17-Year Resident Succumbs May 31 Mrs. van Ravenswaay Services Held Tuesday

Mrs. Robert C. van Ravenswaay, 241 Haverford Avenue, died Saturday, May 31, in the Crozer-Chester Medical Center, Upland, after a lengthy illness. She was 47.

Born Janette B. Bolton in Cleveland, O., she lived many years in Whitinsville, Mass. She attended the Bancroft School, Worcester, Mass., and was a graduate of Emma Willard School, Troy, N.Y., Bradford Junior College in Massachusetts, and of Clark University, Worcester.

Affectionately known as "Jay", she was a resident of Swarthmore for 17 years. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church and its Women's Association, was active in parent and mothers' groups in the local schools. She was an active member of the Red Cross, Swarthmore Branch and for the past several years served as co-chairman of the Blood Bank. Hundreds At May 30th Observance Scouts Salute Boro's Thirty-Four War Dead

Gathered in shaded areas on Park and Dartmouth avenues and surrounding the Borough Hall triangle with its Honor Roll center, several hundred residents of the Borough participated in the Ainsworth-Wernher Legion Post's Memorial Day observance Friday morning. Quietly assembling -- family pets leashed in consideration for both ordinance and occasion -- the marching music of the High School Band, object of community pride, and its appreciated leader Robert Holm snapped everyone to attention.

Preceded by the most poignant argument for peace, the ever painful listing of the 34 Swarthmore men whose lives were lost in this country's wars -- five in W.W.I, 25 in W.W.II, two in Korea, two in Vietnam -- and by the respectful placing of the Memorial flags with solemn salutes by Girl and Boy Scouts, Walter A. Schmidt spoke briefly.

He remembered Memorial Day in 1905 when he was 10 and the Grand Army of the Republic was only 40 years away from the Civil War and seven years from the Spanish-American War. He remembered the 1918 Armistice Day in France. Since 1918 Memorial Days had become really meaningful -- "four wars, all different, all rough."

From the perspective of the week's historic Apollo 10 flight and the projected landing on the moon in July, Mr. Schmidt asked "Thereafter -- what then?" and answered "Vietnam can't go on forever. Domestic problems will really get the green light."

The earth, he said, is O.K., "people" are the problem: "We take too much for granted when

We should be appreciative to be human beings, 100% sound of body and mind."

Freedom of speech and thought are O.K., he said "but there's a great difference between a constructive, law-abiding citizen and an organizer of lawlessness and anarchy." He predicted that law and order and religious living will ultimately prevail.

From the background of his extensive investment experience, Schmidt remarked that if people learned how to spend their money there would be fewer poor, fewer ghettos.

"We are a very young country -- we are learning the job of maturing the hard way; from 1620 to 1970 is 350 years -- if you are 70 years old you have lived one-fifth of that time; from 1776 to 1969 is 193 years -- if you are 50 years old you have lived one-fourth of that time. Think what you have seen developed during your generation!"

"The time has arrived for each one to take hold of courage and take out of cold storage the 'Golden Rule' and practice it."

Finally, Schmidt gave his definition of an American. "He will obey laws and pay taxes; he won't burn draft cards; he won't destroy property; he will support the Armed Forces; he will make the streets safe for innocent people; he will hear more often 'my white or black brother or sister'; he will be prepared to pay the price for cracking inflation; he breaks the laws, he will expect law enforcement to crack down -- hard and swiftly."

"We have a heritage of 'Blood, Sweat and Tears' in this country. Let's lighten our load and get back to the full time job of being an American! Let us hope that Memorial Day 1970 will see a start toward the kind of country and world everyone seeks."

Commander Davis Hopsen introduced Mrs. I. R. MacElwee to recite a poem "Freedom Publicly and discreetly, and the Benediction were offered by the Rev. Edward Schneider. The sounding of Taps by Bandmaster Holm preceded the traditional march out Park Avenue to Eastlawn Cemetery where the decoration of Veterans' graves, the prayer and the final Taps concluded the Memorial Exercises.

1922. He returned to Albright for his master in theology, which he received in 1923, the same year he was ordained in the Amwell Second Church, Mt. Airy, and served as pastor of the Amwell church and of the First Presbyterian Church of Englishtown, N. Y., before beginning his long pastorate at Union in 1928.

During his years with the Connecticut Farms congregation, a new sanctuary was constructed, and the membership increased from 275 to 2,200. The church observed its 230th anniversary in 1961.

