Present 'Three Penny Opera' Players, R.V. Chorus In Joint Production

The Players Club of Swarthmore and the Rose Valley Chorus are presenting this week and next the Kurt Weill-Bertold Brecht musical "The Three Penny Opera" at the club's little theater on Fairview road. Performances tonight and tomorrow, for Players Club members and friends are at 8:20 p.m. Performances next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 8, 9 and 10, will be at 8:30 p.m. Additional information for next week may be secured by telephoning 565-2361.

Based on Gay's "Beggars Opera" the Weill-Brecht collaboration took shape during the years of depression and disillusionment in Germany's pre-Nazi era, when The Beggar was Everyman, buffeted by circumstance and no longer the master of his own destiny.

Brecht's biting social commentary and Weill's trenchant, tuneful score (which earned for both the intense disapproval of the New Order in Germany), have produced what is shaping up to be one of the most durable "little operas" of our time, and one that promises to be as much of an all-time classic as the much more recent off-Broadway "Fantasticks."

Jean Proctor of Wallingford directs the production, James Greene is musical director and conductor; accompanists are Dolores Bronecke and Inez Chapman.

Diabetic Testing Also Scheduled Thursday

A chest x-ray survey and Diabetic testing will be given in Swarthmore next Tuesday, December 6 at the Borough Parking Lot, Lafayette and Dartmouth avenues, for adults 18 years of age and older.

Hours for both the x-rays for adults 18 years of age and older, and the Diabetic testing for those 21 and older, will be to 8:30 p.m.

Tuesday's visit is one of five to be conducted next week in the county under the direction of the county Tuberculosis and Health Association and the Pennsylvania Department of Health, Division of TB Control, in cooperation with the county Medical Society. The work of the TB Association is supported entirely by the annual Christmas Seal Campaign.

Toshiko Takaezu, potter, weaver and sculptor, will visit the college campus December 6-9 as the Marjorie Hellman Visiting Artist for 1966. An exhibition of her pottery and weaving will open in the Wilcox Gallery at the college Tuesday, December 6, at 8 p.m.

In connection with her visit, a film on potting will be shown in the DuPont Lecture Room on the campus Wednesday, December 7, at 8:15 p.m.

Toshiko Takaezu was born and raised in Hawaii, although her family came from Japan. She studied art in Hawaii and undertook specialized training in pottery, weaving and sculpture at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. She has taught in several institutions and serves as director of ceramics at the Cleveland Institute of Art in Cleveland. She has participated in numerous exhibitions and one man shows, including the Brussels World Fair and the Ostend International Exhibition. Her work is in 30 permanent collections of universities, colleges and galleries.

During the past summer Miss Takaezu was awarded a citation at the International Crafts Exhibition at Stuttgart, Germany. This is the first year that an American has received an award.

The Marjorie Hellman Visiting Artist each year talks with the students of the College and demonstrates the techniques he has evolved in his work as well as presenting an exhibition.

Smoker Heads Opera Festival

N.Y. 'Met' To Visit Phila. Next Spring

Edward H. Smoker, Wallingford, president of the United Gas Improvement Co., has been appointed chairman of the 1967 Festival of Opera to be presented by the Metropolitan Opera next spring at the Philadelphia Civic Center.

