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., and his associate physicians brought dolls to Mrs. Rosier which they purchased in the regions and countries where their profession took them so that she found herself with a doll collection when very young.

All the dolls are more than 35 years old. Many are from this hemisphere. Europe and Asia are well represented with two from Africa included. A Victorian family group and a Chinese family of small dolls are most interesting.

The Librarians have rounded out the exhibit with books whose stories are set in the countries where the dolls originated, including a theme volume, "Doll Collecting" by Helen Young.

Warning To Trespassers

Police Chief William G. Weidner this week issued a warning that high school students and others trespassing on the railroad tracks will be arrested and prosecuted.

Weidner appealed to parents to counsel their youngsters at home after railroad officials and local residents had complained of the increasing practice of some children to walk across the tracks instead of using the Princeton Avenue and Chester road underpasses. The railroad has threatened to send its own detectives out to apprehend offenders as it did two years ago.

Weidner said he reported the matter to school authorities after 47 students were observed crossing the tracks near Princeton Avenue at lunch time one day and two had played "chicken" on the tracks.

On Monday of this week four students, age 11, 13, 14, and 15 were warned when they were caught placing coins on the tracks. The two eldest ones defied the oncoming train so that the engineer had to reach for the brakes, Weidner said.

School authorities said notices had been read in home rooms, the matter was discussed at a meeting of the seventh grade class, and the older students who had been identified were "talked to."

They said the delapidated fence which separates the cinder path at the rear of the school grounds from the tracks, and has been repaired at times by the Borough, is broken again. However, they acknowledged that while a hole in the fence may be a temptation to walk across the tracks, it does not absolve anyone from the responsibility of refraining from this illegal and dangerous act.

Police Chief Weidner said, "We are tired of chasing offenders and warning offenders. We have made every endeavor to end the track crossing, so in future we will prosecute."

The only honor they didn't capture was the Chairman's Cup, which went to major employee campaigns, one of the drive's nine major fund-raising departments, reporting \$5,433,131 in gifts.

However, for the Delaware County Department, which conducts its campaign throughout all of the county, except for Chester and vicinity, Russell C. Jenkins of Wallingford, chairman, reported \$304,056 or 102.4 per cent of its \$300,000 goal. The gifts included \$5,164 in completed assignments.

The Delaware County performance, added to those of eight other departments and the efforts of some 45,000 volunteers in the Greater Philadelphia Area, gave the Torch Drive a resounding victory with \$15,272,880 in gifts for 100.2 per cent of its \$15,250,000 goal for the benefit of 250 voluntary health and welfare agencies and services, 20 of which directly serve Delaware County.

Zone Chairman P. Dooley of Wallingford reported \$62,760 or 99.2 per cent. The total for Central Delaware County Division was \$30,473 or 97.7 per cent, according to a report by Arthur B. Kent of Swarthmore, division chairman.

District reports were as follows: Harold Keller, Jr., of Springfield, for West Springfield, \$4,308 or 105.5 per cent; Mrs. James Sorber and Mrs. Richard Noyes for Swarthmore, \$21,246 or 95.7 per cent; Kenneth Wicks, of Springfield, for East Springfield, \$1,001 or 104.8 per cent; Kent for Seacane-Holmes, \$629 or 63.8 per cent; Donald McKinney, of Rutledge for Folsom-Rutledge, \$529 or 74.2 per cent; George E. Otnium, of Springfield for Springfield-Morton, \$1,820 or 154.5 per cent; and Kent for Springfield Business, \$929 or 84.2 per cent.

Jenkins urged all volunteers who have completed assignments to complete those assignments at 11:11 outstanding throughout all districts in the county's four zones, with the deadline for clean-up set for December 7.
