Judge Diggins To Speak Mon. Law, Youth, Topic LWV Open Meeting

Judge John V. Diggins, serving his second 10-year term on the bench of the Delaware County Courts, will address a community meeting sponsored by the Swarthmore League of Women Voters at 8 p.m. Monday, April 4, in Whittier House on the college campus.

A member of Pennsylvania's Advisory Council of Judges in the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, Judge Diggins will discuss "Law Enforcement, Youth Guidance and Civic Responsibility," a subject which the league has studied this year in a special committee headed by Mrs. C. Paul Bianchi.

A native of Chester, Judge Diggins attended that city's schools before going on to graduate from George Washington University and later serve in the U.S. Marine Corps.

He is a member of the Pennsylvania and District of Columbia Bars, the Pennsylvania and American Bar Associations, the Bar of the Appellate Courts of Pennsylvania, the Federal District Courts and the Supreme Court of the United States.

He had 28 years' experience as a lawyer, serving as solicitor for several municipalities, school districts, the County Controller and as special Counsel for the banking department of the Pennsylvania Department of Justice, before his appointment to the Common Pleas Court of Delaware County in January 1954.

He was endorsed by both Republican and Democratic parties for election to a full term in 1956, and for reelection last year.

Judge Diggins is a member of the executive committee of the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges, and a member of the committee on expediting civil trials, Judicial Administration Section of Pennsylvania Bar Association.

A historian, author and ardent sportsman he has also been active in civic affairs, currently heading the County's March of Dimes for the National Foundation.

To Direct Concert

Rare Musical Treat at College Chorus, Orchestra To Give 'Boris Godunov'

The Swarthmore College Chorus and Orchestra under the direction of Arthur Komar will give a rare concert performance of Modest Mussorgsky's "Boris Godunov" with the original orchestration. The concert will be held in Clothier Memorial on the campus at 8:15 p.m. on Saturday, April 9.

It is unusual that "Boris Godunov" be performed with the composer's original score. Most frequently it is done in a revised edition by Rimski-Korsakov. In order to obtain the original music it was necessary for Mr. Komar to borrow a copy from the Oxford University Press.

Soloists for the evening will include Emil Markow as Boris. Mr. Markow is a member of the voice faculty at West Chester State Teacher's College. Other soloists will be:

Dr. James Clark, tenor soloist of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church; James Wanner of the Swarthmore College Astronomy Department; and students, Kit Ashburn, John Bennett, John Morrel, Joseph Gatewood and Julian Lopez-Morillas.

The college chorus will be assisted by the Boys Choir of Trinity Church, Swarthmore, which is directed by Robert Smart.

The performance will be in concert form and in the original Russian. Excerpts planned for the evening include the coronation scene, the monologue and clock scenes from Act II, and the death and forest scenes from Act IV. The performance is free and open to the public.

70% RETURN CENSUS FORMS

Faculty Turnover At Eight in SHS Humanities Studies To Continue Next Year

Loss of the District's two German teachers and an art teacher taking a sabbatical next year (coupled with previously-announced vacancies created by death, retirement, and leave) bring the faculty turnover on the high school level to a total of eight, said Dr. Harry Kingham at Monday night's meeting of the School Board.

This is double the number of replacements anticipated in the elementary school. Usually the reverse-ratio exists, reported Dr. Kingham, district superintendent.

Announcement of the resignation of Hans Meurer to become associate professor of German at Shippensburg State College and of the retirement of Russell L. Snyder after a teaching career of 38 years, was made at the meeting. James R. Galnor's request for sabbatical was also honored at the session.

Resignations of kindergarten teacher Mrs. Marjorie Emmer and fourth grade teacher Mrs. Kathleen Gilmore were also received. Mrs. Barbara J. Welborn of 506 Harvard avenue, a graduate of Hildale College who has been teaching at the Presbyterian Nursery School for the past six years, was elected to replace Mrs. Emmer. Mrs. Joseph E. Spafford of 9 College avenue, is serving for the balance of this school year in place of Mrs. Gilmore who has already left. Mrs. Spafford is a graduate of Washington University.

death of Walter Brinsfield, superintendent of buildings and grounds, last Friday. High tribute was paid to Mr. Brinsfield as a "man of great personal integrity and an exceptionally skilled worker."

Dr. Kingham said the six-week experimental periods of humanities studies in 10th, 11th and 12th grades this year were generally considered worthwhile by teachers and parents and would be continued next year. However, he said it is hoped that a new scheduling arrangement can be reached so that these classes will interrupt the regular courses less noticeably.

Dr. Kingham revealed a plan to have fourth grade teachers remain a month this summer to develop a curriculum guide for this level. He said teachers of special subjects would lend part time assistance and the project would be supervised by Elementary Principal Melvin Drunken, Mrs. Wilma Lewis of the high school faculty and himself. He anticipated the cost would be about \$2500 and that the guide would greatly aid new teachers as well as provide a framework for the programs of present ones.

The superintendent also expressed hope that a third guidance counselor could be added to the high school staff. He said the increasing demands of the college admissions program made it highly advisable to place this work in the hands of one person, and retain two others for varied guidance functions needed in grades seven through 11. He said it might be possible to make adjustments when filling the staff requirements for next year, so that the extra guidance person could be secured without an actual increase in the overall number of persons on the faculty.

Proposal Would Limit Apt. Construction

Most of the 100 residents attending the panel discussion on Phase 2 of the Borough Plan, held Monday night at the Rutgers Avenue School, favored a proposal to limit apartment construction.

The audience, attending the meeting sponsored by the League of Women Voters, favored providing apartments for longtime residents, but not enough units to draw 500 newcomers by 1970, as predicted by the plan.

