"The campaign must end on October 30th in order that we might finish packing the bags, which will be shipped to Vietnam in time for Christmas," Mrs. Blake concluded.

### **Needlework** Directors To Meet Monday A.M.

The annual meeting of the directors of the Swarthmore Branch of the Needlework Guild of America will be held Monday, October 10, in the Woman's Club at 10 a.m.

The guild was organized in England in 1882 when Lady Wolverton asked friends to make two garments each in the same size for children in Wales who had been orphaned by a mining disaster. The response was so generous that a permanent organization was set up to provide for the needy annually. The activities of this group spread to London and in 1885 to Philadelphia.

The Swarthmore Branch started in 1909 when five directors collected 121 garments for distribution to charities. Today in Swarthmore there are over 60 directors who collect items of clothing and household linens to be distributed to 18 charities in Delaware County and Philadelphia.

To become a member the only requirement is the gift once a year of two new articles of clothing or household linens (or the money for purchasing these items) to be distributed to charitable agencies.

### **Rises In County** Present Rate Threatens 20% Higher Than '65

New Tuberculosis cases pelaware County during 1966 will be 20 or more percent. above the 1965 total if the number of cases continues through the year at the present

At yesterday's semi-annual board meeting of the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association, Executive Secretary Robert W. Bernhardt. stated that 85 new TB cases were reported during the first six months. The total for the entire year in 1965 came to

Need for continued tuberculosis prevention and control was emphasized in the period's activity report.

Dr. James E. Nancarrow. president of the association. presided at the meeting and received reports from the following directors:

Case-Finding, Dr. Robert H Johnston; Hospital Screening & Pulmonary Function Project. Dr. J. Francis Mahoney; Patient Services, Dr. H. ArminStecher nd Dr. Johnston; Respiratory Disease Committee, Dr. George w. Lilley; 1966 Christmas Seal Committee, Mrs. Peter E. Told; reasurer's Report, J. Newton ew.

New member of the Board. Mrs. Nicholas E. Padis of Drexel Hill, was introduced, and Dr. Robert B. Hanes of

Upper Darby was elected. Thirty-two communities were visited by mobile x-ray units with 14,182 persons receiving chest surveys. In addition, residents of two nursing and retirement homes, an industry, and the county prison were visited. Of 301 prisoners x-rayed, three were found to have minimal tuberculosis, one moderately advanced, and one far advanced.

Tuberculin testing in four high schools reached 1,455 unior and senior students.

Under patient services, eight recovered patients were placed in employment and four in training; two patients families' established in better housing; three assisted in securing legal help; 12 requests met for emergency relief; and 11 delinguent patients motivated to keep clinic appointments. Five patients, suffering with emphysema, bronchitis, .and asthma have also been helped.

Diabetic tests, as a joint project with the State Department of Health, were given in conjunction with x-ray surveys. Community tests totalled 941, and 2,274 were tested in industry. Twenty-five were found to be positive. To date, seven whose studies are completed are new diabetics.

Under health education, 118 sound films were shown 550 times reaching an estimated 25,000 people. Approximately 58,000 leaflets and posters were distributed; eight exhibits shown; and 44 special programs conducted by physicians and staff members.



The Swarthmore Coordinating Committee Wednesday night of last week voted to urge Borough Council to authorize comprehensive survey of recreation in Swarthmore. It named chairman Donald Henderson, Mrs. Martha Goslin and Mrs. Judith Bianchi to carry the matter to Council. The coordinating committee consists of representatives from local organizations in the borough. Those attending last week said they knew of no

objection to a center. The committee also asked the evening's speaker Donald Bohenet of the National Park and Recreation Association to have his organization submit an estimate of cost of such a survey.

Bohenet said the figure would probably be between \$1500 and \$2500 and would be in the hands of the committee by mid-October. He felt it might be several months after authorization before the study could be started, but that a preliminary report could be completed within six weeks thereafter. He said material provided in the new borough plan by local and county Planning Commissions, and in this summer's recreation study by the Swarthmore League of Women Voters would be used to keep surveyor's independent study time at a minimum. Bohenet pointed out ad-

vantages of having an independent building for a community center as well as utilizing the recreation possibilities of school plants. He said, "If a recreation program is needed it is the responsibility of the community to a least partly support it - just as it supports public education."

### ZONING BOARD SUSTAINS APPEAL

Swarthmore Zoning George M. Ewing. Board. chairman, has sustained the appeal of Lillian Bachman to enlarge her market at Yale and Kenyon avenues, and directed that a building permit be issued.

Limitations on the enlarged structure stipulate that the floor area will not be over 4,000 square feet, the height not to exceed two stories. The building must be set back three feet from the street line, and access is to be on Kenyon avenue. The advertising sign, not to exceed 2 by 20 feet, may not project above the roof and is not to be "garishor offensive." Parking space on the southerly portion is to be provided for at least 10 cars, each space to be 10 by 20 feet. Plantings are to be placed along the Kenyon and Yale avenue boundaries as a shield for neighbors.

Physical work must start within six months of the permit's issuance.





At the October unit meetings of the Swarthmore League of Women Voters, consensus was reached in favor of a public recreation program for the borough.



