Red Cross Inductee Program

An increase in tuberculosis cases in Delaware County - 51 over the previous year - was revealed in the annual report of the county's TB Case Register just released.

Figures show that tuberculosis cases in Delaware County known to be under medical supervision totalled 760 for the past year, as compared to 709 in 1965.

Dr. Robert H. Johnston, board member of the Delaware County Tuberculosis and Health Association, and chairman of the Case - Finding Committee, in reporting the cases said that Chester City still remains the top incidence area in the county and state with 248 cases. Other high locations are:

Dr. Johnston also noted a change in the greatest concentration of the disease from the old age category to the 45 to 59 year category. This classification totalled 280 cases or 36.9 percent of the total number.

The first of three immunization programs being conducted by The Delaware County Medical Society and Region VII of the Pennsylvania State Department of Health was held at 19 centers in Delaware County, Sunday, April 2nd. Approximately 3,000 doses of free vaccine against either Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whooping Cough and Polio were given. Dr. J. Albright Jones, chair-

man of the Public Health Commission of the society expressed disappointment over the small number of people who attended some of the clinics. It is too bad, he said, that people have to become frightened with the presence of a serious disease before they will avail themselves of pro-

The medical profession, is stated, is frequently accused of making unreasonable charges. Here is an opportunity for anyone who cannot afford to pay the doctor for this type of vaccine program to receive it absolutely free of charge. Donations are not even requested.

As pointed out by Dr. Ralph H. De'Orsay, president of The Delaware County Medical Society, there are very few adults who have received vaccine against Tetanus (lockjaw). He urges them to visit the clinics and receive their immunization on May 7.



MEDICARE KITS AVAILABLE TO BENEFICIARIES

Medicare beneficiaries who signed up for medical insurance protection can obtain a free information kit to help them keep a record of their doctor bills, Harry R. Peterman. Chester Social Security Dis-The kit includes a record-

keeping folder and leaflets which explain the two methods of payment for medical insurance claims, and what medical expenses count for the \$50 deductible. The folder has space to write in the date and amount of each bill so that the beneficiary will know immediately when he reaches the \$50 each year. After that, the medical insurance plan pays 80 percent of the reasonable charges for covered expenses for the remainder of the year.

Also, people who need help in completing a medical insurance claim are urged to get in touch with the social security office. "We know that these claims -- especially the first claim -- can be confusing to people," said Peterman, "and we will be glad to help in every



Retaining a single residential zone including single family detached and twin dwellings in Swarthmore would result in countenancing 75 non-conforming uses, W. James Graef, Jr., executive director of the Delaware County Planning Commission told the Swarthmore Planning Commission Wednesday night of last week. The local group had aske

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





FALL OCCUPANCY

The library is the gift of Thomas B. McCabe of the Class of 1915 and his wife Jeannette E. L. McCabe. The dormitories are made possible by H. Thomas Hallowell, Jr., '29, and by the Charles A. Dana Foundation and the college's Centennial Fund. The buildings were designed by Vincent Kling Associates.

Increase Stack Space The McCabe Library will provide a 75 percent increase in stack space over the building now in use. Librarian James F. Govan and his staff are working

on plans to move the library's collection of over 300,000 volnew building will allow the books to be stacked in their proper order from A to Z. The nonsequential order of the layout of the collection now confuses many a new library user.

Mr. Govan is particularly pleased that the McCabe Library will offer the best surroundings for both users' comfort and the preservation of the books. Last fall the participation of more than 70 Swarthmore families resulted in proceeds of well over \$400.



Last fall the participation of more than 70 Swarthmore families resulted in proceeds of well over \$400.



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


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
