Rev. W. S. Eaton Accepts New Post

Becomes Adm. Dir. Chicago Clinic July 10

The Session of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church has accepted the resignation of the Rev. William S. Eaton as Minister of Church Education. He joined the staff of that church in May, 1964.

Eaton has been named Administrative Director of the Comprehensive Care Out-Patient Clinic which the Children's Memorial Hospital in Chicago, Ill., operates in conjunction with the Chicago Board of Health.

The Clinic is one of three centers in Chicago funded by grants from the Children's Bureau of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to provide health service to children living in low income areas.

In announcing Eaton's appointment, Joseph P. Greer, executive vice president of Children's Memorial Hospital said, "The concept of comprehensive health care for children will involve the total community. Mr. Eaton's experience in organizing and directing the activities and energies of groups for action will be invaluable in creating the broad participation of citizens in this new approach to medical service to all children."

The Comprehensive Care Clinic serves as area of the near-and mid-north sides of Chicago with a population of close to 50,000 children under the age of 20, who come from families with an annual income of less than \$5000 per year.

Funds for the clinics were made available to municipal agencies at the same time the Medicare legislation was passed by Congress in 1965. Chicago was the first city to receive approval for its program, and the clinic operated by Children's Memorial was the first to begin serving children. The first child was seen there last August, within three weeks after the funds were received by the Chicago Board of Health.

Additional funding through the Office of Economic Opportunity makes it possible for every child in Chicago to receive medical attention. Referrals to the Clinic come from the Chicago Board of Health, the Board of Education, Headstart, Infant Welfare Society clinics, private physicians, as well as on direct requests from families living in the designated area.

Eaton is a graduate of Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pa., and the Union Theological Seminary in New York. He is married and the father of two children. He will assume his new post on July 10. Eaton also indicated that the Medical Clinic has un-announced plans to expand its facilities to include all ages.

Will Distribute Recreation Poll

Answers To Be Basis Of Recommendations To Borough Council

During the coming week a survey of the recreational needs and interests of all Swarthmore residents will be conducted by the Swarthmore Coordinating Committee, composed of representatives from organizations in the borough. Questionnaires will be distributed to all households on June 2 and 3 and collected a week later by neighborhood volunteers. Results of the survey will be used by the Coordinating Committee as a basis for recommendations to Borough Council concerning the recreational needs of the community.

For several years the possibility of establishing a community recreation center has been discussed in Swarthmore. When the Coordinating Committee was formed a year ago, the idea of a community center was selected as the first topic for discussion. At a meeting in September '66 the group agreed to request an estimate from the National Park and Recreation Association for a professional recreation survey. Since this organization was unable to begin such a survey for at least a year, it was decided that the survey be

Smith College Alumna Served Youth

A memorial service for Mrs. Marjorie Currier Laird was conducted in Swarthmore Presbyterian Church at 4:30 yesterday afternoon by the Rev. William S. Eaton.

Mrs. Laird died of asphyxiation and cardiac arrest Sunday night in Riddle Memorial Hospital, Lima where she was rushed by Media ambulance after choking at dinner in her home at 527 Riverview avenue. She was born in Detroit, Mich., and would have celebrated her 49th birthday on Tuesday of this week.

She was a graduate of Liggett High School a private school in Detroit and of Smith College, class of 1939.

She was married in 1944 in Grand Rapids, Mich., and moved to Swarthmore six years later, with her husband, David L. manager of the contract department of Strawbridge and Clothier, and two sons, David C. now 20 and Robert L. 18.

Mrs. Laird was a member and former vice-president of the Auxiliary Board of the Delaware County Child Guidance Clinic and had been active in raising funds for the new building and other needs of the Clinic ever since the organization of the Auxiliary Board 10 years ago.

She had served as chairman of the selection committee of the American Field Service student exchange program in Swarthmore, and, with her husband, headed the committee for the Swarthmore Christmas Ball in 1964 the first year it was held in Swarthmore College's new Sharples Dining Hall.

She also was formerly active in the local League of Women Voters and with the Home and School Association.

She was a member of the Fountain Street Baptist Church, Grand Rapids and had attended Swarthmore Presbyterian Church since moving here.