A veteran of World War I, Dr. Druckenmiller had been a member of the Union American Legion Post 35, the Gavel Lodge of Free Masons and had been president of the Union fire and police departments. He had been president of the board of trustees of the Union Public Library and was a former trustee of the Union Historical Society. He was a member of the Union Lions Club and a member and former president of the New York and New Jersey Alumni Association of Albright.

Dr. Druckenmiller had served as moderator of the Presbyteries of Monmouth and Elizabeth, and in 1959 was elected moderator of the Synod of New Jersey. Albright College conferred upon him the honorary doctorate of divinity in 1954.

Since his arrival in Swarthmore in the spring of 1962, Dr. Druckenmiller filled 14 interim ministries, his last at the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church from December until the middle of April this year. He had also served as the church's minister of visitation in several periods. A reception honoring Dr. Druckenmiller followed the April 18th church service.

In his college days Dr. Druckenmiller had worked as a barber. He had maintained over the years a correspondence with approximately 400 friends. He also enjoyed photography and travel. His last trip, which began on May 2, was his third European tour. Accompanied by his wife, the former Mary Stoltz of Meyerstown, they had planned to return home June 23.

In addition to Mrs. Druckenmiller, whom he married in September of 1919, he is survived by eight of his 12 brothers and sisters -- George, Leroy and the Misses Elma and Ada Druckenmiller, Mrs. Catherine Walters, Mrs. Cora Scheeley, Mrs. Mary Umstead, all of Royersford, and Charles of Reading.

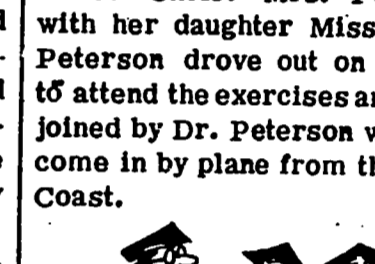

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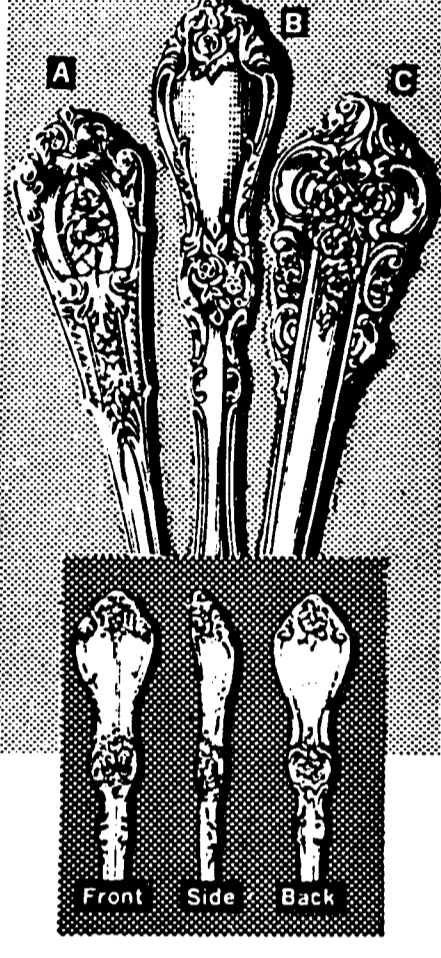

