SCHOOL BOARD MEETS MONDAY

Adopts New Salary, Retirement Policies

School Board Monday night adopted a long-discussed retirement policy, which sets mandatory retirement for all professional employees at the end of the year in which they shall have attained age 65, if not retired earlier.

However, Board President Raymond Winch then stated "the Board retains the option of making exceptions if expedient for the well-being of the district - and these circumstances do arise."

The board also adopted a revised salary policy.

It also decided to rent a room, for next year only, to the county for a special education class. The board will make a study of the entire program of such education in the county. John Aaron commented that he had heard such large numbers of children could benefit from it that it might be good for the whole student body.

Tuition for non-resident pupils for next year was set at \$321 for half-day kindergarten, \$624 for elementary grades and \$820 for high school.

It was stated that the new budget would be open for public inspection at the High School from May 1 to 20. However, no information was available as to amount of the budget, or of the millage rate contemplated.

Bethania Wright, sixth grade reading teacher, resigned to study for a master's degree and teach on the college level. Otto Koester, high school German teacher, resigned to serve with the Peace Corps in Ethiopia. Superintendent Harry Kingham's secretary Mrs. Louisa P. Caldwell resigned to become business manager of a nursing home.

Mrs. Virginia Anne Meyerstein was named half-time teacher of French in the high school.

The 1968-69 budget of the Area Vocational-Technical School, of which Swarthmore's share will total \$11,923, was approved.

MRS. M. MORRISON AUTHORS BOOK

Mary C. (Mrs. Maxey N.) Morrison, Dartmouth avenue, is the author of a new book, "Jesus: Man & Master" published Friday, April 26 by the World Publishing Company.

The book, Mrs. Morrison's first, offers a contemporary, unsentimental, appraisal of 12 facets of Jesus' life and works. She presents Jesus as a man who walked and tired, who was sometimes tired, got impatient, or angry and was sometimes uncertain of his course. From "Jesus as Man," to "Jesus as Disturber of the Peace," and "Jesus as Stranger," her chapters dramatize the variety of ways in which "He confronted the world of his time and still confronts us today."

A resident of Swarthmore since 1946, Mrs. Morrison began teaching the Gospels about 20 years ago, first at Trinity Church here, and then at Pendle Hill. She also teaches at other churches in the area and gives lectures along the Eastern Seaboard.

She is a contributing editor to *Episcopalian* magazine, has authored numerous articles and several pamphlets. She is a graduate of Smith College.

Her husband Maxey is a vice president of Al Paul Lefton Company. They have three children, Hugh, a lawyer in Bethlehem, William a lawyer in New York City, and Helen, a graduate student at Yale University, and four grandchildren.

Women To Hear Of Allahabad Mission

For its last meeting of the current season, on Wednesday, the Women's Association of the Presbyterian Church will hear the Rev. and Mrs. Darius L. Swann, former Presbyterian missionaries in Allahabad, India. They will talk on "Dramatic Mission."

The appointment of the Swanns in 1952 was in response to a special request by Ewing Christian College, Allahabad, for an outstanding American Negro Christian leader to share Christian beliefs and experience with Asian students. Mr. Swann worked as director of religious education, chaplain and counselor to students. Later he worked in North India Synod and initiated training and wider use of drama in evangelism.

Mr. and Mrs. Swann are graduates of Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte, N.C. Mr. Swann holds a B.D. degree from the seminary of the same university, and a Master of Sacred Theology from Union Seminary, New York. He is serving presently on the faculty of Johnson C. Smith while he and

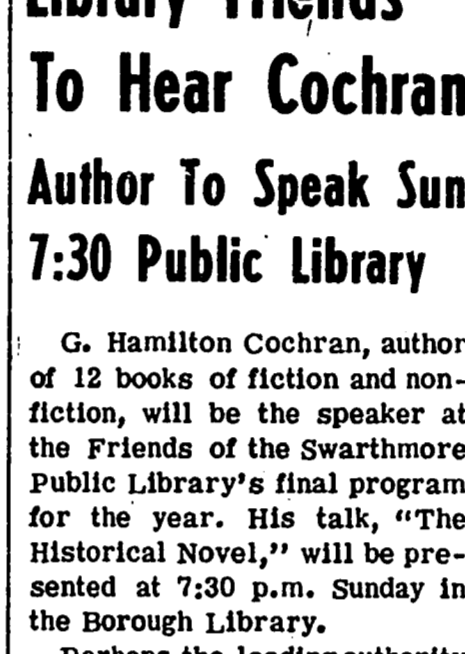

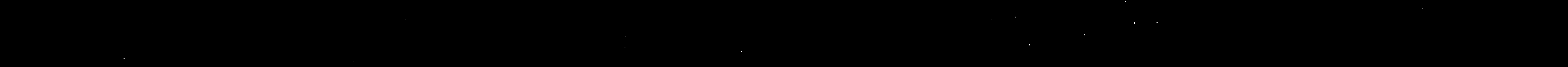
