In 1932 they volunteered for service in Rio Muni, a colony of old Spain. Missionaries had been evacuated from this area family. in 1923 because of difficulties imposed by the Spanish State. Life was very primitive: travel in the early years was by bicycle or on foot. Later a motor cycle, then a pickup truck, could be used to visit communities along the one dirt road. Education and medical service were not allowed by the Spanish authorities. The missionaries in their evangelistic outreach were never officially recognized, and they lived and worked under constant threat of expulsion. The restrictions have been eased somewhat since the McNeills'

Group Opens Fire On Judiciary Referendum

The Delaware County Magisrates Association has launched a statewide attack on "Question V-Judiciary" which will appear on the April 23 ballot among proposed Constitutional changes.

A pamphlet published by the magistrates to state their stand against the referendum question is being mailed widely through the state with an invitation that it be reprinted locally for use against the proposed amendment

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"One innovation you should be concerned about," the Squires' statement continues, would reduce the number of Justices of the Peace in the state from over 4,000 to about 1,000, put them on salaries and have them sit in courts provided by public funds."

The JPs charge that the Delaware County taxpayers' share of this would run between \$300,000 and \$600,000 depending on the number of Justices of the Peace alloted. This, it is pointed out, is about the equivalent of one mill of real estate tax.

The pamphlet stresses that under the present system those who need the services of a Justice of the Peace pay fees which cover the entire cost of the system and in addition Justices of the Peace remit to state and local governments \$7.3 million in fines annually. The magistrates association

says its \$18 million figure is based on provisions of the proposed amendment.

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



The moon, just one day short of being full, will be high ir the sky from beginning until end. Totality will start at 11:22 and end at midnight; mideclipse is at 11:47.

When the moon is in the shadow of the earth and totally eclipsed it can still be seen clearly because the earth's shadow is not totally free of light. Many of the red rays have filtered through the earth's Introduction of children to atmosphere and diffused into the shadow and onto the moon. Thus, during a total eclipse, the moon usually appears as an object of unusual beauty, colored deep to copperish red.

Loses Hopper **Residents Air Parking** Woes; Give Advice



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

A total lunar eclipse will take place tonight, beginning at 9:11 p.m. and ending at 2:24 a.m. Weather permitting, the circumstances of the eclipse will be ideal for observers through. out continental United States. The moon, just one day short of being full, will be high in the sky from beginning until end. Totality will start at 11:22 and end at midnight; mideclipse is at 11:47.

When the moon is in the shadow of the earth and totally eclipsed it can still be seen clearly because the earth's shadow is not totally free of day, May 2 from 9:00 to 11:30 | light. Many of the red rays have filtered through the earth's Introduction of children to atmosphere and diffused into the shadow and onto the moon. Thus during a total eclipse, the moon usually appears as an object of unusual beauty, colored deep to copperish red.

> Astronomers comment that its beauty will be heightened to the moon, will make a great display for naked-eye and binocular viewers.

> Sky-watchers missing the eclipse tonight will have to wait nearly three years to see another total lunar eclipse, February 10, 1971.

PHOTO RECORD SET

The Sproul Observatory at the college set a record in February. Peter van de Kamp, professor of astronomy and director of the Observatory,

announced. In that month, twice as many photographic plates were taken with the 24-inch refractor as were taken annually from 1912-1937, and more than in any

other previous month in any year. Weather conditions, increased sensitivity of photographic emulsions, and a more highly automated telescope account for this dramatic increase, says Dr. van de Kamp. Continuous clear spells occurred for the week from February 13 to February 19, and the week from February 22 to 28, and observations could be made on 22 nights, and both evening and morning observations on 18 nights.

In addition to improved photograpic materials, the 50-yearold, 24-inch refractor was dismantled and completely overhauled last year and the refinements of a double slide plateholder and rotating sectors were added to it.