Dr. Charles Gilbert, moderator of the panel, said that no one knows to what extent a community can keep down a population increase. "The wealthier the community and stronger its civic groups, the longer it can hold out. But there are limits," he said. Thomas Hopper, chairman of the commission, said he felt the borough couldn't limit its population because the courts would uphold a reasonable amount of expansion, including apartments. However, Clarence Myers, borough solicitor, said he believed restrictive zoning regulations could be enforced.


Dr. Seymour Kietzler, a panel member, observed that there are not enough apartments to accommodate a 20 percent increase in residents 60 years and older which the borough experienced from 1950 to 1960. Leo Gatwood, another panelist, pointed out that a parking lot for 80 cars along Park and Princeton avenues will replace the freight station which the Pennsylvania Railroad plans to demolish shortly.

The comprehensive plan, costing \$6,200, has been three-quarters financed by the federal government. Phase one called for a study of present land uses; two deals with future plans, and the third will be concerned with necessary zoning changes.

To Hold Dinner Sigma Xi Society
The Swarthmore Chapter of Sigma Xi, a society for the promotion of scientific research, will hold a dinner meeting Thursday, April 14. The annual lecture will be given by Dr. Edell Wassermann of the Bell Telephone Laboratories on the subject of "Chemical Topology."
Dr. Wassermann received his bachelor's degree from Cornell University and his doctorate from Harvard University. He was a National Science Foundation fellow at Harvard from 1953 to 1956 and Visiting Professor of Chemistry at Cornell in 1952-53. He has been associated with Bell Telephone Laboratories since 1957 as a chemist on the technical staff.
Dr. Wassermann has done extensive research on the electronic structure of organic molecules. He was the first to synthesize molecules composed of two interlocking rings of "catenanes." The rings are mirror images of each other, but they are not superimposable, a phenomenon which brings up problems in topology, the mathematical study of geometric configurations.
Faculty members of Swarthmore College will have as their guests for Dr. Wassermann's lecture about 35 secondary school science teachers from nearby communities. Their visit has become a traditional feature of the Sigma Xi lecture.
The lecture will be given in the Dupont Lecture Room at 8:15 p.m., and it is free and open to the public.

In addition to increased parking, the stage and the seating will be altered and air conditioning installed. A lounge will also be created where patrons can relax at intermissions or while the show is in progress.

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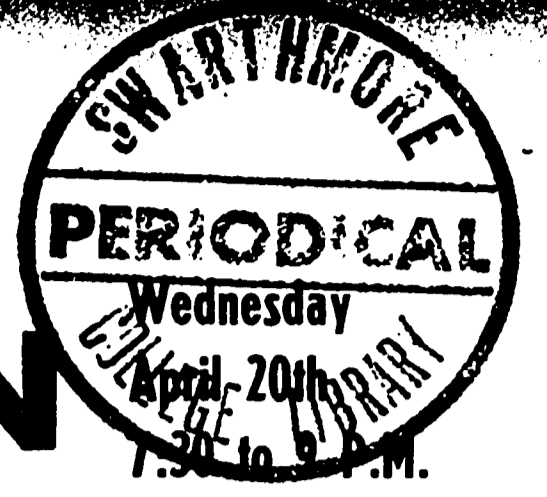

COLLEGE RECEIVES O.E.O. GRANT

\$38,000 Will Support Summer Wade Program. Swarthmore College has received a grant of \$38,072 from the Community Action Program of the Office of Economic Opportunity. It was announced Wednesday by President Courtney Smith. This grant will support an approximately \$42,000 program of tutoring and counseling, which aims to assist a racially integrated group of underprivileged high school students in the vicinity of Chester, to realize their intellectual potential. Selection will shortly be made of present 8th graders, both boys and girls, who show promise for education beyond the high school level, and come primarily from lower income families in the Delaware County area. A group of 60 students will participate in a Swarthmore-Wade House Study Program, an educational day-camp, which will take place five days a week on the Swarthmore College campus for a seven week period starting June 27. Students To Serve. Fourteen Swarthmore College students and one student at the University of Pennsylvania (Medical School) will serve as counselors and instructors, under the educational direction of Donald F. Cheek, doctoral candidate in sociology at Temple University, who serves as Director of Studies. While recreational and cultural activities will be included, the emphasis will be upon active intellectual participation. The program will involve the cooperative effort of many in the Swarthmore College community. Initiative and planning of the summer study phase, as well as follow-up work at other times of the year, will be mainly in the hands of Swarthmore students, working with Mr. Cheek. Memorial Service For Dr. Whitney Physician Had Headed Elwyn School 34 Yrs.

A memorial service conducted by the Rev. Dr. D. Evor Roberts, was held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Presbyterian Church for Dr. E. Arthur Whitney, who died Saturday at Riddle Memorial Hospital. He was 70.

Dr. Whitney, who resided on Sycamore Mill road, Upper Providence, was superintendent of Elwyn Training School for 34 years before his retirement in November of 1960.

Dr. Whitney was introduced to the field of mental retardation as a pre-medical psychology student at Tufts College when he visited the Massachusetts State School, later known as the Walter E. Fernald State School in Waverly, Mass. After his internship in Booth Maternity Hospital, Boston, Mass., and Springfield Hospital, Springfield, Mass., he served as a resident in surgery at New York Hospital, New York City.

In April 1926 he was invited to come to Elwyn as assistant to Dr. Martin W. Barr and when Dr. Barr retired in 1930, was elected his successor.

He was a past president of the Delaware County Medical Society and of the Pennsylvania Mental Hospital Association.
He had been an associate in psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania Medical School and a lecturer at the Philadelphia School of Occupational Therapy for Mental Deficiency and Epilepsy.
He was a member of Swarthmore Presbyterian Church.
He is survived by his widow, the former Sarah Porter.