In addition to her husband and sons Mrs. Laird is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oceola L. Currier, and a brother, Robert, in Grand Rapids.

She had willed her body to the Anatomical Board of the State of Pennsylvania for medical research. It is the family's request that any friends inclined to send floral tributes make memorial contributions to the endowment fund of the Child Guidance Clinic instead.

Princeton Sophs Earn Radio Award

done locally by the committee. Community Center?

Borough residents will be asked whether they would favor a community center for recreational activities and if they would support it with tax money. Such a center could provide facilities for activities not now available in Swarthmore. It would serve all age groups and a variety of interests. Also, the survey will ask whether residents would favor having a professional recreation director and if they would support this position with tax money. A professional director could provide supervision and coordination for many activities already in existence, as well as initiating new programs.

Cost Estimate

In many other communities, a year-round public recreation program of activities for all age groups is provided by local government. In addition, extensive recreational facilities are often provided for community residents. According to standards established by the National Park and Recreation Association, a community should expect to spend about \$6. per capita for community recreation programs and all facilities. About half this amount would be spent for organized recreation (excluding parks and museums).

Swarthmore has no public recreation program of this sort, but a number of different groups have sought to provide recreational activities for residents of the borough. The Swarthmore Recreation Association offers a varied program of summer activities, sponsors the Open House program for teen-agers throughout the year and an Adult Sports Night during the winter months.

The SRA program has expanded considerably during recent years, and the annual budget has risen from \$3400 in 1967 to \$10,357 in 1968. Borough Council makes an annual appropriation of \$550 to the SRA. The remainder of the budget is met by fees. The Rotary Club sponsored a fund-raising barbecue last fall to benefit the Open House program.

In addition to the many activities which are a part of the regular school program, the Swarthmore - Rutledge School Board provides supervised recreation program on Saturdays, primarily for boys interested in football and basketball. Approximately \$700 is spent annually by the school district to support this program. Half of this amount is paid by the state as reimbursement to the school district.

The recreational needs of Swarthmore residents are also served by a number of private groups, such as the Swarthmore Swim Club and the Swarthmore Tennis Club, which are organized on a membership basis.

Answers To Determine

The survey will ask residents to indicate what recreational activities they now participate in, both inside and outside Swarthmore. Also, residents will be asked to indicate what activities they would participate in if available in Swarthmore. The response to these two questions should show whether or not the recreational needs and interests of Swarthmore residents are met by activities now offered.

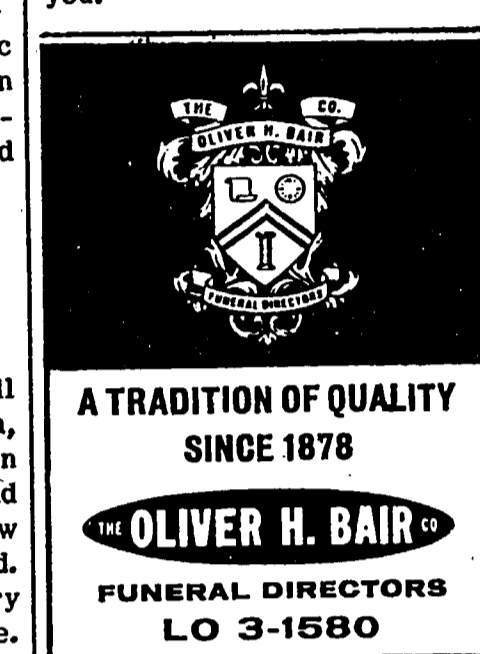

Asks Understanding

To the Editor:
A bill will shortly be introduced into the State Legislature to increase the subsidy base from \$400 to \$500 per pupil. The School Directors would like the community to be aware of this bill as well as the current tax structure which has led to its introduction.

State support of public school education is determined by an aid ratio multiplied by the subsidy base of \$400 per pupil. A community with a low market value of real property has a higher aid ratio than a community with a high market value. The current aid ratio for this district is .3892, or almost 39% of \$400 per pupil.