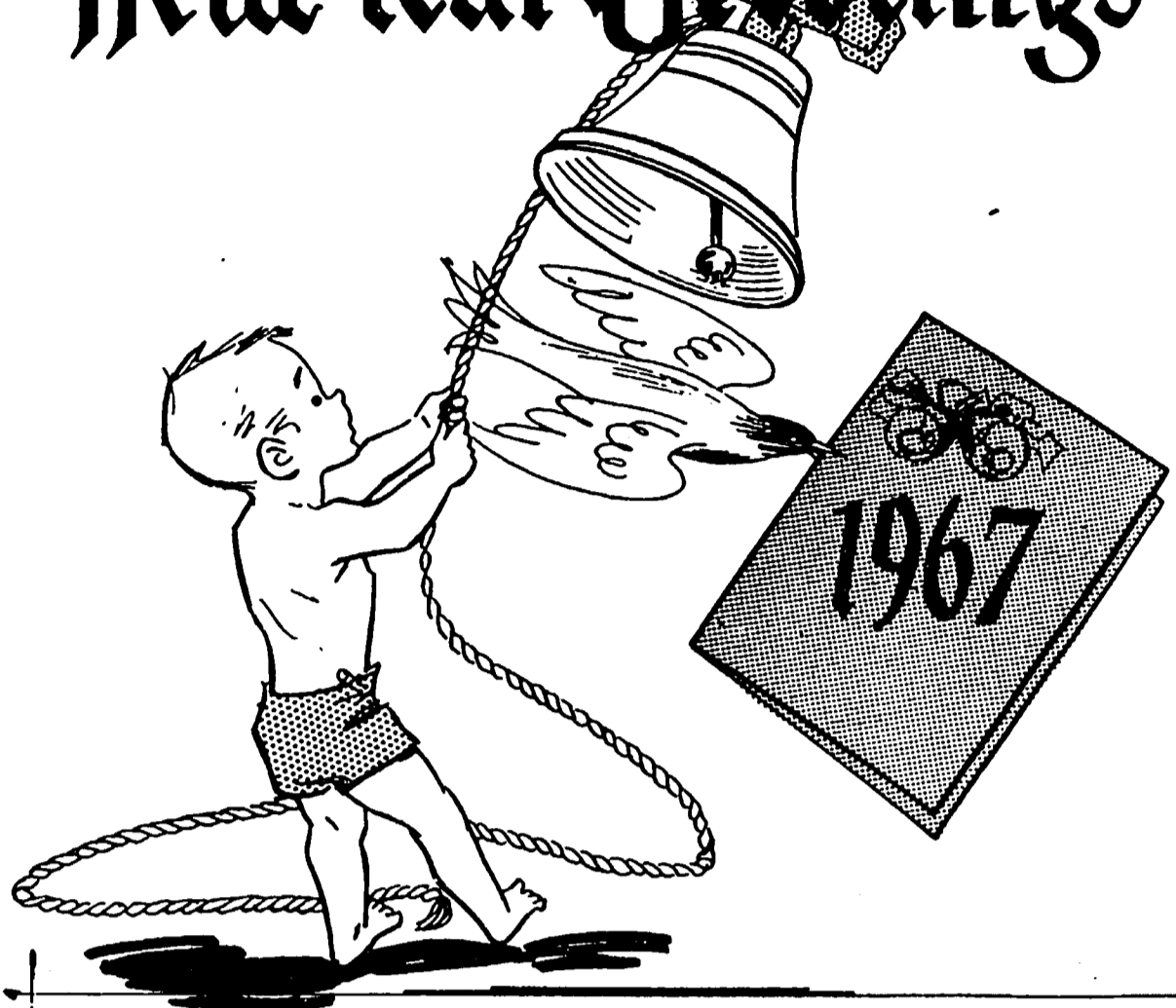

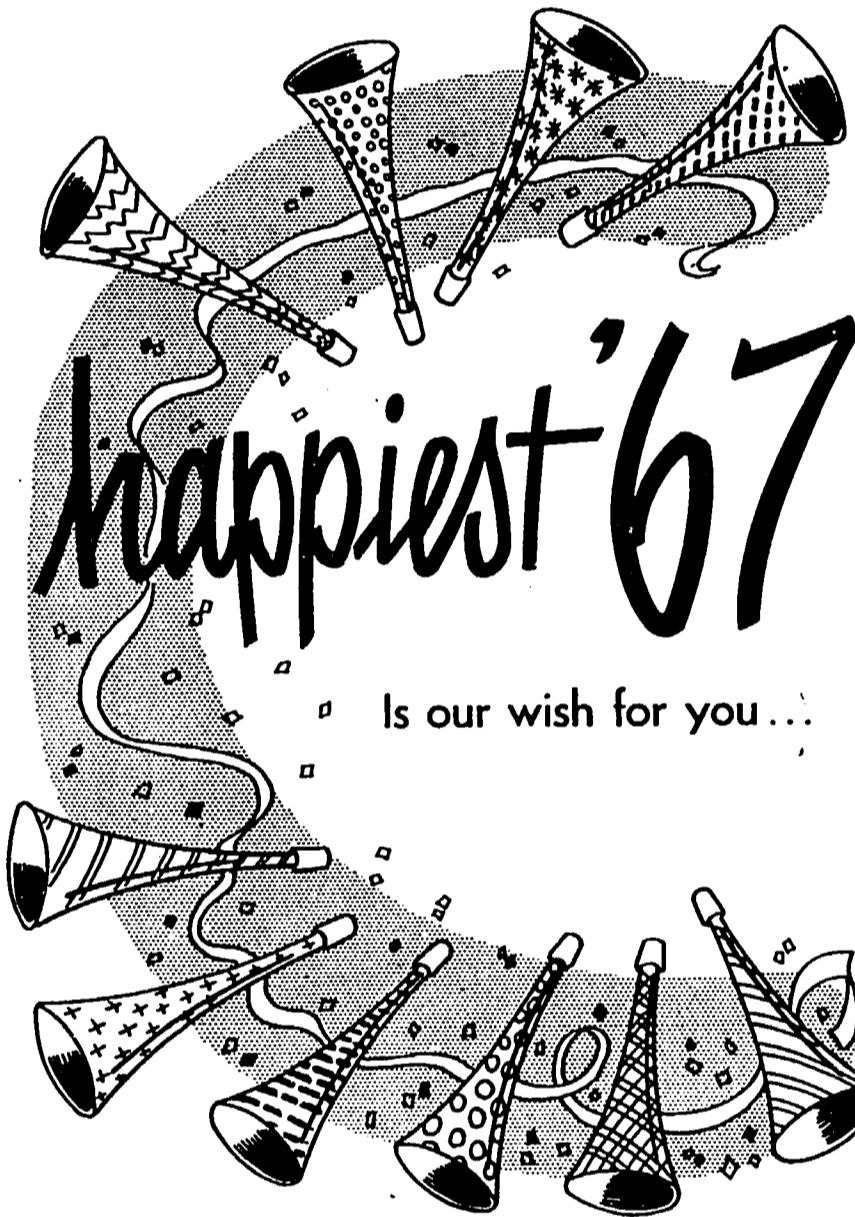

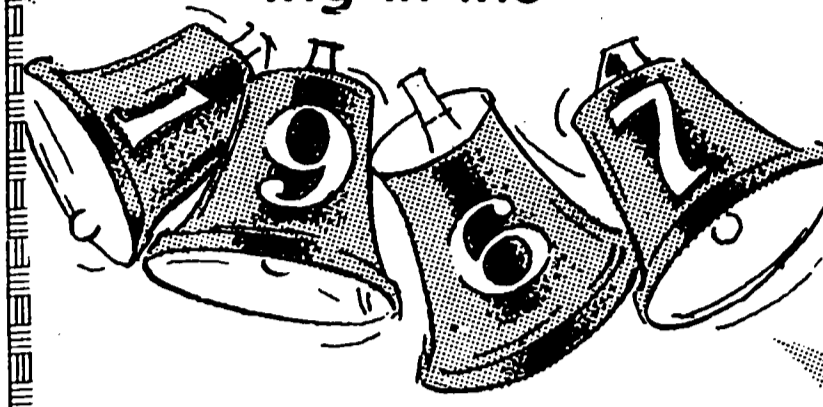

TB Ass'n Extends Seal Campaign

Annual Drive Within \$18,000 of '67 Goal

With the annual Christmas Seal Campaign in Delaware County within \$18,000 of its goal, Robert W. Bernhardt, executive secretary, has announced that this once-a-year drive to wipe out Tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases will be extended through the first month of the New Year.

The December snowstorms caused a drastic drop in Christmas Seal mail which Mr. Bernhardt hopes late gifts coming after the rush of the Christmas shopping, will bring the campaign in reach of its minimum goal of \$130,000.

He announced the start of the chest x-ray survey in 35 nursing and convalescent homes on January 9 and continuing for three weeks. This joint program with the State Health Department will bring the bedside unit to approximately 1,500 senior citizens. The organization work, follow-up, and reporting of abnormal findings are conducted by the association. The State unit will do the actual x-ray work.