STOLTZBUS URGES STEADY EFFORT TO SOLVE ME IMPASSE

6TH GRADE SAFETIES SEE GETTYSBURG

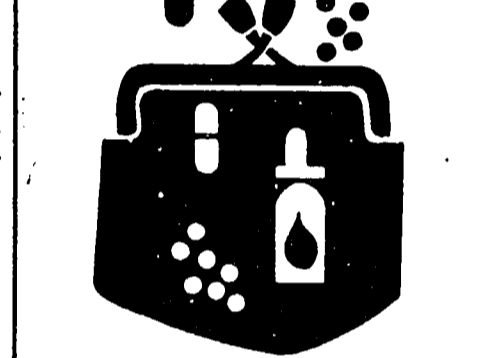

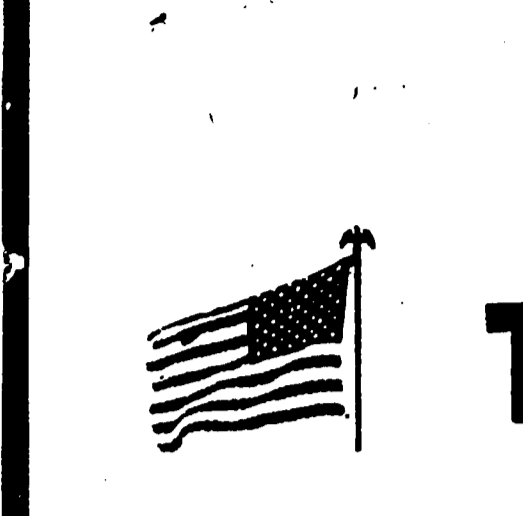

Boro Passes New Dog Ordinance

Under a new dog ordinance passed by Swarthmore Borough Council Tuesday night all dog owners must keep their dogs confined within an enclosure or by a chain which will not permit them to leave their own properties except when under personal control of the owner.

It will be the duty of every police officer to see that offending dogs are seized and detained at the S.P.C.A. or other appropriate shelter and that those who are not redeemed within 10 days by their owners paying \$5 plus expenses, be sold or humanely destroyed.

The new law also makes anyone knowing of a dog bite responsible for reporting it to the borough secretary. The borough health officer and chief of police shall then see that the dog is quarantined, that the owner has it examined for rabies immediately by a veterinarian and again after 10 days, and pays expense of same. Penalties for violation could be up to \$300 fine and 30 days in jail.

Police are authorized to enter any premises and building, except a private dwelling, when in pursuit of offending dogs. Council also assigned police the task of determining who is correct in a dispute between local postal authorities and residents of apartments adjacent to the post office on Rutgers avenue.

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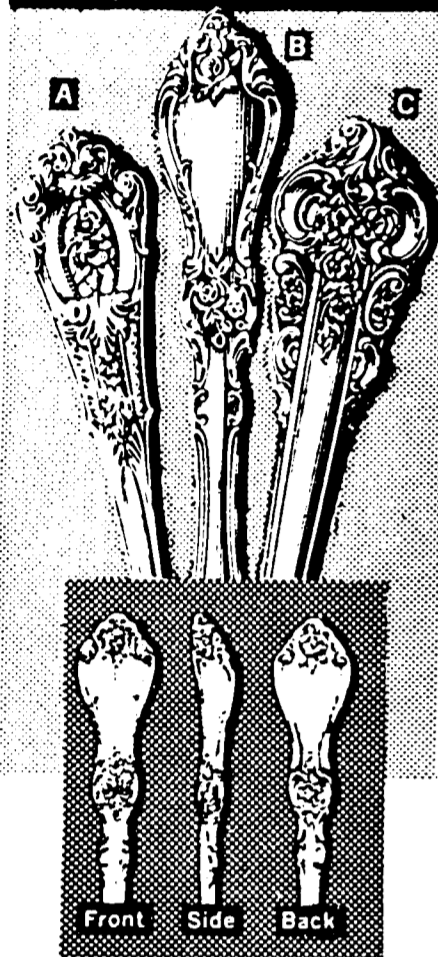

STOLTZFUS URGES STEADY EFFORT TO SOLVE ME IMPASSE

Swarthmoreans and out-of-town guests who were privileged to meet and to hear William A. Stoltzfus, Jr., on the afternoon of Memorial Day felt fortunate indeed.

Mr. Stoltzfus, Deputy Chief of Mission at the American Embassy in Jidda, Saudi Arabia, is just returned from three years foreign service; two at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia as Political Counselor and one at Jidda. He and his family were the weekend guests of his mother, Mrs. Stoltzfus, Morgan circle, who entertained at an open house in their honor Friday afternoon.

Mr. Stoltzfus joined the Foreign Service in 1949 and served in Alexandria, Libya, Beirut, Kuwait, Damascus, Saudi Arabia, Aden and Yemen until 1961, receiving a Meritorious Service Award in '59. From 1961 to 1965 he was assigned to the Department of State in Washington and then attended the National War College for one year before undertaking the assignment from which he has just returned. 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Boro Passes New Dog Ordinance

Under a new dog ordinance passed by Swarthmore Borough Council Tuesday night all dog owners must keep their dogs confined within an enclosure or by a chain which will not permit them to leave their own properties except when under personal control of the owner.