The \$400 base represents the average per student cost of education in the state several years ago. The 1966-67 per pupil cost in Swarthmore-Rutledge School District is \$87.10. The difference between this amount and \$400 must be supported entirely by local taxes as well as 61% of the first \$400 of expenditure. Residential communities such as Swarthmore and Rutledge are at a disadvantage in comparison with communities containing industry and large shopping centers and having as a result higher market value per pupil. The aid ratio which is designed to utilize the broader taxing

capacity of the state to partially equalize this disparity in tax base among communities is presently directed at minimal education only, not efforts towards quality education.

A change in the subsidy base would be a step towards remedying this situation. It would provide an additional \$66,133 to the school district, the equivalent of approximately 7 mills.

For many years the citizens of Swarthmore and Rutledge have demonstrated their commitment to quality education through their willingness to support a tax rate higher than many other communities.

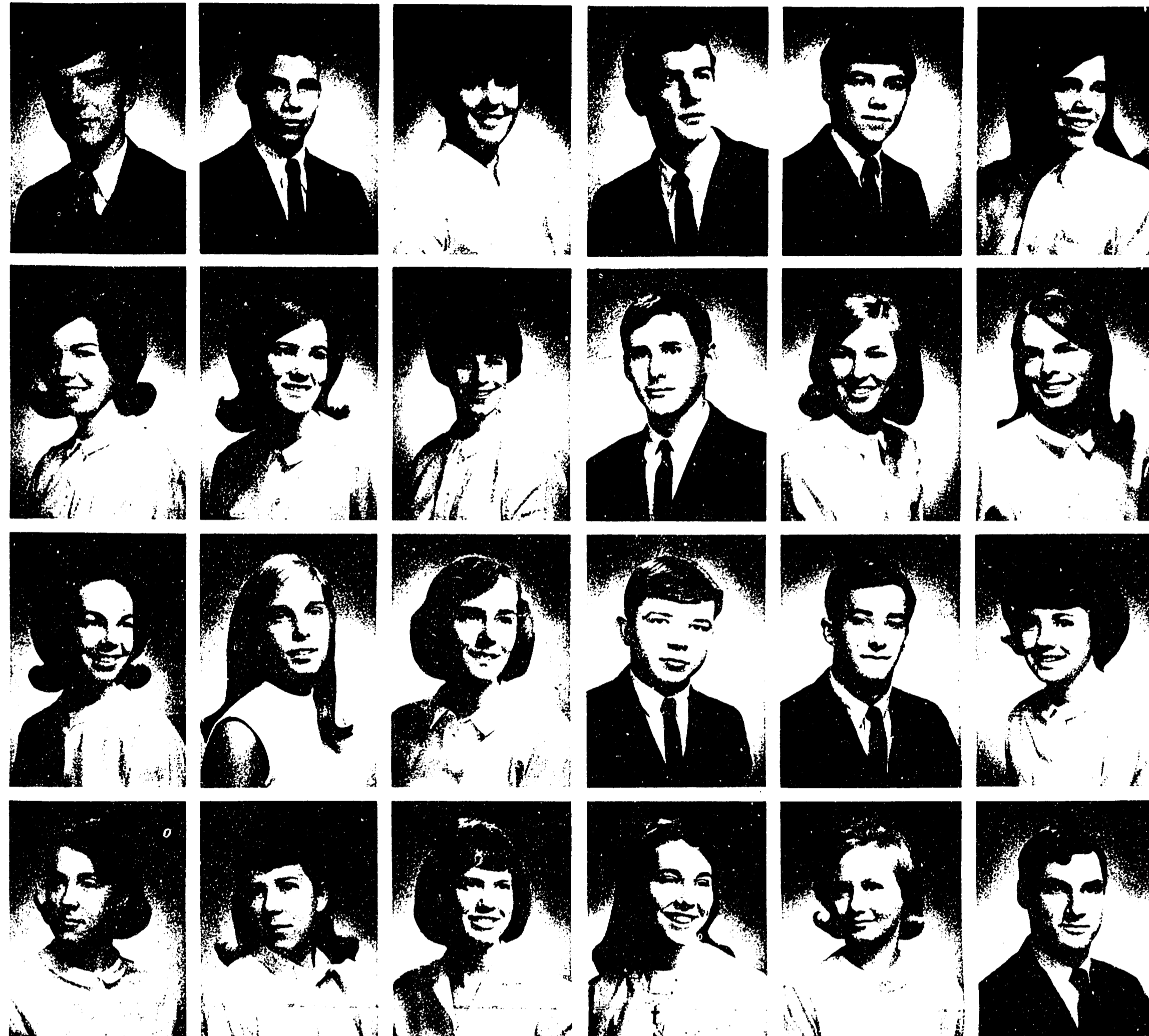

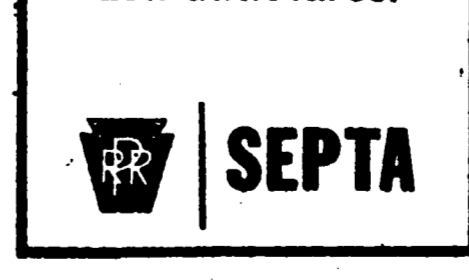

lege. Her citation read:
"Rosamond Cross - Headmistress of the Baldwin School, Trustee of Mount Holyoke College, President of the Headmistress Association of the East. For over a quarter of a century in the active center of the educational world, she has, true to her name, built enduring bridges between school and college and gallantly and skillfully helped generations of students to cross them."
Scranton is a graduate of Yale University where he also received his LL.B. He was admitted to the bar in 1946.

A former vice-president of the International Text Company, he is now a director and member of its executive committee. He served as special assistant to the Secretary of State, was a member of the 87th Congress and was Governor of Pennsylvania from 1963-67. He is a member of the committee to study Higher Education of which Clark Kerr is chairman. His citation for his honorary LL.D. degree follows:
"William W. Scranton - Businessman, statesman, representative in Congress, and Governor of this Commonwealth, he has with talent and dedication, and with plain and forthright honesty, devoted himself to doing a good and

faithful job for the public.
An executive who has always sponsored excellence in education, he has served well the educational needs of his own state of Pennsylvania, and now lends an experienced hand to the solving of nationwide problems of higher education in America."
Smith went to normal school, then taught for six years before he came to Swarthmore, where he received his B.A. in 1914. He received his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania and began to practice law in 1917. He has been a member of the firm of Duane, Morris and Heckscher since 1923. He taught Business Law at Swarthmore from 1920-1927. He is

a director of the Legal Aid Society and a trustee of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of Friends. He is a life member of the Board of Managers of Swarthmore College, and was the chairman of the Board from 1952 to 1966. The college faculty stood as he received his honorary degree with this citation:
"Claude C. Smith - Student, then teacher, then board member and board chairman at Swarthmore, he speaks to us as Swarthmore's own, though in his insight and advice we find not only understanding member of the family, but also timeless observer of what is useful and what is right from the larger point of view.
A lawyer as professional as

Philadelphia tradition might demand, his acuity serves and is ever consistent with meticulousness of principle and humanity in judgment.
Claude Smith's contribution to Swarthmore College, and to our larger community, is long in time and deep in character. Spiritual when most practical, practical and realistic when most spiritual, he selflessly and unselfconsciously reveals an Inner Light that adds to ours."

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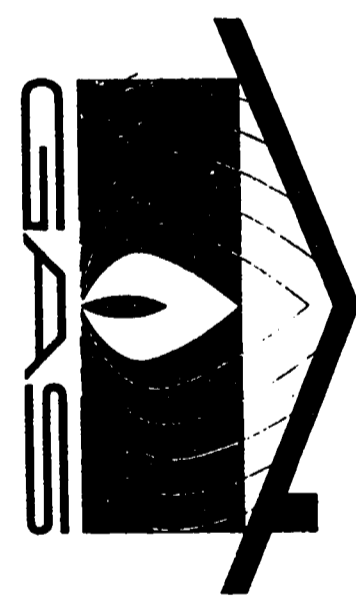

