Present 'Three Penny Opera' Players, R.V. Chorus In Joint Production

The Players Club of Swarthmore and the Rose Valley Chorus are presenting this week and next the Kurt Weill-Bertold Brecht musical "The Three Penny Opera" at the club's little theater on Fairview road.

Performances tonight and tomorrow, for Players Club members and friends are at 8:20 p.m. Performances next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 8, 9 and 10, will be at 8:30 p.m. Additional information for next week may be secured by telephoning 565-2361.

Based on Gay's "Beggar's Opera" the Weill-Brecht collaboration took shape during the years of depression and disillusionment in Germany's pre-Nazi era, when The Beggar was Everyman, buffeted by circumstance and no longer the master of his own destiny.

Brecht's biting social commentary and Weill's trenchant, tuneful score (which earned for both the intense disapproval of the New Order in Germany), have produced what is shaping up to be one of the most durable "little operas" of our time, and one that promises to be as much of an all-time classic as the much more recent off-Broadway "Fantasticks."

Jean Proctor of Wallingford directs the production, James Greene is musical director and conductor; accompanists are Dolores Bronecke and Inez Chapman.

Diabetic Testing Also Scheduled Thursday

A chest x-ray survey and Diabetic testing will be given in Swarthmore next Tuesday, December 6 at the Borough Parking Lot, Lafayette and Dartmouth avenues, for adults 18 years of age and older.

Hours for both the x-rays for adults 18 years of age and older, and the Diabetic testing for those 21 and older, will be to 8:30 p.m.

Tuesday's visit is one of five to be conducted next week in the county under the direction of the county Tuberculosis and Health Association and the Pennsylvania Department of Health, Division of TB Control, in cooperation with the county Medical Society. The work of the TB Association is supported entirely by the annual Christmas Seal Campaign.

Toshiko Takaezu, potter, weaver and sculptor, will visit the college campus December 6-9 as the Marjorie Heilman Visiting Artist for 1966. An exhibition of her pottery and weaving will open in the Wilcox Gallery at the college Tuesday, December 6, at 8 p.m.

In connection with her visit, a film on potting will be shown in the DuPont Lecture Room on the campus Wednesday, December 7, at 8:15 p.m.

Toshiko Takaezu was born and raised in Hawaii, although her family came from Japan. She studied art in Hawaii and undertook specialized training in pottery, weaving and sculpture at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. She has taught in several institutions and serves as director of ceramics at the Cleveland Institute of Art in Cleveland. She has participated in numerous exhibitions and one man shows, including the Brussels World Fair and the Ostend International Exhibition. Her work is in 30 permanent collections of universities, colleges and galleries.

During the past summer Miss Takaezu was awarded a citation at the International Crafts Exhibition at Stuttgart, Germany. This is the first year that an American has received an award.

The Marjorie Heilman Visiting Artist each year talks with the students of the College and demonstrates the techniques he has evolved in his work as well as presenting an exhibition.

GIVES LEDGER

Gift To College Adds To Auden Collection

has given a ledger in which he wrote the first drafts of many poems in 1932, to the Swarthmore College Library Auden was a member of the Swarthmore College community from autumn 1942 to spring 1945, teaching courses in English literature, writing articles for the student newspaper, lecturing at various functions, reviewing College plays, and serving on committees for the judgment of student poetry.

In 1964 at the College's centennial commencement, Auden was awarded an honorary degree. Thus he was on the mailing list for the Swarthmore Alumni Bulletin, where he read in a 1964 issue that the College Library was establishing a W. H. Auden Collection and was asking Bulletin readers for material, such as copies of magazines in which his poems first appeared and undergraduate papers on which the

teacher Auden wrote his criticism and comments. Auden himself heeded this request and gave the ledger, the most important acquisition of its young collection.

The ledger is a book 9" x 14," containing 146 pages. Auden used it as a work book, in which he wrote drafts of poems and essays; it covers the period from September, 1932 to the end of 1934. Early drafts of many of his writings of that period are in it - poems published in "Look, Stranger," Auden's second volume of poems, published in 1936, a long speech from "The Dog Beneath the Skin," which Auden wrote with Christopher Isher-





'Spiritual Discovery Key To Mystery Lecturer Says

"The mystery of creation" can only be solved by "spiritual discovery," a Christian Science lecturer said here on Dec. 6. | 71. Lack of spiritual insight "has hampered mankind's

gress," he declared. Our need is to "understand God as the! primal cause of all true being" -- to see the underlying reality of life as "wholly spiritual. dwelling within God." The lecturer described this view of the universe as a "spiritual awakening" which can have profound effects on man, in-

cluding healing. Thomas A. McClain, C.S.B., of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, was the speaker, under the sponsorship of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Swarthmore. An audience in the church edifice heard the lecture titled "The Key to the Mystery of Creation."