The first photographic plate was taken in 1912 at the Sproul Observatory and for the next 25 years, 10,000 plates were taken; the annual rate of plate production averaged 400. From 1937–1962 the yearly average was 1646, ranging from 904 in 1942-43 to 2486 in 1959-60. From 1962 on, the number of photographic Observations show a sudden jump, apparently related to a changing weather pattern. The years 1962-66 average 3835 plates with a range of 3503 (1964-65) to 4244 1962-63).

This sustained systematic photographing of stars, selected by scientific hunches, led to the discovery in 1963 of Barnard's Star B, a planet outside of our solar system. Dr. van de Kamp had concluded from evidence derived from 25 years of analysis and observation that the perturbations of Barnard's star must be attributed to the presence of an unseen and very small companion.

On April 18, 1963, Dr. van de Kamp reported his discovery to the American Astronomical Society. This discovery has been confirmed and refined by more photographs over the past five years. Two other discoveries of similar objects were made earlier at the Sproul Observatory by the same general method, namely: the unseen companion in the 61 Cygni system by Strand in 1943, and that of Lal. 21185, measured by

1950. So far astronomers have discovered only three planetlike objects outside of our solar system. All of them were discovered by the photograph; plates taken at the Sproul Observatory.

ONE LIVE ISSUE

Charges are currently being issued by delegates to the Constitutional Convention that published statements by the Delaware County Magistrates Association are "misleading and selfish."

The statement under attack appeared in last week's Swarthmorean and is in circulation throughout Pennsylvania newspapers. It estimated the cost of the proposed amendment at "about equal to one mill of real estate tax" but could not cite the means of the tax source since this is a legislative matter.

Delegates say that the association's statement neglects to advise readers of the present income of the minor judiciary with the fee system. This complete information was placed in every delegate's mailbox at the Convention, on January 3, 1968, listing the annual fee collected by the 109 Justices of the Peace and Aldermen in Delaware County at \$84,000 or an approximate average of \$800 per year per Justice of the Peace and Alderman.

Delegates fail to admit that Justices of the Peace are now required by law to take a legal training and pass an examination, and in Delaware County are subject to their own association's stringent code of ethics.

Opposition to the Article 5 is voiced by prominent judicial state officials, including Chief Justice of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court John A. Bell, who stated in the Philadelphia Inquirer of April 7, 1968, "I am in favor of the changes in our Constitution recommended by the recent Constitutional Convention with one important exception, namely the Judiciary Article" (Question V); and Supreme Court Justice Michael A. Musmanno who has been active on television asking citizens to vote against Question V.

Chief Justice Bell also stated, "Instead of promoting efficiency and expedition this (Question V) would make for inefficiency and delay" and regarding cost, "This will cost Pennsylvania taxpayers a very large amount of money annually."

Give to the American Cancer Society **Research Grants** Four Swarthmore College professors have received national grants to conduct re-

search next year. Professor Samuel Hynes of the department of English literature has been awarded a fellowship by the American Council of Learned Societies for work on "the Auden generation." He is the author of "The Pattern of Hardy's Poetry" (1961) and "The Edwardian Turn of Mind," published in May.

Paul H. Beik, professor of history, has received a Fulbright research grant to work on the French Revolution in Paris at the Bibliotheque Nationale and the Archives. His most recent book is "Louis Philippe and the July Monarchy," 1965.

The organization and staffing of a unified court administrative structure will certainly involve additional costs, but the unified court system should produce greater efficiency and may result in net savings. The substitution of state-paid salaries and expenses (which are not to be derived from local real estate taxes) for the present fee system enjoyed by the minor judiciary will result in new state outlays. (The statement neglected to advise the readers of the present income of the minor judiciary under their fee system.) These outlays are expected to be largely, if not entirely, compensated by the fees collected. Furthermore, the consolidation of the minor judicial system should substantially reduce the cost of operation. It is virtually impossible to estimate with precision the costs which might be incurred in implementing the new Judiciary Article, nor can the immediate or ultimate savings be measured accurately.