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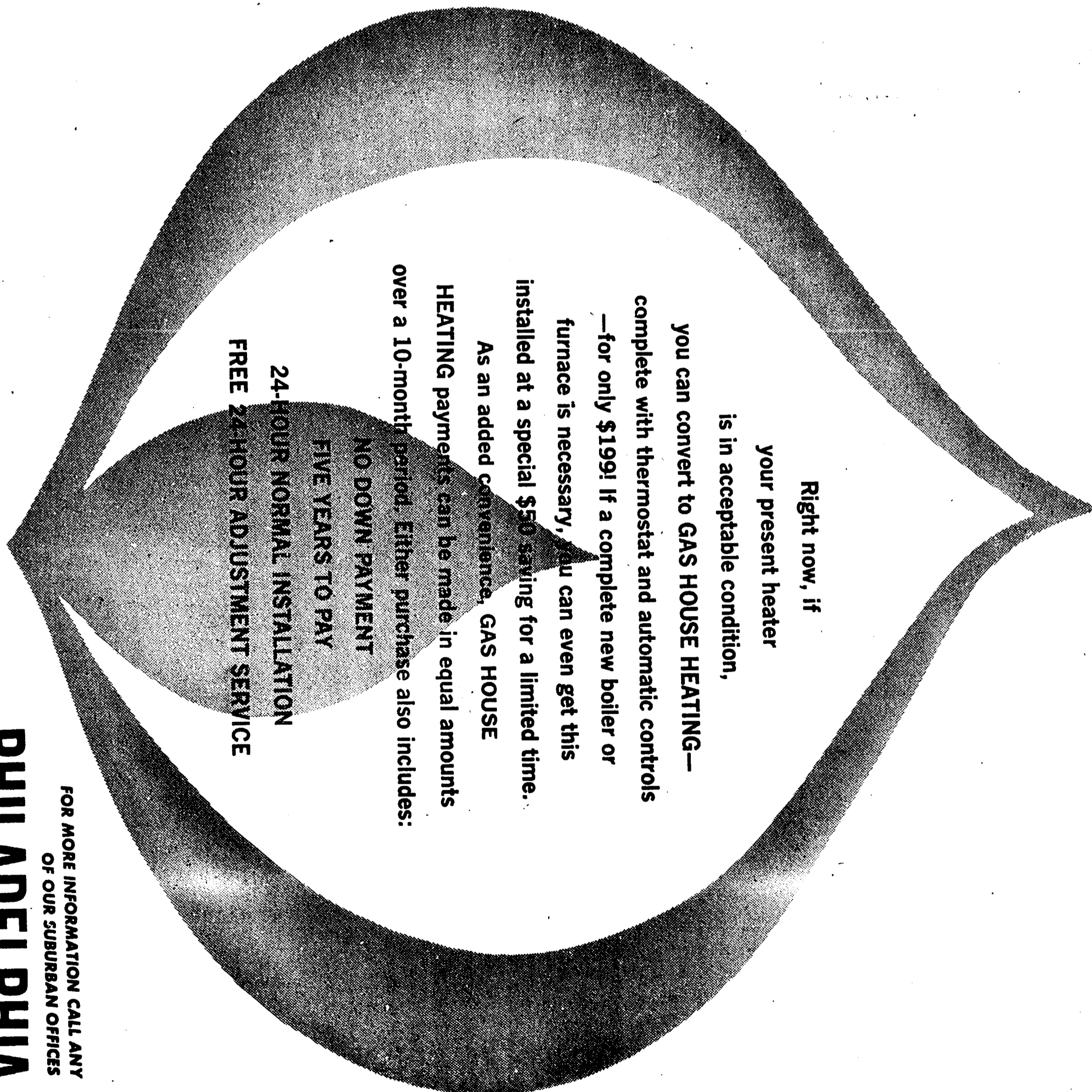