Mr. McClain said that the contradiction of good and evil. spirit and matter, is "the mystery of creation" which people are still trying to solve. He called this dualism the "doublemindedness of material sense." a concept of creation based on matter; and said the only way out of it is "spiritual

awakening." In this awakening, "the Christ comes to human consciousness, dissolves the seeming mixture, and reveals our spiritual selfhood as God's image." It liftsmankind "above matter and evil to conscious unity with God." It "reveals man's eternal oneness with the Father," and enables us to discover our real selfhood in Christ."

"There's no dualism here," Mr. McClain declared. "Spiritual creation is a divine oneness of being -- the activity of the divine Mind expressing itself. "This oneness of being is the key that unlocks the mystery of creation," said the lecturer. "It clears away the distortions and contradictions of being," and "reveals the practical possibilities of the Master's declaration, 'be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect"

Sin, disease, and other evils forgeries scribbled on the tablet of being," he declared. "It's important that we waken and remove these errors from

the same grounds that sin is to bring family and friends to | rejected," Mr. McClain noted. Healing on this basis, he said, "is a progressive step in the restoration to human consciousness of man's spiritual identity and oneness with

"This is the Christ way of healing," he asserted, in which 'absolute reliance on God is both imperative and natural." Such healing requires "much prayer and discipline," he added, but also emphasized it's

"not an intellectual process" -it's impossible to simply "think" yourself into it. It's a process of "spiritual growth," he said. "It's an adventure of the heart, not an exercise of will. "The objective is spiritual regeneration, being born







About 4000 older people in Delaware County will have received hospital treatment under medicare by the end of the year, according to Harry R. Peterman, social security district manager in Chester. Some of these? people will also be eligible for extended care benefits when the second step of the medicare program goes into

effect January 1. Starting January, Peterman said, persons 65 and over who have been hospitalized for at least three days since medicare started last July may be eligible for payment of the costs of continued treatment in a skilled nursing home that qualifies for participation in medicare. Medicare can pay all the basic costs of up to 20 days and all but \$5 a day for an additional 80 days. To qualify, the person must have entered an extended care facility for continued treatment within 14 days of leaving the hospital, following his hospital stay.

Extended care is a special kind of benefit needed by only a limited number of those who are hospitalized. It is designed to provide skilled nursing care at less cost than hospital care for those who no longer need the intensive care of a hospitál. Only this skilled nursing care, generally needed for a short period, will be paid for by medicare. Long-

term custodial care in a nursing home is not covered. A leaflet with information







Thanks to Congressional pressures and to a generally awakened public, safety features in cars have just re-Many new cars models boast padded instrument panels and and back seat belts, and exterior rear view mirrors, but all too many cars have neglected to add these important features. Starting in 1967 they will become part of the Government's safety standard. However, there are many other improvements that can be made to aid driving safety:

Door handles should minimize the chances of accidental openings; tail lights should be visible from the side to warn traffic as when backing out of a driveway; control knobs or levers should be clearly marked and separated according to their functions; the speed of the windshield wipers should be adjustable for different driving conditions; and horns must be easily accessible in case of emergencies.

The final responsibility for safety, of course, rests with the drivers themselves. No trimmed shrubbery or safety gimmicks can save the reckless driver from self-destruction or keep him from killing others. Therefore, driver education nust be stressed both in the high schools and in the general public. All drivers should be constantly reminded of the rules portance of driving safely. 



Door handles should minimize the chances of accidental openings; tail lights should be visible from the side to warn traffic as when backing out of a driveway; control knobs or levers should be clearly marked and separated according to their functions; the speed of the windshield wipers should be adjustable for different driving conditions; and horns must be easily accessible in case of

emergencies. The final responsibility for safety, of course, rests with the drivers themselves. No trimmed shrubbery or safety gimmicks can save the reckless driver from self-destruction or keep him from killing others. Therefore, driver education must be stressed both in the high schools and in the general public. All drivers should be constantly reminded of the rules of the road and of the importance of driving safely. Only if this is achieved can we ever hope to stem the slaughter on our nation's highways.