PUBLIC HEARING ON APRIL 8TH AIRS VIEWS ON PLANNING

Last Wednesday night's public hearing on the Planning Commission's proposed plan for the borough's future was attended by Joseph P. Keene, regional supervisor of Pennsylvania's Bureau of Community Development, William K. Davis, executive director of the Delaware County Planning Commission and about 50 residents including members of Borough Council and the local Commission headed by Thomas Hopper.

Keene, whose office is responsible for administering the Federal Funds which paid two-thirds of the cost of the planning study done jointly by the borough and county commissions, said, "I have been observing progress of this plan since its beginning in January 1963 and encourage the commissions to undertake continuing studies to keep it up to date."

Mrs. Richard Rommel and Mrs. Leroy Peterson presented statements delineating points on which the League of Women Voters and the Democratic Committee, respectively, agreed and disagreed with the plan. Both organizations agreed in general with the goals of the plan but opposed the development of the wooded areas at the elementary school into a formalized recreation area and the landscaping of the two small triangular borough parks. They felt the plan did not sufficiently come to grips with problems of conversions of old homes into apartments, intant traffic and parking.

William Stanton, speaking for Swarthmore College, agreed to the proposed reclassification of the Mary Lyon buildings on Harvard avenue from "apartment" to "college facilities" but said the college wished to retain the "business-residential" status of its property on Chester road between the railroad and Harvard avenue.

Borough solicitor Clarence Myers pointed out several areas in which Borough Council members did not seem in absolute agreement with the plan. He said there seemed to be preference for retaining "non-conforming use" classification for medical centers, tea room and commercial garages now existing in residential areas, rather than rezoning them "commercial."

Numerous individuals expressed concern about the outcome of increasing densities on several residential streets near the business area. County Planner Davis said this would not permit any more subdivision than was possible at present since the borough had never had any specified minimum lot size.

Hopper said the local commission was "not married to the plan but sort of formally engaged to it and trying it out on members of the family." He did not feel that fears that it would "downgrade" the community were justified.

Councilman Edward Cratsley said the Borough must provide for accepting its share in a population increase existing throughout the nation.
Swarthmore Commission member Horace Hopkins suggested that residents consider that a probable ten per cent cost-of-living rise by 1970 would face them with such high taxes that they would not be able to grasp borough and school employees needed salary raises unless the local tax base was increased by measures such as additional apartment houses.

No one will consider it invidious if we mention Mrs. Maurice Webster as the originator and driving force in bringing the Fair to its successful end. But the significant aspect of this event was that it involved hundreds of people, young and old, representing most of the churches, clubs and organizations in Swarthmore. It was a tremendous community effort and cooperative work of United Nations for the betterment of the world's people.

Ambassador Goldberg, U.S. Representative to the United Nations, wrote to us as follows: "...I have said on many occasions that if we did not have a United Nations in existence, we would be busy creating one in order to deal with just the problems we are now concerned with. I am convinced that there is no task so vital as that of keeping the peacekeeping machinery of the United Nations in working order so that it can perform its appointed role of peace maker and peace keeper. 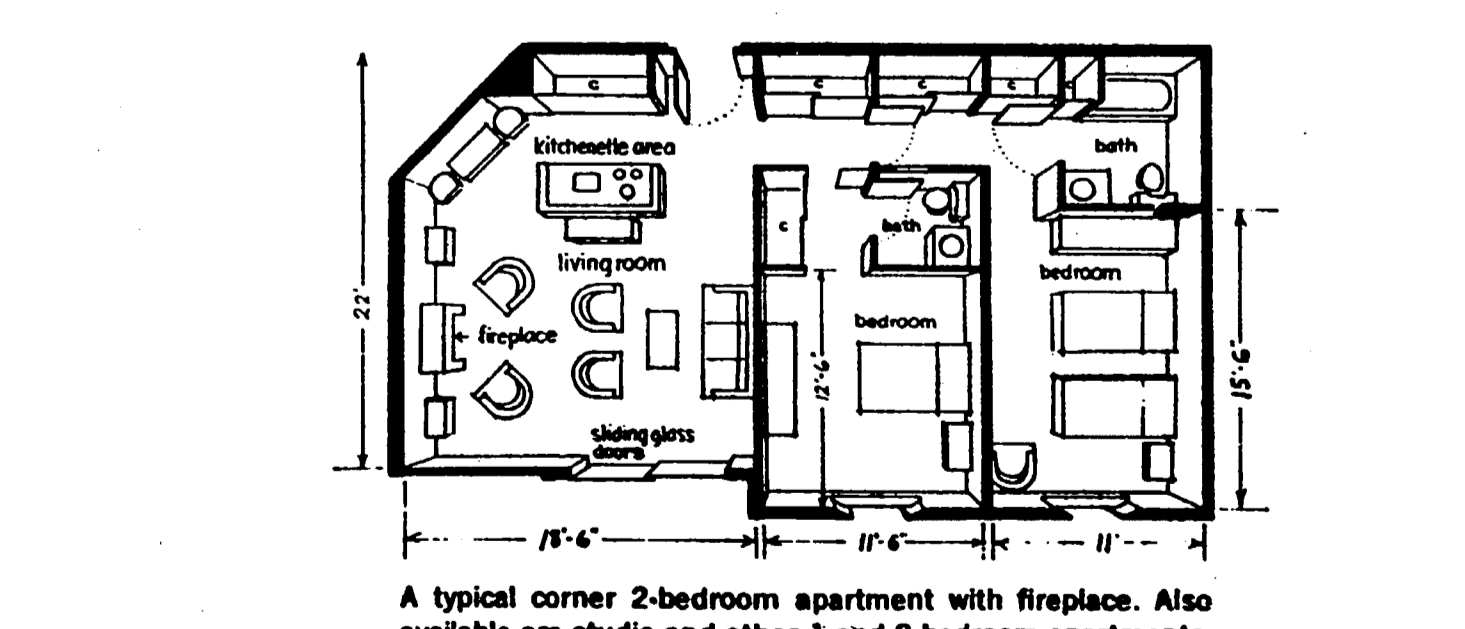

R.J. Littlefield Memorial Monday

Retired RR Executive Was Church Mgr.