It will be the duty of every police officer to see that offending dogs are seized and detained at the S.P.C.A. or other appropriate shelter and that those who are not re-deemed within 10 days by their owners paying \$5 plus expenses, be sold or humanely destroyed. The new law also makes any knowing of a dog bite responsible for reporting it to the borough secretary. The borough health officer and chief of police shall then see that the dog is quarantined, that the owner has it examined for rabies immediately by a veterinarian and again after 10 days, and pays expense of same. Penalties for violation could be up to \$300 fine and 30 days in jail. Police are authorized to enter any premises and building, except a private dwelling, when in pursuit of offending dogs. Council also assigned police the task of determining who is correct in a dispute between local postal authorities and residents of apartments adjacent to the post office on Rutgers avenue.

Charles Gilbert Named Provost Professor To Fill New Position At College

Dr. Charles E. Gilbert, professor of political science at Swarthmore College, has been named to the newly created position of provost of the college, announced Acting President Edward K. Cratsley following a meeting of the Swarthmore Board of Managers on Friday. Dr. Gilbert will assume his new position in September.

The establishment of the administrative position of provost was one of the recommendations of the Commission on Educational Policy, a group composed of faculty, alumni, and outside experts appointed by the late President Courtney Smith in 1966 to conduct a

thoroughgoing study of the academic program of the college. The recommendation, subsequently approved by the faculty, described the new position as "the president's chief adviser in academic affairs and the representative of the faculty in matters of its professional concerns." Dr. Gilbert served as chairman of this Commission which made the 18-month study.

Dr. Gilbert joined the Swarthmore faculty in 1953 as an instructor in political science, was made associate professor in 1962, and a full professor in 1967. He has been on a sabbatical leave this past academic year to conduct research at the Brookings Institution.

His two-part research program for this year included the completion of a study of policy-making and administration in the social services, sponsored by the Rockefeller Foundation, and the design of a project that will study problems in the governance of large urban places. This latter project, sponsored by the Brookings Institution, will be conducted next year by several investigators across the United States under the direction of Dr. Gilbert.

Dr. Gilbert's writings include numerous articles for professional journals and the books "Governing the Suburbs" (1967) and "Popular Government in America" (by Charles S. Hyman, 1968) which he edited. Dr. Gilbert has conducted research of suburban politics and government under a grant from Pennjerdel. He has served as consultant to the Pennsylvania State Department of Public Welfare, the Committee for Economic Development, and as a member of the Council and Executive Committee of the American Political Science Association.

Dr. Gilbert was graduated from Haverford College, studied at the London School of Economics, and received the Ph.D. degree from Northwestern. He has also taught at Northwestern and Oberlin.

He is married to the former Annalee Schendorf. They have two children, Susan 12 and Jonathan 8, and make their home in Swarthmore on Kenyon avenue.

knowing and doing", illustrating in several ways that our acts do not catch up with knowledge. The whole concept of quality integrated education has never been really tried, he said. Our failure to learn from history is a negative factor, Foster said. The discrepancy between promises and fulfillment leads to cynicism, hostility and rage. As he walks among people Mr. Foster said that he heard three voices: one says "times are good", another "society is so corrupt the only way is to destroy it and start anew", the third "this system can be made to work if people who know and care will speak out". Foster concluded with an appeal to the graduating class and the audience to act to make the American Dream of liberty and justice for all come true. The father of graduating Marsha Foster, the speaker was introduced by Class President John A. Keefe, Jr.

In his opening remarks, School Superintendent Dr. Harry W. Klingham attributed the comparatively harmonious school year largely to the "good will and sense of the students, especially the graduating seniors". Among the student achievements which made the year memorable were the publications "Experience '69" Tempo, Outlook and year book, and the 99 graduate admissions to 66 institutions of higher learning.

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College Gives 5 Honorary Degrees Cites 2 From Phila. At Commencement

Two Philadelphians, both Quakers, were among the five recipients of honorary degrees awarded by Swarthmore College at its 97th Commencement Monday.

Thomas Halliwell, Jr., president and chairman of the board of Standard Pressed Steel Co., received the degree of Doctor of Laws. A graduate of Swarthmore College and permanent president of the Class of 1929, Mr. Halliwell has served the college until this year as a member of the Board of Managers. He was also chairman of the Centennial Campaign for \$10,000,000 (which passed the \$12,000,000 mark) in 1964. He is a member of the board of the Abington Hospital, Pennsylvania State University, and Franklin Institute (as Chairman of the Board of the Bartol Foundation). He is a descendant of one of the families that founded Swarthmore College in 1864. His citation read in part, "he exemplifies that American genius, the public-spirited man of affairs. An industrialist with plants on all six continents, he embodies both the American challenges and the American confidence that commerce will unite the nations."

