It was never a fishing or swimming stream of pristine purity because there was the Plush Mill dumping dyes and above that the paper mill. But the Springton dam was enough to keep the Crum a very pretty,

pleasant stream. By now the Crum has reached a low state, and there is nothing clear about its ripples. It is a dirty, sluggish unattractive body of polluted water, hardly to be described as a stream.

This was brought strongly to my notice on two occasions recently, at a picnic in Smedley rock climbing excursion behind the old Strath Haven site. Below the foot bridge over

It in Smedley Park the Crum is a few small rivulets threading through deep black mud. Lower down it is a wider but almost motionless, body of opaque water. covered at many points with scum and lined with black

I understand the source of pollution now is the Water Company, which puts the backwash from its charcoal filters into the stream below the Beatty Road pumping station. The feeble flow is not enough to prevent the build-up of black

In contrast to the Crum, Ridley Creek has rippling clear water, with fish, below the Media Water Works as well as

Since the Water Company is a monopoly, we can't protest by turning elsewhere for its product (which I must say, is excellent). But we can urge its management to make a real effort now to clean up the lower Crum and restore it to a stream of natural beauty.

It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian of any dog, whether licensed under the said Act or not, to fail to keep such dog at all times either (1) confined within an enclosure from which it cannot escape, or (2) firmly secured by means of a collar and chain, or other device, so that it cannot stray beyond the premises of the owner or custodian, or (3) under the personal control of and in close

Section 3. It shall be the duty of every police officer of the Borough to cause to be seized and detained any dog found running at large in violation of Section 2 of this ordinance, or committing any nui sance or damage to property, public or private, or attacking any person in his presence, or that constitutes a threat to the public health and welfare. Detention shall be on the premieration of the premieration. ises of a humane society or other suitable premises as dessignated by the Chief of Police.
Where the name and address of the owner can be ascertained immediate notice, either registered mail or personal notice, shall be given such owner, or his agent, to claim such dog within ten days. In addition to other penalties prescribed for the violation of this ordin-ance, the owner of a dog so de-tained shall pay a penalty to the Borough of Swarthmore of five (\$5.00), and all reasonable expenses incurred by reason of its

If, after ten days from the giving of such notice such dog has not been claimed, the Chief of Police shall dispose of such dog by sale or by destruction in some humane manner. Section 4. It shall be the duty of any person having knowledge that a person has been bitten or report such occurrence immediately to the Borough Secretary, and to procure from her a form to be completed and signed for sub-

Within 24 hours of the attack herein referred to, or as soon as the identity of the dog causing the injury has been established as herein provided, it shall be the duty of the owner or custodian to have the dog examined for rabies or other infectious or contagious disease by a qualified veterinarian who shall promptly furnish a written report of his findings to the Borough Secretary, or to the Health Officer. 



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