A memorial service was held at 4:30 Monday afternoon in the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church for Raymond James Littlefield retired railroad executive, who died of a heart attack Wednesday, April 22 in Great Barrington, Mass., while visiting a sister. Funeral services and burial were held Saturday in Agawan, Mass.

Born 75 years ago in Berwick, Me., Mr. Littlefield had lived in Swarthmore since 1930.

He entered railroad service with the Boston and Maine Railroad in 1908. He was a veteran of World War I and served in France as a major in the transportation corps.

In 1929 he joined the Pennsylvania Railroad as superintendent of motor service. He became general tax agent of the railroad in 1936 and manager of property tax for the company in 1955.

In 1934 he assisted in the organization of the Competitive Transportation Research Division of the Association of American Railroads and was the first regional director of the Eastern Division. From 1949 to 1953 he was chairman of the Eastern Railroads' Presidents Conference.

After retirement, about 10 years ago, he participated in the management of Morganwood and was business manager of the Presbyterian Church here.

It was said of him: "It is because he was so dear to us who worked together with him on the staff that I want to take a moment to speak of him. He was far more than the title 'business manager' might suggest to you, though his steady stewardship brought an orderliness that became essential to the smooth working of the church."

He had recently retired as manager of Morganwood. He was a Mason.

He is survived by his widow, the former Mary Hastings; a son, Thomas H. Littlefield of Albany, N. Y.; a daughter, Mrs. Betty Dallett of Wilmington; a sister, Mrs. Alice McCollum of New Boston, Mass., and five grandchildren.

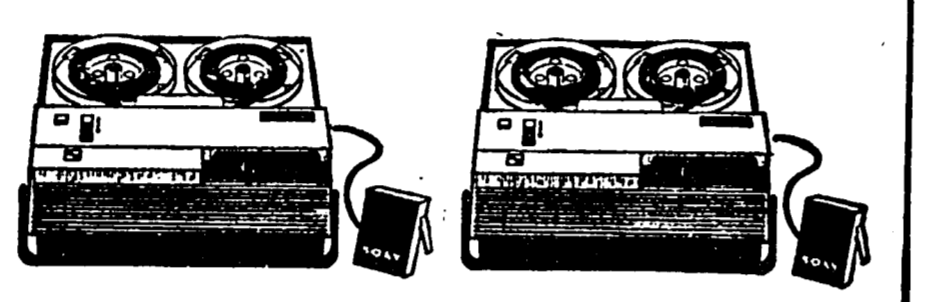

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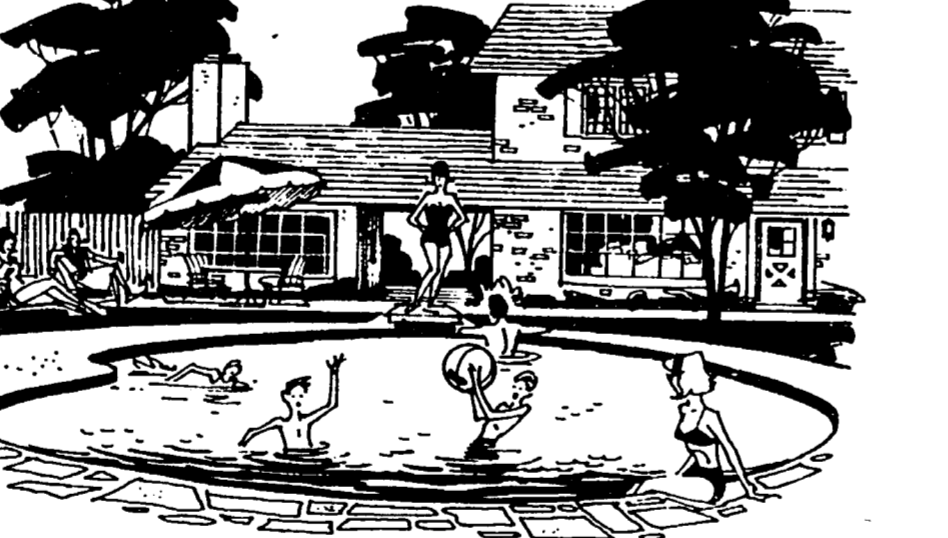

COUNTY TOUR TOMORROW

Trail Traces History In Homes, Gardens

Historic Delaware County's tour of houses, churches, the Delaware County Institute of Science and the Edgmont Golf Club, will take place tomorrow, between the hours of 10 and 5. The theme is Providence Great Road, laid out by order of the Court in 1693, the first road inland from the Delaware River.

However, the path will veer to the east and west between Crum and Ridley Creeks.

Starting with the Thomas Leiper House (which Historic Delaware County took the initiative in saving from the Midcounty Expressway), members of the Scottish Historic and Research Society of the Delaware Valley will greet the visitors with the blaring of bagpipes. Members of the Delaware County chapter of the DAR, some in costumes, will be hostesses.

The estate of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Ward Hinkson, the house, gardens and greenhouses will also be on view. Because of the coming of the expressway the Hinksons are expecting to leave in 1967. Mrs. William A. Clarke's home will be the place to learn about fine antiques.

The Ralph Dills' 1799 stone house at Hinksons Corner and the grounds of the C. L. Jordans are on the tour.

The Cyril Gardner house and studio on Wallingford-road will feature Mr. Gardner's paintings, including one of the portraits, returned from Washington for the occasion, of each of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Possibly the oldest house on the trip is that of Dr. and Mrs. Samuel Conly, Jr., at 322 North Providence road. Just to the north, beyond Plush Mill road, is the stone house of the William Heisters. (Plush Mill Road was the original road to Philadelphia, the Baltimore Pike not being laid out until after 1800.)