Dr. Jonathan Evans Rhoads, chief of the department of general surgery at the University of Pennsylvania, received the Doctor of Science degree. Dr. Rhoads is a graduate of Haverford College, the Johns Hopkins University Medical School, and the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Medicine. He holds honorary degrees from Pennsylvania and Haverford. He was Provost of the University of Pennsylvania from 1956-1958. He is Chairman of the Board of Managers of Haverford College and a member of the Board of Trustees of Bryn Mawr College. His citation welcomed him "to membership in his third Quaker College."

Others receiving honorary degrees were Ernest Kitzinger, leading Byzantine scholar and A. Kingsley Porter University

Professor at Harvard, "A distinguished student of a distinctive civilization, a custodian of an important part of the memory of the human race."; Edgar Trevor Williams, Oxford Secretary of the Rhodes Trust, "he presides over an adventure in international education with which Swarthmore has been linked for 35 years."; and Milton Byron Babbitt, composer and William Shubel Conant Professor of Music at Princeton University, "His dazzling musical discourse brings us to the realization of the ear's proximity to the center of human thought and feeling. A member at various times of both music and mathematics faculties of Princeton University and knowledge in physics as well, he embodies in himself all the subjects of the quadrivium."

Mr. Kitzinger studied at the University of Rome and received his D. Phil. from the University of Munich. He served as assistant in the British Museum for five years before he came to the United States. He was a research analyst with the Office of Strategic Services during World War II. Since 1941, he has been associated with Harvard University in Byzantine Art and Archeology. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is the author of "Early Medieval Art in the British Museum" and of "Mosaics of Monreale." He received the degree of Doctor of Letters. His daughter received her B.A. in Greek at the same ceremony.

Mr. Williams was educated at Merton College, Oxford, where he received his B.A. in Modern History, First Class. He is a Fellow of Balliol College and an Honorary Fellow of Merton College. He is Pro-Vice-Chancellor of Oxford University and has been Oxford Secretary of the Rhodes Trust since 1959. He is editor of "The Dictionary of National Biography"; chairman of the Nuffield Provincial Hospital Trust; the Academic Advisory Committee, University of Warwick; and of the Educational Advisory Committee of the R.A.F. He was with the United Nations Security Council Secretariat, 1946-47. He received the degree of Doctor of Letters.

Service Weds. For Dr. Getty Minister Had Served Locally In Retirement

Services were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church on Harvard Avenue for the Rev. Walter Getty, D.D., administrator and pastor in the United Presbyterian Church, who died Sunday, June 15, aged 86.

During World War I Dr. Getty was the American representative of the International Young Men's Christian Association Hospitality League in London. Dr. Getty served the Swarthmore church indefatigably as minister of visitation from July, 1958 through March, 1963, and for a brief period in the summer of 1967. He was active in the work of the Philadelphia Presbytery.

He is survived by his wife, the former Grace Langenberg, and a sister Mrs. Florence G. Cook of Glenside.

The Rev. Bertram de H. Atwood officiated, assisted by Dr. Edward A. Morris of Morganwood. Dr. Glenn R. Morrow of the church session spoke for the congregation.

Awards To Late Lt. G. Hamilton Flying Cross, Medal Presented To Parents

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hamilton of North Chester road accepted posthumous awards for their son, First Lieutenant George B. Hamilton, at a ceremony at McGuire Air Force Base, New Jersey, on June 5.

Lieutenant Hamilton, a pilot of an O-1E aircraft, died as a result of a crash during a take-off from Cu Chi Airfield, Republic of Vietnam, October 16, 1968.

Brigadier General John H. Herring Jr., 438th Military Airfield Wing commander, presented the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with first through third oak leaf cluster to the pilot's parents.

The Flying Cross was awarded Lieutenant Hamilton for "heroism while participating in aerial flight as a forward air controller near Dau Tieng, Republic of Vietnam, September 20, 1968."

On that day, Lieutenant Hamilton directed an air strike in the dark early morning hours in support of a beleaguered American Infantry unit engaged in a bitter battle with a battalion-sized hostile force.

"Despite the intense and sustained ground fire directed at his aircraft, he made repeated passes over the enemy positions to mark them for fighter aircraft. His cool, professional direction of the air strike turned the tide of the battle into a rout of the hostiles and a victory for the American unit."