Mr. Bernhardt reported that the first community x-ray survey in 1967 is scheduled to open February 6 and continue to February 10.

"With the increasing dangers of air pollution and the stepped-up efforts to protect our population from health hazards connected with these impurities," he urged "all residents - in particular those over 40 years of age - to keep informed of the monthly x-ray schedule and to get regular chest surveys."

"Acute respiratory diseases are increasing both in Delaware County and throughout the nation," Mr. Bernhardt said, pointing out that last year Americans spent almost 300 million days sick in bed because of these diseases.

"Our Association will use Christmas Seal dollars throughout 1967 in trying to improve conditions here at home," Mr. Bernhardt said, "helping to keep fathers on their jobs, children in school, and the general health of all our residents much better."

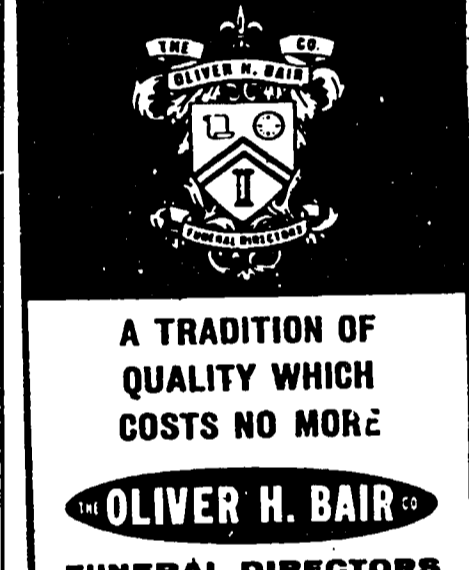