Visitors will be met at Providence Friends Meeting by members in Quaker garb. Special exhibit will be three paintings by Richard Eroh, a painting artist from Sun Valley High School.

Before leaving the Media area, where a visit may be made to the handsome Presbyterian Church on Baltimore Pike, some will want to turn south to 620 Manchester Avenue, to the 1780 home of Mrs. Orlando Shoemaker, which is replacing #25, the home of the James A. Cochran's.

Going out from Media there is another house at the Five Points, copied from an old farm house which stood on South Orange street, the Walter Hilber house. On the east side of Providence road, behind the early sandytank graveyard, is the log house of Mrs. Sarah Rouch Cummings.

A stop will be made at Preston road for the garden of the George Stoops. Rose Tree Hunt Club, to become a county park will be open for the day, still with the trophies and furniture which will soon be moved to York. Also on the tour is the home of the Lewis Kirks at 70 Palmers Mill road, and Greendale, the 1832 home of the Richard Bordens at Sycamore Mills and Ridley Creek roads.

Following down through the Sycamore Mills area, where Junior Historians and Scouts will be guiding the cars, the tour returns to Bishop Hollow and Providence roads to the small "Thimble" house, now owned by the Edwards Leipers. The Lewis M. Evans home at Spring Lake road, dates from 1605.

The home of Dr. and Mrs. B. Carson on Gradyville road, will be open only from 1 to 5.

The last main stop, before the Edgmont Country Club, is the home of the John Hampton Barnes. The oldest part of this house dates to 1788, perhaps earlier.

Mrs. Henry C. Patterson of Swarthmore, chairman of the tour, spent several months on the research of these houses and of the area. The first production was an eight page brochure. The second piece, history along the way plus quaint personalities of the past, will be given out to ticket holders on the tour.

Mrs. Duncan G. Foster, also of Swarthmore, reports that the Swarthmore bus is well filled, but that there may still be places in the Newtown Square bus, which will be coming to the Hinkson house for its first stop. Those wishing to board it there may phone her for a reservation, KI-7-1739. Both buses will stop for lunch in Media. Profits of the tour will be used for preservation of historic houses in the county.

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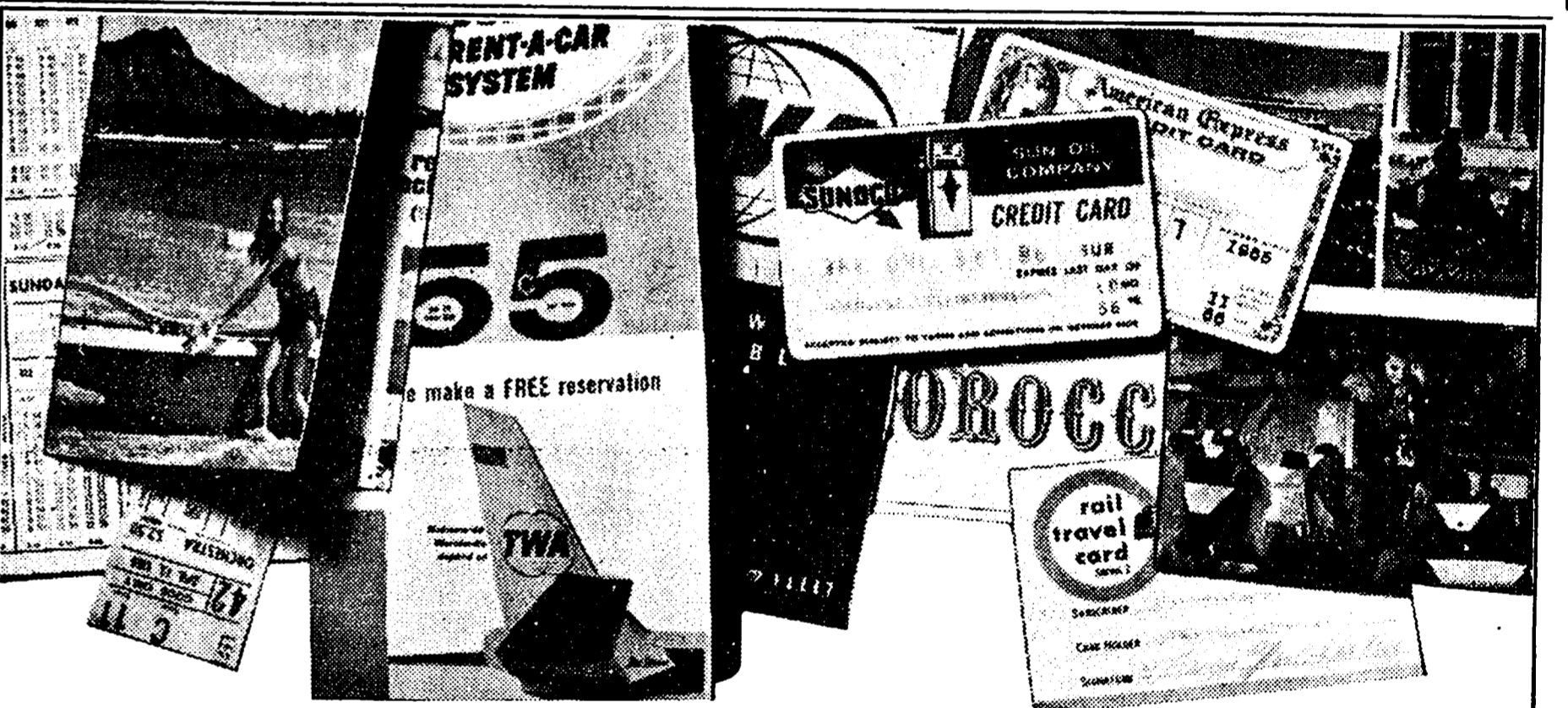
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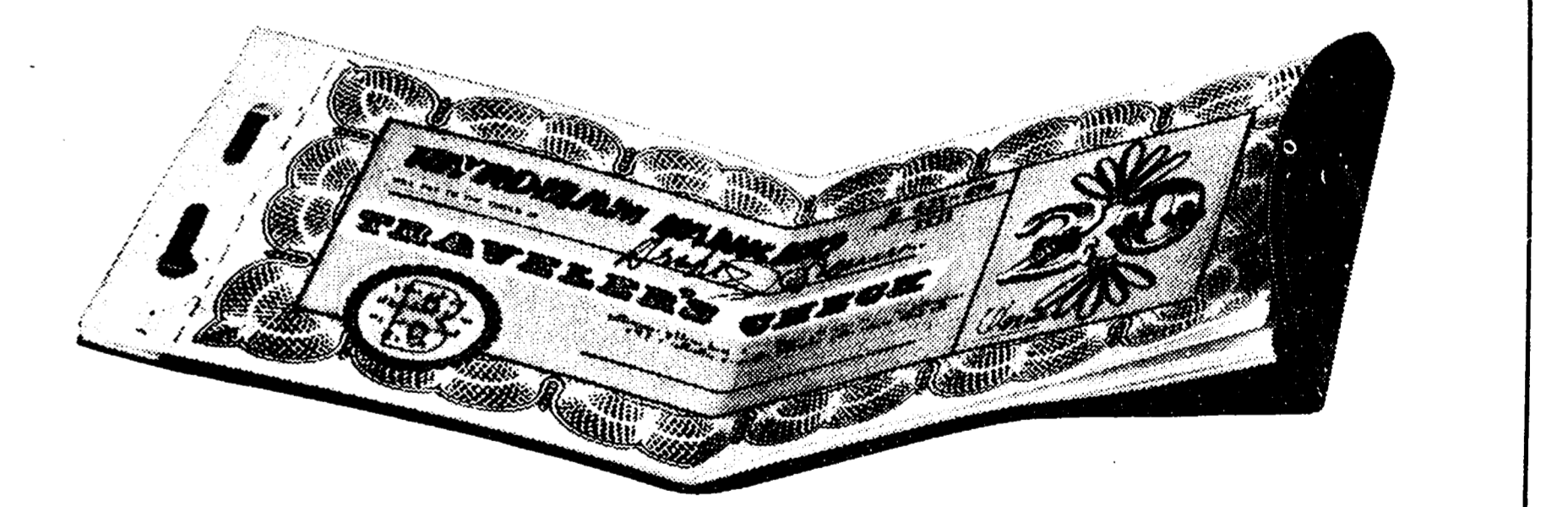