The real issue is whether Pennsylvanians are willing to move ahead from the 1874 concepts and establish a unified judicial system with supervision and administration control in the Supreme Court, create a Judicial Inquiring and Review Board to investigate conduct which prejudices the administration of justice, and require that the justices of the peace (1) be substantially reduced in number, (2) complete a course of legal training and pass an examination, (3) be compensated by salaries instead of fees, and (4) be subject to a code of judicial ethics.



Presbyterian Choirs In April 28th Program

The Mass in D, or Lord Nelson Mass, by Haydn will be presented on Sunday, April 28, at 4:30 p.m. in the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church. The Chancel and High School choirs of the church will combine to sing under the direction of John D. Miller, musical director at the church and associate professor at the Philadelphia Musical Academy.

Solo sections of the mass are written in the style of a quartet, here to be sung by Phyllis Miller, soprano, Susan Lin, alto. James Clark, tenor, and Edward Heller, bass. William Weisser church organist and student at Westminister Choir College will accompany the work.

The Lord Nelson Mass is considered one of Haydn's great compositions, standing with his late symphonies and the famous oratorio, "The Creation," and ranking with the concert masses of Bach. Beethoven and Mozart.

Haydn actually interrupted work on the oratorio so that he might compose the shorter mass, and much of the flamboyant style of the arias of the oratorio is found in the solo soprano part of the mass. Lord Horatio Nelson's naval victory over Napoleon's French fleet at Aboukir Bay, August 1, 1798, inspired the dedication by the composer.

Commenting on Haydn's work, the philosopher-historian Durant notes "....we perceive in his music a kindly, gracious nature which may never have felt the depths of grief or love, ... Haydn was too happy to be profoundly great and spoke too often to say much." (104 symphonies, 52 piano sonatas, 14 masses, eight oratorios and many more). To this the musician Dorian de-" murs, "....Haydn's scores represent the spirit of progress, depth, and artistic courage. Their obvious humor is a counterpart of a creative mind of immense depth and profundity "

Historians Local Map County Tour Fourth Annual Event On Middletown Road

THE SWARTHMOREAN

A number of Swarthmoreans have been busy in recent weeks planning the Fourth Historic Delaware County Tour, which takes place on Saturday, May 4, from 10 to 5. This year the trip is mainly along Middletown road, laid out in 1687 by order of the Court, and long called the Edgmont Great Road.

The first three places this year are in Upland, just a mile from the Middletown road. These are the Pusey House and Landingford Plantation, the Upland Baptist Church, and the stuccoed home of Francis Worley, built late in the 17th Century by a man who came to this country with his mother Mrs. Caleb Pusey in 1682. This house was bought in 1788 by

PARKLANDS FOR ALL CONGRESSMAN SAYS

Congressman Lawrence G. Williams (Pa.-R.) Friday complimented Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall for his refusal to allow parklands in the City of Washington, D. C., to be used as camp-in sites for the so-called "Poor People's March on Washington," now scheduled for May 2.

After reading news reports that officials of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference were planning to pitch tents and build shantles on the Mall and on Parklands surrounding National Monuments, the 7th District Congressman sent a letter of protest to Secretary Udall on March 14, in which he said:

"These parklands belong to all American people and we should not extend privileges to any group that are not given to everyone alike. Furthermore, everything should be done to discourage such obvious, crude attempts to intimidate our Government and the American People."

On Wednesday, April 17, Secretary of Interior Udall indicated at a press conference that he would not permit Government parks to be used as camps for the "Poor Peoples' Campaign." At this press conference Secretary Udall said, "I think it would not be proper to turn parklands over to groups of people for any kind of human shelter. permanent or temporary."

In complimenting the Secretary for his decision, Congressman Williams said, "I wish to commend you for your forthright decision to reserve parklands for the use of all Americans including the thousands of visitors to Washington, D. C., who have helped to pay for these monuments and parklands. I can see no justification for allowing the use of these parklands by any group to the exclusion of other Americans.

Furthermore," said Williams, "I fail to understand if these people are so poor, how they can afford to sit around in the City of Washington for months, as has been reported. It would be interesting to know who is paying the bill for the cost of sustaining all of these people during their stay."