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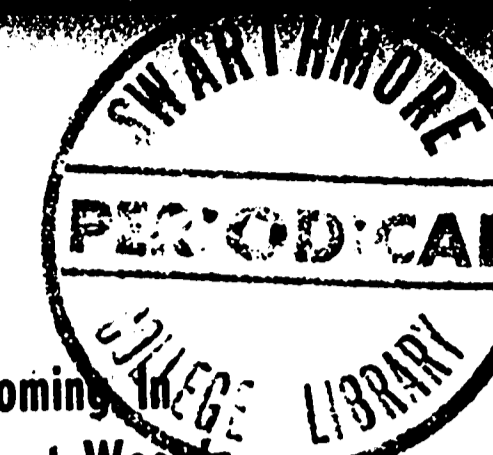

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CITIZENS DESCEND ON COUNCIL IN PROPOSED PARKING ORD. HEARING

Borough Councilmen are reviewing a proposed parking ordinance which would permit, by special exception, use of suitable nearby premises, even in a different zoning district, when parking could not be accommodated on the premise itself.

The proposed ordinance which carefully details off-street parking requirements for all new buildings including dwellings, was tentatively approved by the Planning Commission.

At the June 12th hearing Dr. Paul Mangelsdorf, Jr., of 110 Cornell avenue and Col. George Logan (USAF Ret.) of 104 Cornell, members of a "Committee for Residential Swarthmore" were the first of many speakers.

Mangelsdorf presented petitions signed by 201 residents of streets throughout the borough, and a formal statement urging Council to "tighten up this ordinance and in particular make it clear that parking at one location for employees, patrons or visitors at another location is to be treated as a commercial use and not to be permitted in areas zoned for residential use."

He said, "We are not opposed to the Bliss Company - to parking -- or a modern parking ordinance" but we are "most strongly opposed to ... a dangerous loophole in our residential zoning which would be created by this proposed ordinance in the form it has been presented."

Stuart S. Bowle tendered a statement on behalf of himself and two other candidates for Council, calling for a reasonable requirement of off-street parking on premises of all future business, apartment and similar buildings; but objecting to any "non-contiguous off-street parking" because it would make it "difficult for Swarthmore to remain a first-class residential community of predominantly single unit dwellings."

Joseph Rihl, 320 Cornell avenue, said if Bliss were going to expand he didn't know where else it could go except Cornell avenue, unless it wanted to try to negotiate with Swarthmore College for its strip of open land immediately across Chester road.

Mrs. Carl Baresin, 311 Cornell avenue, felt that if the community would work together using the imagination, modern engineering and architecture the problem could be solved by some means as underground parking facilities.

Stephen Korn, legal counsel for Quaker Gotham Investments (which leases the office building at 101 South Chester road to Bliss) and Bliss, said that it was true that the attempt to modernize the borough's 1928 zoning ordinance got underway when Bliss reviewed the need, however his firm's suggestions had been ignored and those of the Planning Commission adopted.

John J. Logue of Yale avenue recently testified before the Pennsylvania Senate's Committee on Forests and Waters, Fish and Game on behalf of Senate Bill 253, the Conservation Easement Bill.

As chairman of the 11-county Penjerdel Open Space Committee Logue helped marshal testimony of seven organizations in favor of legislation which would allow the state or its counties to purchase "conservation easements" on appropriate tracts of land for scenic, flood-protection and similar purposes.

All live in the district but one attends Notre Dame de Lourdes School and four Our Lady of Perpetual Help School.

Four-fifths of the grant will be used for staff salaries of five adults and eight student aides under Mrs. Christine Hanemann, Media reading specialist.

Raise Weight Limit For 1st Class P.O.

Effective July 1, 1967 mailers will be able to send 25 pound parcels between first class post offices which are 150 or more miles apart. The present weight limit is 20 pounds.

This is the first of five increases scheduled to take effect annually until 1971, when a 40 pound, 84 inch maximum size will be authorized between all first class post offices. Size limitations are now 72 inches in combined girth and length.

Swarthmore Postmaster Charles Grier reminded mailers that parcels weighing up to 40 pounds can be mailed between first class post offices less than 150 miles apart. Packages addressed to and from 2nd, 3rd, and 4th class post offices, Alaska and Hawaii are not affected by the increase in size and weight provisions of the Public Law 89-573, which became effective January 15. Parcel post mailings to and from these offices remain at 70 pounds and 100 inches.

TOURISM COUNCIL NAMES JOHN EGAN