This is the fourth year Swarthmore High School has had a Future Teachers of America Club. This year's FTA officers - president Sally James, vice president Sally Ross, treasurer Ann Shugarts, and secretary Nancy Field, with the guidance of the club's adviser, Miss Leora Raynor - are concluding an exciting year's program by inviting the entire student body to take part in creative writing on topics for the observance of April - Teaching Career Month. The titles suggested to the students were:

Kindergarten through Grade 3 - I Like My Teacher; My Teacher Helps Everyone.

Grades 4 - 6 - My Teacher Understands Me; Lessons Grow Exciting in Grade 4-5-6.

Grades 7 - 9 - My Teacher Encourages Me; My Teacher Has Good Ideas.

Grades 10 - 12 - I Appreciate a Good Teacher; If I Were a Teacher, I Would Want to be Like My (sub.) Teacher.

1st Grader Ideas
A Swarthmore first grade class compiled these ideas from oral discussion:

"Our Teacher Helps Everyone - To think; to rhyme words; to figure out the words by correcting our papers and work-books; and to climb down the monkey bars.

"We Like Our Teacher Because - She's nice, pretty, and wears eye shadow; she likes us and plays with us; she's a mother; and she takes us out for recess."

4th Grader Views
A Swarthmore fourth grade decided to compile the best views of its creative writings:

"Lessons Grow Exciting in Grade 4 - We like being in fourth grade. We think it is fun. We have been doing many exciting things.

"We like to learn about different countries in social studies. The projects our teacher suggests are interesting. Sometimes we make book-lets and charts. Sometimes we make models and maps. The school librarian helps us find information in the library.

"Every Tuesday afternoon we have our "Community Hour." People come and talk to us about our social studies or science. We are studying about India now. A visitor who had taken a bicycle trip in India came to tell us about it. He told us funny animal stories.

"We go on field trips almost every month. When we were studying about Japan, we went to the Philadelphia Museum of Art to see a Japanese exhibit. We went to the Franklin Institute to the Planetarium when we were studying about space in science.

"Every Wednesday our science teacher talks to all the fourth grades on science, shows us slides, and does experiments for us. It is interesting.

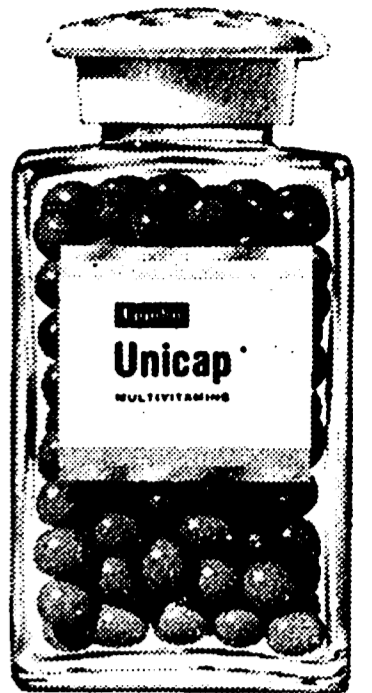
ings. We are writing letters to children in a Japanese school. "We are starting to learn French. Our French teacher makes it fun. She praises us when we do it right.