Richardson Dilworth, president of the Philadelphia Board of Education, will speak on at a meeting at Swarthmore High School on Wednesday, October 26, at 8 p.m. This meeting is being sponsored jointly by the Elementary and Secondary Home and Schoo Association, and will be held in the school auditorium at

College avenue. Mr. Dilworth, a Philadelphia resident since 1926, is presently engaged in the practice of law at his firm Dilworth, Paxson, Kalish, Kohn & Dilks. He was appointed by the Mayor to serve on Philadelphia's new ninemember Board of Education in 1965; when the Board took office, he was elected president Mr. Dilworth won recognition as Mayor of the City of Phil adelphia for his programs of urban renewal and mass transportation. First elected to this position in 1955, he was reelected in 1959 by the largest majority ever obtained in municipal election. Both the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University awarded him honorary degrees for his services to the city in this capacity. A graduate of Yale University (1921) and Yale University Law School (1926), Mr. Dilworth was a Captain during World War II, serving with the First Marine Division in the Guadalcanal campaign. For this service he was awarded the Silver Star and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Mr. Dilworth practiced law in Philadelphia from 1927 through 1955, specializing in trail law and heading the firm then known as Dilworth, Paxson, Kalish & Green.

He first became interested in politics following World War II, and was elected City Treasurer in 1949 and District Attorney of Philadelphia in 1951.







Research Organization Library Open Marks Antarctic Day

**Bartol Research Foundation** of The Franklin Institute was one of several organizations to observe "Antarctic Day," October 11, in the United States. This day celebrated 10 years of international scientific cooperation in the continent of Antarctica, and was designated by the Scientific Committee on Antarctic Research (SCAR) of the International Council of scientific Unions.

Bartol, located on the Swarthmore College campus, is engaged in research in cosmic rays, astrophysics, solid state and surface physics. The staff has been involved in the Antarctic program since its inception and has developed equipment used in research there.

Director of Bartol since 1959. cosmic ray physicist Dr. Martin A. Pomerantz was honored recently for his work in the Antarctic, when the U.S. Board on Geographic Names approved the geographic feature, Pomerantz Tableland. This icecovered, plateau-like feature is located in the Usarp Mountains. current work being per-

formed by Bartol in the Antarctic is providing a threedumensional, picture of the electromagnetic condition in the innersolar systeays

Dr. Fomerantz said. "Heretofore, the relevant observations have been limited to the plane of the earth's orbit. Spacecraft thus far have probed in this plane only - but cosmic rays reaching the polar regions probe the otherwise inacces sible regions of space."

The first concentrated scientific program in the Antarctic was conducted during the International Geophysica Year (IGY), 1957-58. This program, which involved 66 nations and 60 Antarctic bases, was a study of Earth, timed to coincide with the period of maximum activity in the sun's 11-year cycle. The success of IGY led to a 71-nation effort - International Years of the Quiet Sun (IQSY), which during 1964-65 studied the solar minimum.

Dr. Pomerantz was chairman of the U.S. Committee for IQSY; this committee of the National Academy of Sciences represented the U.S. on the international body that coordinated the overall IQSY program. Dr. Pomerantz was also vice president of the International Committee for IQSY.

Bartol's scientists have played a vital role in IQSY's first active collaboration between Russians and Americans performing a scientific experiment. This study of solarproduced cosmic rays involves a network of "forward scatter" radio stations, which consist essentially of a transmitter at one site and a receiver at another. The ambitious research effort spans two and one half thousand miles of the Antarctic ice cap and reaches Academy of Sciences, offered 80 miles into the sky. 

Backs Comm. College

County Commissioner William A. Welsh, who Tuesday attended the opening ceremonies of the new Montgomery County Community College, again called for the immediate establishment of a Delaware County Community College.

Long an advocate of the community college, Welsh's motion at the regular commissioners' meeting climaxed many months of controversy and was the second time within three months he has prodded his fellowcommissioners into action on the establishment of an institution of higher education here in the county.

Welsh gave this statement on his position: "Delaware County is not meeting the needs of the majority of Delaware County high school graduates without

a community college." "For example," Welsh said, over 9,000 students graduated from our county high schools (public, diocesan, private) last June. Only 4,200 went on to college or further schooling. What about the other 4.800? Some further education is needed for almost all of them. these same students lived in Montgomery County or Bucks County -- what a difference in their futures. Hundreds of them would be getting the training which is now essential if they are to obtain worthwhile jobs in this computer age. I am worried about their competitive position in the employment market with the rest of the nation providing virtually free training beyond the high school level. Will Delaware County's claim to fame be that it is a good source of unskilled and untrained labor, the demand for which is decreasing daily?"

Welsh continued, "I urge every mother and father in this county who is concerned about their children's future educa tion to rise up in their strength and demand that Delaware County immediately establish a community college. It is incredible that we do not move at once in this field when there are state and federal contributions available which would de-

fray 2/3 of the costs." Commissioner Welsh took a public stand in favor of a community college for Delaware County as early as 1963, and has stated on many occasions that as soon as one of the majority commissioners join him in passing a motion to sponsor a community college, there can be a public, taxsupported, two-year college for the children of Delaware