The Air Medal was presented for "meritorious achievement while participating in sustained aerial flight as a combat crew member in Southeast Asia from July 27, 1968 to August 16, 1968."

The lieutenant was cited for "outstanding airmanship and courage" in successfully accomplishing missions under extremely hazardous conditions including continuous ground fire from enemy positions.

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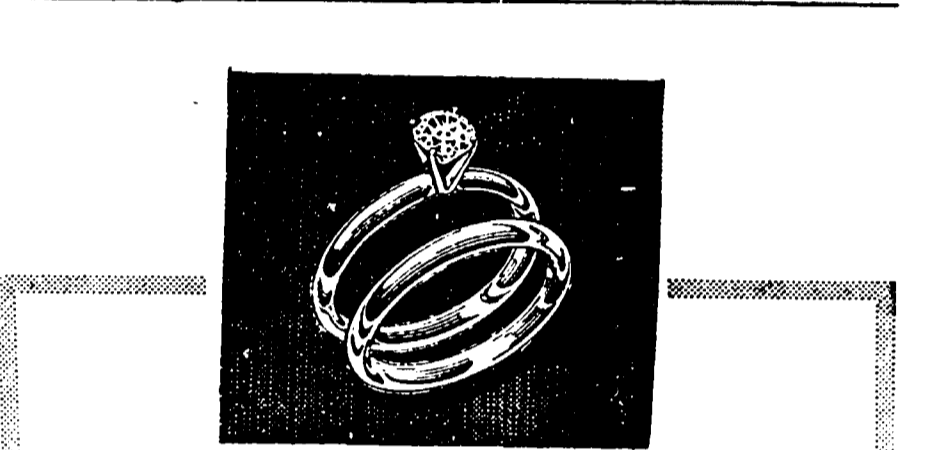

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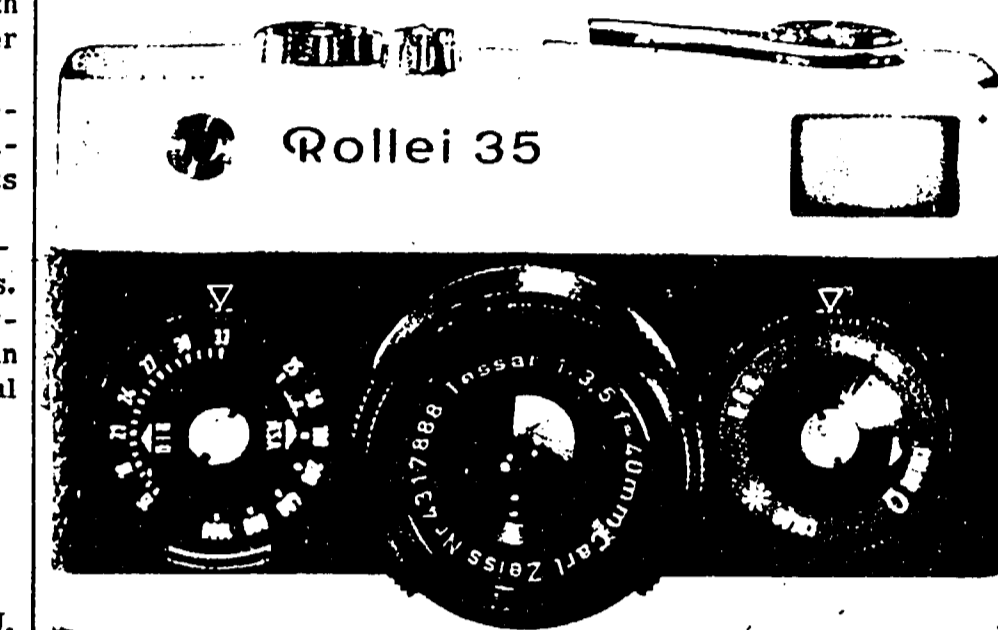

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LEGAL NOTICE

BOROUGH OF SWARTHMORE
ORDINANCE NO. 690

An ordinance regulating the keeping of dogs in the Borough of Swarthmore, prescribing duties of owners and custodians of dogs, and duties of Borough police and special officers with respect to dogs committing nuisances, attacking persons or damaging property; providing for the employment of a dog catcher, requiring reports to the Borough Secretary by persons having knowledge of any person being bitten by a dog; providing for a quarantine under supervision of the Borough Health Officer; providing for reimbursement by owners or custodians of expenses incurred by the Borough in the enforcement of this ordinance, and penalties for the violation thereof.