"We have fun in fourth grade and we learn many exciting things."



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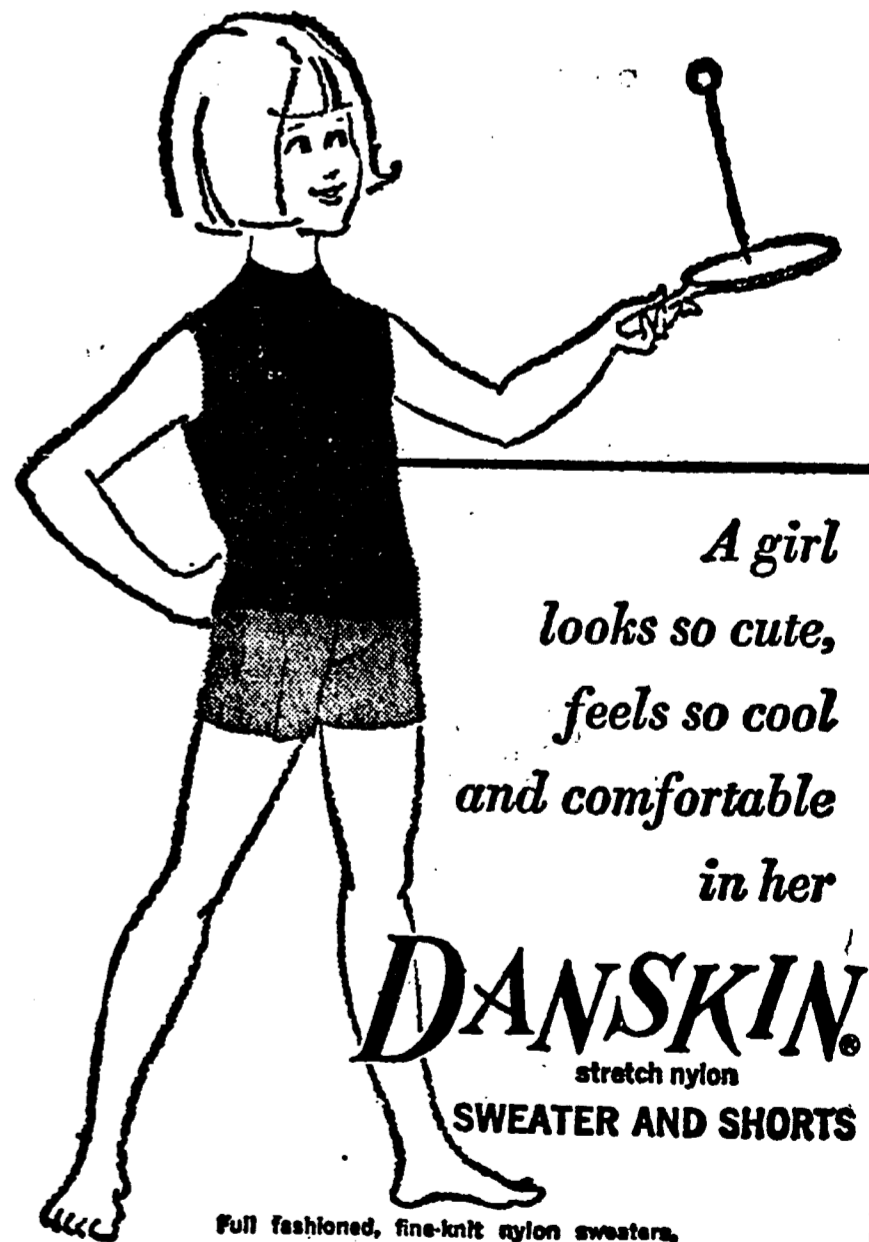

Future Teachers Conduct Program S-R Students Join In Creative Writing Plan

This is the fourth year Swarthmore High School has had a Future Teachers of America Club. This year's FTA officers - president Sally James, vice president Sally Ross, treasurer Ann Shugarts, and secretary Nancy Field, with the guidance of the club's adviser, Miss Leora Raynor - are concluding an exciting year's program by inviting the entire student body to take part in creative writing on topics for the observance of April - Teaching Career Month. The titles suggested to the students were:

Kindergarten through Grade 3 - I Like My Teacher; My Teacher Helps Everyone.

Grades 4 - 6 - My Teacher Understands Me; Lessons Grow Exciting in Grade 4-5-6.

Grades 7 - 9 - My Teacher Encourages Me; My Teacher Has Good Ideas.

Grades 10 - 12 - I Appreciate a Good Teacher; If I Were a Teacher, I Would Want to be Like My (subj.) Teacher.

1st Grader Ideas
A Swarthmore first grade class compiled these ideas from oral discussion:

"Our Teacher Helps Everyone - To think; to rhyme words; to figure out the words by correcting our papers and workbooks; and to climb down the monkey bars."

"We Like Our Teacher Because - She's nice, pretty, and wears eye shadow; she likes us and plays with us; she's a mother; and she takes us out for recess."

4th Grader Views
A Swarthmore fourth grade decided to compile the best views of its creative writings: "Lessons Grow Exciting in Grade 4 - We like being in fourth grade. We think it is fun. We have been doing many exciting things."

"We like to learn about different countries in social studies. The projects our teacher suggests are interesting. Sometimes we make booklets and charts. Sometimes we make models and maps. The school librarian helps us find information in the library."

"Every Tuesday afternoon we have our 'Community Hour.' People come and talk to us about our social studies or science. We are studying about India now. A visitor who had taken a bicycle trip in India came to tell us about it. He told us funny animal stories."

"We go on field trips almost every month. When we were studying about Japan, we went to the Philadelphia Museum of Art to see a Japanese exhibit. We went to the Franklin Institute to the Planetarium when we were studying about space in science."

"Every Wednesday our science teacher talks to all the fourth grades on science, shows us slides, and does experiments for us. It is interesting."

"In art, the teacher helps us to make things about our science and social studies. When we were studying Norway some of the boys made a great big picture of a Viking boat and a sea monster."

"We change classes for arithmetic and reading. In arithmetic we have learned new ways to add, subtract, multiply, and divide. Some of us have been using S.R.A. in reading. Once a week we go to the library during reading class. We like that."

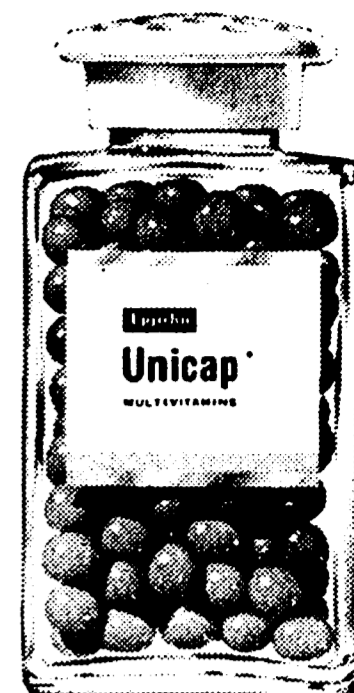
"Another thing we like to do is creative writing. Our teacher suggests so many interesting topics. Once we wrote about an old coin. Another time we wrote about a haunted house picture which our teacher's son had drawn. Sometimes we finish stories or express our feel-

ings. We are writing letters to children in a Japanese school. "We are starting to learn French. Our French teacher makes it fun. She praises us when we do it right."

Learn Flutophone
"Our music teachers are getting us ready for a Mothers' Surprise program. We are learning the flutophone and some of us take musical instrument lessons. We like music. Some of us play in the school band or orchestra."

"Our class has given two plays. One was a science play on the planets. The other was a Christmas play on Germany. Mrs. Scott, who lived in Germany, helped us make it authentic."

"Christmas time was wonderful. We did so many things we liked. One was to go to the Philadelphia Free Library to see a collection of rare books about Christmas. Our teacher taught us about some famous Christmas art. We decorated our room and had a party. "We have fun in fourth grade and we learn many exciting things."



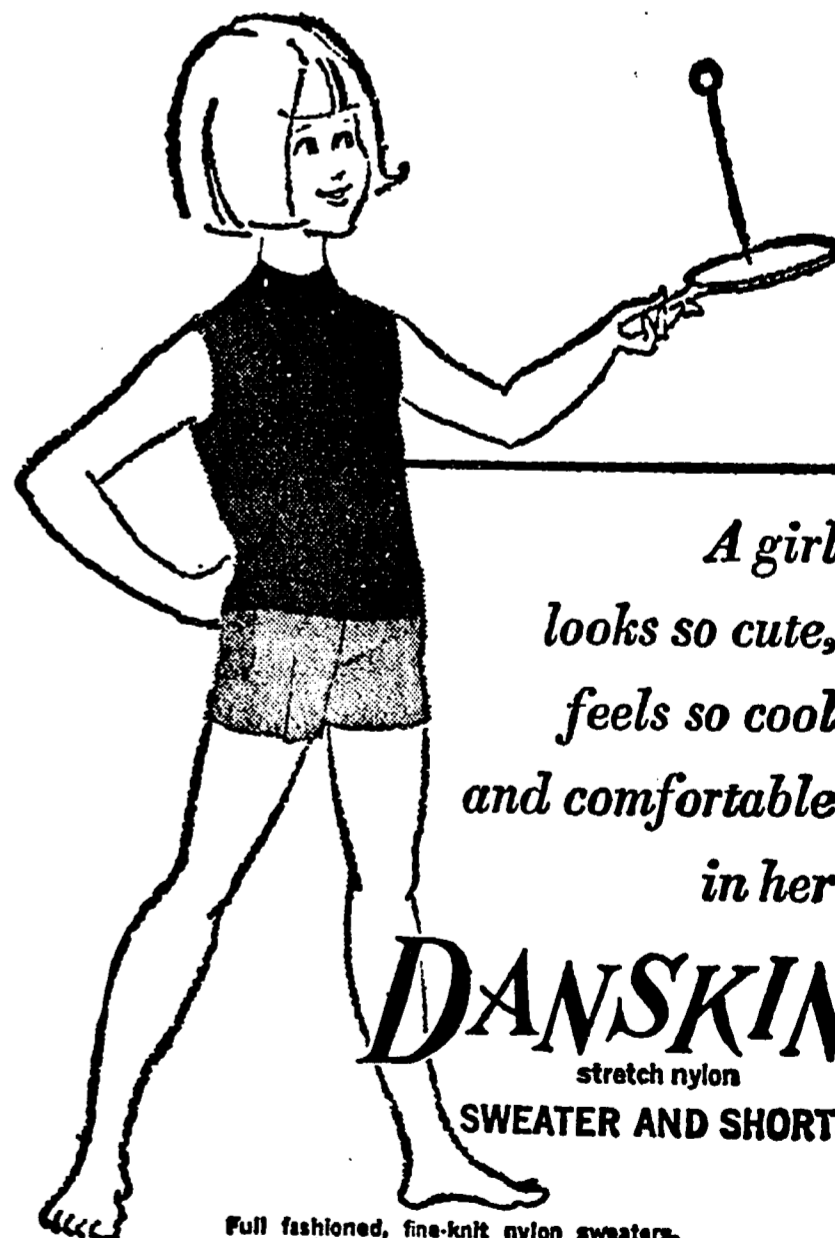
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