The Council of the Borough of Swarthmore does ordain:

Section 1. All dogs kept in the Borough of Swarthmore must be licensed and comply with the applicable provisions of the Dog Law of 1965, P.L. 1124, its amendments and supplements.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian of any dog, whether licensed under the said Act or not, to fail to keep such dog at all times either (1) confined within an enclosure from which it cannot escape, or (2) firmly secured by means of a collar and chain, or other device, so that it cannot stray beyond the premises of the owner or custodian, or (3) under the personal control of and in close proximity to said owner or custodian.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of every police officer of the Borough to cause to be seized and detained any dog found running at large in violation of Section 2 of this ordinance, or committing any nuisance or damage to property, public or private, or attacking any person in his presence, or that constitutes a threat to the public health and welfare. Detention shall be on the premises of a humane society or other suitable premises as designated by the Chief of Police, where the name and address of the owner can be ascertained. Immediate notice, either registered mail or personal notice, shall be given such owner, or claim agent, to claim such dog within ten days. In addition to other penalties prescribed for the violation of this ordinance, the owner of a dog so detained shall pay a penalty to the Borough of Swarthmore of five dollars (\$5.00), and all reasonable expenses incurred by reason of its detention, and comply with the provisions of the Dog Law of 1965, as supplemented, and the provisions of this ordinance, before the dog is returned. If, after ten days from the giving of such notice such dog has not been claimed, the Chief of Police shall dispose of such dog by sale or by destruction in some humane manner.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of any person having knowledge that a person has been bitten or injured by a dog subject to regulation under this ordinance, to report such occurrence immediately to the Borough Secretary, and to procure from her a form to be completed and filed for transmission by the Secretary to the Health Officer of the Borough. By authority of this and other ordinances of the Borough, and of the Act of April 23, 1956, P. L. 1510, as supplemented, a quarantine is hereby imposed with respect to such dog for a period of ten days, and thereafter until officially released by order of the Health Officer. The place of such quarantine or absolute detention shall be as directed by the Health Officer. Within 24 hours of the attack herein referred to, or as soon as the identity of the dog causing the injury has been established as herein provided, it shall be the duty of the owner or custodian to have the dog examined for rabies or other infectious or contagious disease by a qualified veterinarian who shall promptly furnish a written report of his findings to the Borough Secretary, or to the Health Officer. At the end of ten days the animal shall again be examined by the veterinarian, who shall again make written report of his findings in the same manner. If the animal is found to have rabies, or to be a carrier of a dangerous disease, the Health Officer shall direct what disposition shall follow.

Section 5. If the owner or custodian of the offending dog referred to in Section 4 shall fail to comply with the provisions hereof the Chief of Police, or his deputy, is authorized to cause such examinations to be made by a veterinarian, and to enforce said quarantine, and to carry out the orders of the Health Officer. In such case the owner or custodian shall be liable for the penalty and expenses incurred by the Borough, including the cost of said examinations, to be recovered in a

Section 6. Borough Council may employ a dog catcher, and cause him to be sworn in as a special police officer to perform under the direction and control of the Chief of Police. It shall be unlawful for any person to interfere with any officer employed in the enforcement of this ordinance. Any police officer is hereby authorized to go upon any premises and to any building, other than one occupied as a private dwelling, and there seize any dog subject to apprehension under the terms of this ordinance, when such officer is in immediate pursuit of such dog.

Section 7. Any person who shall fail to perform the duties imposed upon him by this ordinance, or otherwise violate the same, shall be subject to a fine or penalty not exceeding \$300, and in default of paying the same the same imprisonment not exceeding 30 days. Prosecutions hereunder may be instituted by proper officers of the Borough, the Health Officer, or by any person having knowledge of the violation.

Section 8. If any part or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid such judgment shall be confined to that part, provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which the judgment shall have been rendered, and shall not impair the validity of the remainder of the ordinance, or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The Borough Council hereby declares that it would have enacted this ordinance, or the remainder thereof, had the questioned portion been omitted.

Section 9. Ordinance No. 582, approved April 9, 1956, is hereby repealed. Any other ordinance, or part of an ordinance, inconsistent with this ordinance is hereby, to the extent of such inconsistency, likewise repealed.
